SECTION B: INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS

The City of Madison Standard Specifications for Public Works Construction - 2012 Edition, as supplemented and amended from time to time, forms a part of these contract documents as if attached hereto.

These standard specifications are available on the City of Madison Public Works website at www.cityofmadison.com/Business/PW/specs.cfm or by contacting City Engineering Division, Room 115, City-County Building, 210 Martin Luther King Jr. Blvd., Madison, WI 53703.

The Contractor shall review these Specifications prior to preparation of proposals for the work to be done under this contract, with specific attention to Article 102 **“BIDDING REQUIREMENTS AND CONDITIONS”** and Article 103 **“AWARD AND EXECUTION OF THE CONTRACT.”** For the convenience of the bidder, below are highlights of three subsections of the specifications.

Section 102.1: Pre-Qualification of Bidders

In accordance with Wisconsin State Statutes 66.0901 (2) and (3), all bidders must submit to the Board of Public Works proof of responsibility on forms furnished by the City. The City requires that all bidders be qualified on a biennial basis.

Bidders must present satisfactory evidence that they have been regularly engaged in the type of work specified herein and they are fully prepared with necessary capital, materials, machinery and supervisory personnel to conduct the work to be contracted for to the satisfaction of the City. All bidders must be pre-qualified by the Board of Public Works for the type of construction on which they are bidding prior to the opening of the bid.

In accordance with Section 39.02(9)(a)l. of the Madison General Ordinances, all bidders shall submit in writing to the Affirmative Action Division Manager of the City of Madison, a Certificate of Compliance or an Affirmative Action Plan at the same time or prior to the submission of the proof of responsibility forms. The bidder shall be disqualified if the bidder fails to or refuses to, prior to opening of the bid, submit a Certificate of compliance, Affirmative Action Plan or Affirmative Action Data Update, as applicable, as defined by Section 39.02 of the Madison General Ordinances (entitled Affirmative Action) and as required by Section 102.11 of the Standard Specifications.

Section 102.4: Proposals

No bid will be accepted that does not contain an adequate or reasonable price for each and every item named in the Schedule of Unit Prices.

A lump sum bid for the work in accordance with the plans and specifications is required. The lump sum bid must be the same as the total amounts bid for the various items and it shall be inserted in the space provided.

All papers bound with or attached to the proposal form are considered a part thereof and must not be detached or altered when the proposal is submitted. The plans, specifications and other documents designated in the proposal form will be considered a part of the proposal whether attached or not.

A proposal submitted by an individual shall be signed by the bidder or by a duly authorized agent. A proposal submitted by a partnership shall be signed by a member/partner or by a duly authorized agent thereof. A proposal submitted by a corporation shall be signed by an authorized officer or duly authorized registered agent of such corporation, and the proposal shall show the name of the State under the laws of

which such corporation was chartered. The required signatures shall in all cases appear in the space provided therefore on the proposal.

Each proposal shall be placed, together with the proposal guaranty, in a sealed envelope, so marked as to indicate name of project, the contract number or option to which it applies, and the name and address of the Contractor. Proposals will be received at the place and until the hour on the date designated in the advertisement. When sent by mail, the sealed proposal marked as indicated above shall be enclosed in an additional envelope. Proposals sent by mail, submitted in person or otherwise delivered must be in the hands of the official conducting the letting by the hour on the date designated in the advertisement. Proposals received after the date designated will be returned to the bidder unopened.

The Bidder shall execute form ERD-7777 (R.9/03), a part of these proposal pages and submit same with the bidder's proposal, if applicable. REFER TO PROPOSAL SECTION.

Section 102.5: Bid Deposit (Proposal Guaranty)

No proposal shall be considered unless either (i) it is accompanied by a bid deposit of the character and amount described in the Advertisement for Bids or (ii) a biennial bid bond in an amount and form acceptable to the City of Madison has been previously submitted.

Bid deposits of unsuccessful bidders shall be returned following the award of the contract by the Common Council. Bid deposit of the successful bidders shall be returned within forty-eight (48) hours following execution of the contract and bond as required.

Instructions to Bidders City of Madison SBE Program Information

2 Small Business Enterprise (SBE) Program Information

2.1 Policy and Goal

The City of Madison reaffirms its policy of nondiscrimination in the conduct of City business by maintaining a procurement process which remains open to all who have the potential and ability to sell goods and services to the City. It is the policy of the City of Madison to allow Small Business Enterprises (SBE) maximum feasible opportunity to participate in City of Madison contracting. The bidder acknowledges that its bid has been submitted in accordance with the SBE program and is for the public's protection and welfare.

Please refer to the "ADVERTISEMENT FOR BIDS" for the goal for the utilization of SBEs on this project. SBEs may participate as subcontractors, vendors and/or suppliers, which provide a commercially useful function. The dollar value for SBE suppliers or 'materials only' vendors shall be discounted to 60% for purposes of meeting SBE goals.

A bidder which achieves or exceeds the SBE goal will be in compliance with the SBE requirements of this project. In the event that the bidder is unable to achieve the SBE goal, the bidder must demonstrate that a good faith effort to do so was made. Failure to either achieve the goal or demonstrate a good faith effort to do so will be grounds for the bidder being deemed a non-responsible contractor ineligible for award of this contract.

A bidder may count towards its attainment of the SBE goal only those expenditures to SBEs that perform a commercially useful function. For purposes of evaluating a bidder's responsiveness to the attainment of the SBE goal, the contract participation by an SBE is based on the percentage of the total base bid proposed by the Contractor. The total base bid price is inclusive of all addenda.

Work performed by an SBE firm in a particular transaction can be counted toward the goal only if it involves a commercially useful function. That is, in light of industry practices and other relevant considerations, does the SBE firm have a necessary and useful role in the transaction, of a kind for which there is a market outside the context of the SBE Program, or is the firm's role a superfluous step added in an attempt to obtain credit towards goals? If, in the judgment of the Affirmative Action Division, the SBE firm will not perform a commercially useful function in the transaction, no credit towards goals will be awarded.

The question of whether a firm is performing a commercially useful function is completely separate from the question of whether the firm is an eligible SBE. A firm is eligible if it meets the definitional criteria and ownership and control requirements, as set forth in the City of Madison's SBE Program.

If the City of Madison determines that the SBE firm is performing a commercially useful function, then the City of Madison must then decide what that function is. If the commercially useful function is that of an SBE vendor / supplier that regularly transacts

business with the respective product, then the City of Madison will count 60% of the value of the product supplied toward SBE goals.

To be counted, the SBE vendor / supplier must be engaged in selling the product in question to the public. This is important in distinguishing an SBE vendor / supplier, which has a regular trade with a variety of customers, from a firm which performs supplier-like functions on an ad hoc basis or for only one or two contractors with whom it has a special relationship.

A supplier of bulk goods may qualify as an eligible SBE vendor / supplier if it either maintains an inventory or owns or operates distribution equipment. With respect to the distribution equipment; e.g., a fleet of trucks, the term "operates" is intended to cover a situation in which the supplier leases the equipment on a regular basis for its entire business. It is not intended to cover a situation in which the firm simply provides drivers for trucks owned or leased by another party; e.g., a prime contractor, or leases such a party's trucks on an ad hoc basis for a specific job.

If the commercially useful function being performed is not that of a qualified SBE vendor / supplier, but rather that of delivery of products, obtaining bonding or insurance, procurement of personnel, acting as a broker or manufacturer's representative in the procurement of supplies, facilities, or materials, etc., only the fees or commissions will apply towards the goal.

For example, a business that simply transfers title of a product from manufacturer to ultimate purchaser; e. g., a sales representative who re-invoices a steel product from the steel company to the Contractor, or a firm that puts a product into a container for delivery would not be considered a qualified SBE vendor / supplier. The Contractor would not receive credit based on a percentage of the cost of the product for working with such firms.

Concerning the use of services that help the Contractor obtain needed supplies, personnel, materials or equipment to perform a contract: only the fee received by the service provider will be counted toward the goal. For example, use of a SBE sales representative or distributor for a steel company, if performing a commercially useful function at all, would entitle the Contractor receiving the steel to count only the fee paid to the representative or distributor toward the goal. This provision would also govern fees for professional and other services obtained expressly and solely to perform work relating to a specific contract.

Concerning transportation or delivery services: if an SBE trucking company picks up a product from a manufacturer or a qualified vendor / supplier and delivers the product to the Contractor, the commercially useful function it is performing is not that of a supplier, but simply that of a transporter of goods. Unless the trucking company is itself the manufacturer or a qualified vendor / supplier in the product, credit cannot be given based on a percentage of the cost of the product. Rather, credit would be allowed for the cost of the transportation service.

The City is aware that the rule's language does not explicitly mention every kind of business that may contribute work on this project. In administering these programs, the City would, on a case-by-case basis, determine the appropriate counting formula to apply in a particular situation.

2.2 Contract Compliance

2.3 Certification of SBE by City of Madison

The Affirmative Action Division maintains a directory of SBEs which are currently certified as such by the City of Madison. Contact the Contract Compliance Officer as indicated in Section 2.2 to receive a copy of the SBE Directory or you may access the SBE Directory online at www.cityofmadison.com/dcr/aaTBDDir.cfm.

All contractors, subcontractors, vendors and suppliers seeking SBE status must complete and submit the **Targeted Business Certification Application** to the City of Madison Affirmative Action Division by the time and date established for receipt of bids. A copy of the Targeted Business Certification Application is available by contacting the Contract Compliance Officer at the address and telephone indicated in Section 2.2 or you may access the Targeted Business Certification Application online at www.cityofmadison.com/dcr/aaTBDDir.cfm. Submittal of the Targeted Business Certification Application by the time specified does not guarantee that the applicant will be certified as a SBE eligible to be utilized towards meeting the SBE goal for this project.

2.4 Small Business Enterprise Compliance Report

2.4.1 Good Faith Efforts

Bidders shall take all necessary affirmative steps to assure that SBEs are utilized when possible and that the established SBE goal for this project is achieved. A contractor who self performs a portion of the work, and is pre-qualified to perform that category of work, may subcontract that portion of the work, but shall not be required to do so. When a bidder is unable to achieve the established SBE goal, the bidder must demonstrate that a good faith effort to do so was made. Such a good faith effort should include the following:

- 2.4.1.1 Attendance at the pre-bid meeting.
- 2.4.1.2 Using the City of Madison's directory of certified SBEs to identify SBEs from which to solicit bids.
- 2.4.1.3 Assuring that SBEs are solicited whenever they are potential sources.
- 2.4.1.4 Referring prospective SBEs to the City of Madison Affirmative Action Division for certification.
- 2.4.1.5 Dividing total project requirements into smaller tasks and/or quantities, where economically feasible, to permit maximum feasible SBE participation.
- 2.4.1.6 Establishing delivery schedules, where requirements permit, which will encourage participation by SBEs.
- 2.4.1.7 Providing SBEs with specific information regarding the work to be performed.
- 2.4.1.8 Contacting SBEs in advance of the deadline to allow such businesses sufficient time to prepare a bid.
- 2.4.1.9 Utilizing the bid of a qualified and competent SBE when the bid of such a business is deemed reasonable (i.e. 5% above the lowest bidder), although not necessarily low.

- 2.4.1.10 Contacting SBEs which submit a bid, to inquire about the details of the bid and confirm that the scope of the work was interpreted as intended.

2.4.2 Reporting SBE Utilization and Good Faith Efforts

The Small Business Enterprise Compliance Report is to be submitted by the bidder in a separate sealed envelope marked: “**ENVELOPE 2 - SBE COMPLIANCE REPORT.**” This report is due by the specified bid closing time and date. Bids submitted without a completed SBE Compliance Report as outlined below shall be deemed non-responsible and the bidder ineligible for award of this contract.

- 2.4.2.1 If the Bidder meets or exceeds the goal established for SBE utilization, the Small Business Enterprise Compliance Report shall consist of the following:

- 2.4.2.1.1 **Cover Page**, Page C-7; and

- 2.4.2.1.2 **Summary Sheet**, C-8.

- 2.4.2.2 If the bidder does not meet the goal established for SBE utilization, the Small Business Enterprise Compliance Report shall consist of the following:

- 2.4.2.2.1 **Cover Page**, Page C-7;

- 2.4.2.2.2 **Summary Sheet**, C-8; and

- 2.4.2.2.3 **SBE Contact Report**, C-9 and C-10. (A separate Contact Report must be completed for each applicable SBE which is not utilized.)

2.5 Appeal Procedure

A bidder which does not achieve the established goal and is deemed non-responsible for failure to demonstrate a good faith effort to achieve such goal and subsequently denied eligibility for award of contract may, within 72 hours of receiving such notification, appeal that decision to a special appeals committee composed of three (3) members of the Affirmative Action Commission, three (3) members of the Board of Public Works and a seventh member appointed by the Mayor. All appeals must be made in writing to the City Engineer and received within 72 hours of City of Madison’s notice. Postmark not applicable.

2.6 SBE Requirements After Award of the Contract

The successful bidder shall identify SBE subcontractors, suppliers and vendors on the subcontractor list in accordance with the specifications. The Contractor shall submit a detailed explanation of any variances between the listing of SBE subcontractors, vendors and/or suppliers on the subcontractor list and the Contractor’s SBE Compliance Report for SBE participation.

No change in SBE subcontractors, vendors and/or suppliers from those SBEs indicated in the SBE Compliance Report will be allowed without prior approval from the Engineer and the Affirmative Action Division. The contractor shall submit in writing to the City of Madison Affirmative Action Division a request to change any SBE citing specific reasons which necessitate such a change. The Affirmative Action Division will use a general test

of reasonableness in approving or rejecting the contractor's request for change. If the request is approved, the Contractor will make every effort to utilize another SBE if available.

The City will monitor the project to ensure that the actual percentage commitment to SBE firms is carried out.

2.7 SBE Definition and Eligibility Guidelines

A Small Business Enterprise is a business concern awarded certification by the City of Madison. For the purposes of this program a Small Business Enterprise is defined as:

- A. An independent business operated under a single management. The business may not be a subsidiary of any other business and the stock or ownership may not be held by any individual or any business operating in the same or a similar field. In determining whether an entity qualifies as a SBE, the City shall consider all factors relevant to being an independent business including, but not limited to, the date the business was established, adequacy of its resources for the work in which it proposes to involve itself, the degree to which financial, equipment leasing and other relationships exist with other ineligible firms in the same or similar lines of work. SBE owner(s) shall enjoy the customary incidents of ownership and shall share in the risks and profits commensurate with their enjoyment interests, as demonstrated by an examination of the substance rather than form or arrangements that may be reflected in its ownership documents.
- B. A business with annual gross receipts of less than \$750,000 when averaged over the past three year period;

SECTION D: SPECIAL PROVISIONS

**UNIVERSITY AVENUE PARKING LOT RECONSTRUCTION - 2012
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It is the intent of these Special Provisions to set forth the final contractual intent as to the matter involved and shall prevail over the Standard Specifications and plans whenever in conflict therewith. In order that comparisons between the Special Provisions can be readily made, the numbering system for the Special Provisions is equivalent to that of the Specifications.

Whenever in these Specifications the term "Standard Specifications" appears, it shall be taken to refer to the City of Madison Standard Specifications for Public Works Construction and Supplements thereto.

SECTION 102.10: MINIMUM RATE OF WAGE SCALE

For this project, payment of prevailing wages (white sheet) is not required if either: a single trade accounts for 85% or more of the total labor costs of the project and the bid is less than \$48,000; or no single trade accounts for 85% or more of the total labor costs of the project and the bid is less than \$100,000. For bids not meeting either of these conditions, prevailing wages shall be required.

If required, the wages and benefits paid on the contract shall not be less than those specified in the Prevailing Wage Determination included with these contract documents for the following types of work:

- Building and Heavy Construction
- Sewer, Water, and Tunnel Construction
- Local Street and Miscellaneous Paving Operations
- Residential and Agricultural Construction

All bidders are notified that all labor employed on City contracts must be paid in accordance with the minimum rate of wage scale included in the Contract Documents.

For the information of the employees working on the project, a copy of the wage scale included in the contract documents and the provisions of Section 66.0903(8) of the Wisconsin Statutes shall be kept posted by the employer and in at least one conspicuous and easily accessible place at the site of the project.

The Contractor shall keep weekly payroll records setting forth the name, address, telephone number, classification, wage rate and fringe benefit package of each employee who worked on such City project and all other projects the employee worked in the same period, and the Contractor must keep records of the individual time each employee worked on the project and for each day of the project. Such records shall also set forth the total number of hours of overtime credited to each such employee for each day and week and the amount of overtime pay received in that week. Such records shall, in addition, set forth the full weekly wages earned by each such employee and the actual hourly wage paid to that employee. The Contractor shall submit payroll records to the Engineer every week for those periods when work is being done on the project. Said submittal shall be within twenty-one (21) calendar days of the end of the Contractor's weekly pay period.

The Contractor shall ensure that employees shall be paid unconditionally and shall receive the full amounts accrued at the time of payment, computed at rates not less than those stated in the City of

Madison "Minimum Rate of Wage Scale" and that each employee's rate shall be determined by the work that is done within the trade or occupation classification which should be properly assigned to such employee. Questions regarding an employee's classification or rate of pay within that classification, shall be resolved by the practice that predominates in the industry and on which the trade or occupation rate/classification is based. Therefore, rate of pay, classification and work jurisdiction disputes shall be resolved by relying upon practices established by collective bargaining agreements and guidelines used in such determinations by appropriate recognized trade unions operating within the City of Madison.

The Contractor shall agree that the normal rate of wage paid to the Contractor's employees on other projects shall not be reduced or otherwise diminished as a result of the requirement to pay no less than the minimum rate of wage scale on a City project. Mulcting of employees on City projects by contractors, such as by kickbacks or other such devices, is prohibited.

These contract provisions shall apply to all work performed on the contract by the Contractor with its own organization and with assistance of laborers under its immediate superintendency and to all work performed by piecework or by subcontract. No laborer, worker, or mechanic shall be employed directly upon the site of the work except on a wage basis, but this shall not be construed to prohibit the rental of equipment from individuals.

In the event of a refusal by the Contractor to submit payroll records as required by the contract, the City of Madison shall have the option to cancel this contract and request the Surety to perform or to relet the balance of the work for bids, and in that event, to charge the Contractor for any loss which the City may incur thereby.

SECTION 102.12: BEST VALUE CONTRACTING

This Contract shall be considered a Best Value Contract if the Contractor's bid is equal to or greater than \$51,500 for a single trade contract; or equal to or greater than \$251,000 for a multi-trade contract pursuant to MGO 33.07(7).

ARTICLE 103 - AWARD AND EXECUTION OF THE CONTRACT

The Contractor shall execute signing of this contract completely prior to **MAY 21, 2012**. No exceptions or extensions to the above date will be permitted.

ARTICLE 104 - SCOPE OF WORK

The project limits for the work to be done include the University Avenue parking lot located in the 2500 block of University Avenue and two areas on University Avenue which require the installation of the final surface layer of pavement. The two areas of University Avenue which require final surface pavement are: 1) approximately 530 lineal feet in the 2500 block of University Avenue and Stage 2) approximately 430 lineal feet in the 1500 block of University Avenue. The project is approximately 800 feet in length.

For purposes of this Contract the work shall be divided in two stages for construction. Stage 1 work includes the work associated with the reconstruction of the University Avenue parking lot and the placement of the final surface pavement layer on University Avenue in the 2500 block of University Avenue. Stage 2 work includes the work associated with milling and overlaying the final surface pavement layer at the University Avenue, Campus Drive and Breese Terrace intersection.

The Contractor shall coordinate their work with the two ongoing private development projects located within the project limits. See Section 105.12 - Cooperation By The Contractor.

The work under this contract shall include but not be limited to installation of storm sewer, street lighting, curb and gutter, drive aprons, base preparation, asphalt pavement, topsoil placement and seeding and sidewalk repair.

The Contractor shall view the site prior to bidding to become familiar with the existing conditions. It will be the responsibility of the Contractor to work with the utilities located in the right of way to resolve conflicts during the construction process.

SECTION 104.6 DECREASED AND DELETED ITEMS

The electrical quantities include estimates for work that may or may not be required. If actual quantities are less than estimated, or if items are deleted from the contractor's work, the decreased quantities or deleted items shall not constitute the basis for a claim for damages for anticipated profits for the work dispensed with.

SECTION 105.1: AUTHORITY OF THE ENGINEER

The Engineer shall resolve all questions which arise as to the quality and acceptability of materials furnished, work performed, manner of performance, rate of progress of the work, interpretation of the plans and Specifications, acceptable fulfillment of the contract, compensation, and disputes and mutual rights between Contractors under the Specifications. The Engineer shall determine the amount and quantity of work performed and materials furnished.

All decisions of the Engineer shall, when so requested, be rendered in writing. They shall be final and conclusive in all matters unless within ten (10) days after such decision the Contractor applies in writing to the Board of Public Works for a review of such decision.

Any change proposed by a Contractor in SBE subcontractors, vendors or suppliers from those SBEs indicated on the SBE Compliance Report must be approved by the Engineer and the City's Manager of the Affirmative Action Division (hereafter, AAD). When requested, such decision shall be rendered in writing. Such decisions shall be final and conclusive in all matters unless within ten (10) days after such decision the Contractor or the affected SBE applies in writing to the Board of Public Works for a review of such decision.

In the event the Engineer and the AAD disagree over the proper decision to be made regarding an SBE, the Mayor shall appoint a third person to resolve the disagreement, within 30 days of appointment. The decision thus rendered may be reviewed by the Board of Public Works upon request of the Contractor or the affected SBE as set forth in Sections 105.1 and 105.2 of the City's standard specifications.

SECTION 105.12 COOPERATION BY THE CONTRACTOR

The City of Madison has been given to understand that work will be undertaken by others in approximately the same time frame and the same area as the proposed project. It shall be the Contractor's responsibility to verify this information and any subsequent changes in the scheduling of the work by others and to make corrections in his/her construction timetable as required.

The Contractor shall coordinate all Stage 1 work in the 2500 block of University Avenue with ongoing work by others for the private Development of the property at 2550 University Avenue. The Developer's contact for coordination purposes is Jay Mullins, (608-285-8090 office) and (608-212-5965 cell).

The Contractor shall coordinate all Stage 2 work in the 1500 block of University Avenue with ongoing work by others for the private Development of the property at 1552 University Avenue. The Developer's contact for coordination purposes is Brad King of Mortenson Construction, at (262) 853-6458.

The Contractor shall use care around existing trees, plantings, fences, walls, steps and driveways that are indicated on the plans to remain. Damage to these items during construction shall be repaired or replaced at the Contractor's expense. No trees shall be cut without the approval of the Engineer and the City Forester; the abutting property owners shall be notified in accordance with the City's Administrative Procedure Memorandum No. 6-2.

SECTION 107.7 MAINTENANCE OF TRAFFIC

The Contractor shall submit an acceptable Traffic Control Plan, including all necessary phases, to the office of the City Traffic Engineer, at 215 Martin Luther King, Jr. Blvd, Suite 100, Madison, WI 53703, a minimum of five (5) working days prior to the pre-construction meeting. The Traffic Control Plan shall address all requirements of this section of the Special Provisions. The successful bidder shall work with the City Traffic Engineering Division to develop an approved Traffic Control Plan. The Contractor shall not start work on this project until the Traffic Engineering Division has approved a traffic control plan and traffic control devices have been installed, in accordance with the approved plan. Failure of the Contractor to obtain approval of a Traffic Control Plan, as specified above, may prevent the Contractor from starting work and shall be considered a delay of the project, caused by the Contractor.

The Contractor shall be responsible for installing and maintaining traffic control in accordance with the approved Traffic Control Plan and as directed by the City Traffic Engineer. The traffic control plan may need to be altered as conditions change in the field or as unexpected conditions occur. This may include relocating existing traffic control or providing additional traffic control. The Contractor shall install and maintain any necessary modifications or additions to the traffic control, as directed by the City Traffic Engineer, at no cost to the City.

All signing and barricading shall conform to the Federal Highways Administrations "Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices" (MUTCD).

One lane of traffic shall be maintained in each direction at all times on University Avenue. Minimum traffic lane width is 10 feet to edge of pavement and 12 feet from face of curb.

All traffic lanes shall be open during peak traffic times (7:00am-8:30am and 4:00-5:30pm).

Left turns from westbound University Avenue to southbound Breese Terrace shall be maintained at all times with a minimum turning radius that can accommodate Madison Metro buses.

Right turns from northbound Breese Terrace to eastbound University Avenue shall be maintained at all times with a minimum turning radius that can accommodate Madison Metro buses.

Type A warning lights shall be installed on all barricades used in the project per State of Wisconsin S.D.D. 15C2-4B. Contractor shall also place Type C warning lights on any barrels used to taper traffic or lane closures.

Maintain pedestrian movements crossing the construction zone at all intersections at all times. Pedestrian crossings of intersections shall meet requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act Accessibility Guidelines (ADAAG) and shall consist of temporary asphaltic surface, any grade of concrete, skid resistant steel plating, or alternative material as approved by the Construction Engineer. Gravel or base course material is not acceptable. Maintain ADA accessible pedestrian walkways that are free from mud,

sand, and construction debris. Any closures of sidewalk shall be approved by the Construction Engineer and shall conform to City of Madison standard detail drawing 6.36 in addition to any signing shown on the traffic control plan.

No construction equipment or materials shall be stored in the roadway or street right-of-way that is open to traffic during non-working hours. Construction equipment and materials are not to be stored within the street right-of-way that is outside the project limits as shown on the approved plan.

The Contractor shall not remove or cover any traffic signs. For removal, replacement, or covering of traffic and parking signs, contact the City of Madison Traffic Engineering Field Operations, 1120 Sayle Street, 266-4767, 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., a minimum of 2 working days in advance of when any existing signs need to be removed or covered. This service is free of charge. If the Contractor removes or covers the signs, the Contractor will be billed for the reinstallation or repair of, and any damage to, the signing equipment.

Contact Thomas Mohr, Traffic Engineering Division, 267-8725, with any questions concerning these traffic control specifications.

SECTION 107.8 NOTIFICATION WHEN CLOSING STREET

The Contractor shall not remove traffic signs. For removal or replacement of traffic and parking signs, contact the City of Madison Traffic Engineering Field Operations, 1120 Sayle Street, 266-4767, 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., a minimum of twenty-four (24) hours in advance of when any existing signs need to be removed. This service is provided free of charge. If the Contractor removes the signs, the Contractor will be billed for the reinstallation of, and any damage to, the signing equipment.

SECTION 108.2 PERMITS

A WI DNR Water Resources Application for Projects Permits (WRAPP) for construction site erosion control is not required for this project as the disturbed area is less than one (1) acre. A City of Madison Erosion Control permit is required and weekly inspections shall be completed by City Staff.

The Contractor shall meet the conditions of the City permit by properly installing and maintaining the erosion control measures as shown on the plans, specified in these Special Provisions, or as directed by the Construction Engineer or his designees. This work will be paid for under the appropriate contract bid items.

SECTION 109.2 PROSECUTION OF WORK

The Contractor shall begin work on or before **MAY 31, 2012**. The total time of completion of the contract shall be **FOURTY (44)** calendar days.

Stage 1 Work included within the 2500 block of University Avenue shall be limited to beginning on or before **MAY 31, 2012**. The date of completion for work within the 2500 block of University Avenue shall be **JUNE 29, 2012**.

Stage 2 Work at the intersection of University Avenue, Campus Drive and Breese Terrace shall be limited to beginning only after the widening of University Avenue has been completed by others along the north curb line of the property at 1552 University Avenue. The Developer estimates that the work in University Avenue will be able to commence by August, 2012. Work at the intersection of University Avenue, Campus Drive and Breese Terrace shall be limited to **FOURTEEN (14) CONSECUTIVE CALENDAR DAYS**. No work in this intersection shall be done on home UW football Saturdays (9/1/12; 9/15/12). Final paving of the Stage 2 Work shall be accomplished on a Saturday to limit exposure of paving operations to heavy weekday Metro Transit bus routes.

Work shall begin only after the start work letter is received. The Contractor shall limit workdays to 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. unless approved by the Engineer in writing.

BID ITEM 20321 - CONCRETE PAVEMENT REMOVAL

An estimated quantity of concrete pavement removal has been included in the proposal for the anticipated removal of concrete pavement utility trench patches at the intersection of University Avenue and Breese terrace.

ARTICLE 401 CRUSHED AGGREGATE BASE COURSE

The clear stone base course and the crushed stone base course shall be placed on the same day as the existing stone base is removed.

The Contractor shall maintain a minimum of six (6") inches of stone base course (existing or new) on all portions of the roadway open to vehicle access. No additional compensation will be given for stone used to maintain the six (6") required for access.

Crushed stone base course shall be used for bringing temporary ramps to grade. This material shall be reused after ramp is removed.

The material commonly known as crusher run or breaker run shall be used in undercut areas as designated by the Engineer.

SECTION 500 SEWERS AND SEWER STRUCTURES

STORM SEWER GENERAL

The storm sewer designer for this project is Sally Swenson: (608) 266-4862, sswenson@cityofmadison.com

Reconnection of existing pipes at new structures, or new pipes at new structures shall be considered to be part of the work required to construct the new structure or to construct the new sewer pipe and shall not be rewarded with additional compensation. However, if the structure being removed is larger than the

new structure, thus requiring additional pipe, the new pipe shall be paid under the appropriate bid item and the connection of the old pipe shall be accomplished with a concrete collar.

Where a new structure is to be constructed at an existing pipe, it is expected that the Contractor shall saw cut the existing pipe in the required location to accommodate the placement of the new structure. This shall be considered incidental to the structure. If the Contractor, of his or her convenience, deems it more suitable to remove the existing pipe to a full joint, the additional pipe and concrete collar required to reconnect the new structure shall be the responsibility of the Contractor and shall not be compensated.

SECTION 602.4(b) ELECTRICAL CONDUIT

Item 60241, Gopher Raceway, shall include any and all work associated with determining locations of existing utilities, such as underground locates. Item 60241 shall include raceways created by pushing, gophering or boring. The measured quantity will only include distances installed directly underneath curb and gutter, roadway, and sidewalk sections that are not removed or constructed with this project, or designated borings past trees. Minor alterations in conduit location may be made by the City Traffic Engineering Electrical Inspector to avoid gopher installation. Conduit depth within five feet of entering or leaving any handhole shall be 40 inches.

BID ITEM 90001 - MECHANICALLY STABILIZED EARTH MODULAR BLOCK WALL

DESCRIPTION

The work under this item shall consist of designing, furnishing materials and erecting a Permanent Earth Retention System in accordance with the lines, dimension, elevations and details as shown on the plans and provided in the contract. The quantity of BID ITEM 90001 - MECHANICALLY STABILIZED EARTH MODULAR BLOCK WALL includes 910 S.F. for the retaining wall as shown in the plan. The design life of the wall and all wall components shall be 75 years. Within this Special Provision, "WisDOT" refers to the Wisconsin Department of Transportation and "WisDOT Special Provisions" refers to the State of Wisconsin Standard Specifications for Highway and Structure Construction, 20012 Edition.

PROPRIETARY MODULAR BLOCK WALL SYSTEMS

DESIGN REQUIREMENTS

It is the responsibility of the Contractor to supply a design and supporting documentation as required by this special provision for review by the City of Madison to show the proposed design for each wall is in compliance with the design specifications.

The Design/Shop plans shall be prepared on reproducible sheets 11 inch x 17 inch, including borders. Each sheet shall have a title block in the lower right corner. The title block shall include the project identification number and structure number. Design calculations and notes shall be on 8 1/2 inch x 11 inch sheets, and shall contain the project identification number, name or designation of the wall, date of preparation, initials of designer and checker, and page number at the top of the page. All plans and calculations shall be signed, sealed and dated by a professional Engineer licensed in the State of Wisconsin.

The design of the Mechanically Stabilized Earth Modular Block Wall shall consider the internal stability of the wall mass, including the reinforcement pullout resistance. The design shall be in compliance with the current AASHTO Standard Specifications for Highway Bridges including interim specifications, the Wisconsin Standard Specifications for Highway and Structure Construction and standard engineering design procedures as determined by WisDOT. The walls shall be designed for the heights shown on the plans and 100% of the soil reinforcement shall be connected to the wall facing.

The embedment to the top of the leveling pad shall be 1 foot 6 inches or as specified in the plan whichever is greater. Potential depth of frost penetration at the wall location shall not be considered in designing the wall for depth of leveling pad. Vertical earth pressure shall be determined using Meyerhof distribution. A connection factor of safety of 1.5 at 0.75 inch deformation is required. A geosynthetic waterproof membrane is not required to cover the reinforced mass.

The minimum length of soil reinforcement measured from the back face of the wall shall be equal to 0.7 the wall height or as shown on the plan. In no case shall this length be less than 6 feet. The soil reinforcement shall extend 3 feet beyond the theoretical failure plane in all cases. The maximum vertical spacing of soil reinforcement layers shall be two times the block depth (front face to back face) or 32 inches, whichever is less. The first (bottom) layer of reinforcement shall be placed no further than 12 inches (average) above the top of the leveling pad but at least one block height above the leveling pad. The last (top) layer of soil reinforcement shall be no further than 24 inches (average) below the top of the wall.

The Contractor shall submit four copies of the following to the Engineer for review: complete design calculations, explanatory notes, specifications, detailed plans and shop drawings for the proposed wall system. They shall be submitted no later than 21 days prior to beginning construction of the wall. The detailed plans and shop drawings shall include all details, dimensions, quantities and cross-sections necessary

to construct the walls. The design calculations and notes shall clearly indicate the factors of safety against pullout and the design soil pressure beneath the wall footing and retained earth mass.

MATERIALS

Materials furnished under this contract shall conform to the following requirements.

Leveling Pad: The wall leveling pad shall consist of poured concrete masonry, 6 inches deep by 12 inch (minimum) wide Grade A as provided in section 501 of the WisDOT standard specifications. The wall-leveling pad shall be as wide as the proposed blocks or 12 inches (minimum) whichever is greater. The bottom of the bottom row of blocks shall be flat and 100% of the block surface shall bear on the leveling pad. The leveling pad shall step to follow the general slope of the ground line. The leveling pads steps shall keep the bottom of the wall within one block thickness of the minimum embedment, i.e., a minimum embedment plus an additional embedment of up to one block’s thickness. Additional embedment may be detailed, but will not be measured for payment.

Wall Facing: Wall facing units shall consist of precast modular concrete blocks. All units shall incorporate a mechanism or devices, which will develop a mechanical connection between vertical block layers. A single block type and style shall be used throughout each wall. The color of the block shall be as given on the plan or chosen by the Engineer. Modular block facing units, which are chipped, cracked or unsightly, shall not be used.

The top course of facing units shall be a solid precast concrete unit designed to be compatible with the remainder of the wall. The finishing course shall be bonded to the underlying facing units with a durable, high strength, flexible adhesive compound compatible with the block material. A formed cast-in-place concrete cap may also be used to finish the wall. A cap of this type shall be designed to have texture, color, and appearance, which complement the remainder of the wall. The vertical dimension of the cap shall not be less than 3 1/2 inches. Expansion joints shall be placed in the cap to correspond with each 24-inch change in vertical wall height or at a maximum spacing of 10 feet. Concrete for all cast-in-place caps shall be Grade A and shall conform to the requirements of Subsection 501.4 of the WisDOT Standard Specifications.

Block dimensions may vary no more than ± 1/8 inch from the standard values published by the manufacturer. Blocks must have a minimum depth (front face to back face) of 8 inches. The minimum front face thickness of blocks shall be 4 inches measured perpendicular from the front face to inside voids greater than 4 square inches. Also the minimum allowed thickness of any other portions of the block is 2 inches. The front face of the blocks shall conform to plan requirements for color, texture, or patterns.

Cementitious materials and aggregates for modular blocks shall conform to the requirements of ASTM C1372 Section 4.1 and 4.2. Modular blocks shall meet the following requirements.

⁽¹⁾ Test shall be run using a 3% saline solution.

⁽²⁾ Test results that meet either of the listed requirements for Freeze-Thaw Loss are acceptable.

All blocks shall be certified as to strength, absorption, and freeze-thaw requirements. At the time of delivery of certified blocks, furnish the Engineer a certified test report from an independent testing laboratory for each lot of modular blocks. The certified test report shall clearly identify the firm conducting the sampling and testing, the type of block, the date sampled, name of the person who conducted the sampling, the represented lot, the number of blocks in the lot, and the specific test results for each of the stated requirements of this specification. A lot shall not exceed 5000 blocks. The certified test results will represent all blocks within the lot. Each pallet of blocks delivered shall bear lot identification information. Block lots that do not meet the requirements of this specification or blocks without supporting certified test reports will be rejected and shall be removed from the project at no expense to the department.

Geogrids: Geogrid supplied as reinforcing members shall be manufactured from long chain polymers limited to polypropylene, high-density polyethylene, polyaramid, and polyester.

Geogrids shall form a uniform rectangular grid of bonded, formed, or fused polymer tensile strands crossing with a nominal right angle orientation. The minimum grid aperture shall be 0.5 inch. The geogrid shall maintain dimension stability during handling, placing, and installation. The geogrid shall be insect, rodent, mildew, and rot resistant.

The geogrid shall be furnished in a protective wrapping, which shall prevent exposure to ultraviolet radiation and damage from shipping or handling. The geogrid shall be kept dry until installed. Each roll shall be clearly marked to identify the material contained.

The wall supplier shall supply the allowable Tension Reinforcement Load (T_A) used in the design for each reinforcement layer. The following shall apply to walls over 5 ft. tall on average as measured from the top of the leveling pad to the top of the wall. The wall system composed of geogrid and modular blocks wall shall be from a preapproved supplier corresponding with their preapproved geogrid and modular blocks. The current list of preapproved geogrids and their corresponding modular blocks is maintained by the WisDOT Structures Development Section and may be obtained by calling 608-266-8494. Only geogrid and modular blocks preapproved before contract letting will be allowed in the construction of the wall.

The value of T_A for a specific geogrid shall be the lowest value as determined by the following two methods for each layer used.

1. The Ultimate Tensile Strength (T_{ult}) divided by the factors RF_{ID} , RF_{CR} , RF_D and FS .

Hence,

$$T_A = \frac{T_{ult}}{RF_{ID} \times RF_{CR} \times RF_D \times FS}$$

where:

T_{ult} = is the ultimate tensile strength of the reinforcement determined from wide width tensile tests (ASTM D4595) for geogrids, or rib tensile test (GRI:GG1), but at a strain rate of 10% per minute.

RF_{ID} = strength reduction factor to account for installation damage to the reinforcement. In no case shall RF_{ID} be less than 1.1.

RF_{CR} = strength reduction factor to prevent long-term creep rupture of the reinforcement. In no case shall RF_{CR} be less than 1.2.

RF_D = strength reduction factor to prevent rupture of the reinforcement due to chemical and biological degradation. In no case shall RF_D be less than 1.1.

FS = a global safety factor which accounts for uncertainties in structure geometry, fill properties, externally applied loads, overstress due to load nonuniformities, and uncertainties in long-term reinforcement strength shall be 1.5.

Values for RF_{ID} , RF_{CR} , and RF_D shall be determined from product specific test results.

Guidelines for how to determine RF_{ID} , RF_{CR} , and RF_D from product specific data are provided in FHWA Publication No. FHWA SA-96-071 "Mechanically Stabilized Earth Walls and Reinforced Soil Slopes Design and Construction Guidelines" Appendix B, and in FHWA Publication No. FHWA SA-96-072 "Corrosion/Degradation of Soil Reinforcements for Mechanically Stabilized Earth Walls and Reinforced Soil Slopes".

2. The geogrid connection load (T_B) divided by the factor $FS = 1.5$. Hence,

$$T_A = \frac{T_B}{FS}$$

The Geogrid Connection Load (T_B) is defined as the maximum tension load which may be developed in a geogrid reinforcement layers which will result in no more than 0.75 inches of deformation. This value shall be determined from tests conducted on the same facing blocks and grids as proposed for the wall and shall cover a range of overburden pressures comparable to those anticipated in the proposed wall. The value of T_B for any specific layer shall be determined for the overburden pressure applied to that specific layer. The test shall be conducted on grid samples at least 8 inches wide and at a rate of elongation not exceeding 0.05 inches per minute. The geogrid shall remain normal to the block face during loading. The Contractor shall provide to the Engineer all load test data used to determine the value of T_B .

The Contractor shall submit the following items for the review and acceptance of the Engineer.

1. The Allowable Reinforcement Tension Load (T_A) for the geogrid to be supplied.
2. The values of T_{ult} , RF_{ID} , RF_{CR} , RF_D and T_B used to determine T_A .

Work on the wall shall not begin until the Engineer accepts these submittals.

Galvanized Metal Reinforcement: In lieu of polymeric geogrid earth reinforcement, galvanized metal reinforcement may be used. Design and materials shall be in accordance with Section 5.8.6.1.1 of the current AASHTO Specifications.

Connectors: Pins, rods, clips, or other devices used to develop mechanical interlock between facing unit block layers shall be manufactured from corrosion resistant materials. The Contractor shall furnish documentation which establishes and substantiates the design life of such devices.

Backfill Materials: Wall Backfill, Type A, shall comply with the requirements for Coarse Aggregate No. 1 as given in 501.2.5.4.4 of the WisDOT Standard Specifications. All backfill placed within a zone from the base of the leveling pad to the top of the final layer of wall facing units and within 1 foot behind the back face

of the wall shall be Wall Backfill, Type A. This includes all material used to fill openings in the wall facing units.

Wall Backfill, Type B, shall comply with the requirements for Grade 1 Granular Backfill as contained in 209.2.2 of the WisDOT Standard Specifications. All backfill placed in a zone extending horizontally from 1 foot behind the back face of the wall to 1 foot beyond the end of the reinforcement and extending vertically from the base of the leveling pad to the top of the final layer of all facing units shall be Wall Backfill, Type B.

All backfill used within the reinforced zone shall have a pH of 4.5 to 10 as determined by AASHTO Procedure T-289. In addition to the above, backfill used on walls with metallic reinforcement shall have a chloride content of less than 100 parts per million as determined by AASHTO Procedure T-291, sulfates of less than 200 parts per million as determined by AASHTO Procedure T-290, and an electrical resistivity greater than 3000 ohms per centimeter as determined by AASHTO Procedure T-288. Prior to placement of the backfill, the Contractor shall obtain and furnish to the Engineer certified test results that the backfill material complies with the requirements of this specification. An independent certified laboratory shall perform all testing.

All other backfill materials required to finish the wall and restore the ground surface may be selected material available on the project, which meets the Engineer's approval.

CONSTRUCTION METHODS

After completion of excavation, the Engineer will inspect the site and determine if the foundation is adequate for the intended loads. The Engineer shall be allowed two working days to perform the inspection.

The wall facing units shall be placed in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions to the lines, elevations, batter, and tolerances as shown on the plans. The initial layer of facing units shall be centered on the leveling pad, leveled and brought to proper alignment. Formed voids or openings in the facing units shall be filled with Wall Backfill, Type A. Each layer of facing units shall be swept clean of all debris before the next layer of facing units is placed.

All pins, rods, clips, or other devices used to develop mechanical interlock between facing unit layers shall be installed in accordance with the manufacturer's directions. Wall units, which are cracked, chipped, or unsightly, will be rejected by the Engineer.

All excavation for the Mechanically Stabilized Earth Modular Block Wall shall conform to Section 206 of the WisDOT Standard Specifications. At the end of each working day, the Contractor shall provide good temporary drainage such that the backfill shall not become contaminated with run-off soil or water if it should rain. No materials or large equipment shall be stockpiled or stored within 10 feet of the front face of the wall.

Backfill: Materials shall be placed in the areas as indicated on the plans and as detailed in this specification. Backfill lifts shall be no more than 8-inches in depth. Backfilling shall closely follow erection of each course of wall facing units. Compaction of Wall Backfill Type A shall be accomplished by at least three passes of lightweight manually operated compaction equipment acceptable to the Engineer.

Wall Backfill Type B shall be compacted as specified in Subsection 207.3.6 of the WisDOT Standard Specifications. For walls with a maximum height of any portion greater than 5 feet, Wall Backfill Type B shall be compacted to 95% of maximum density as determined by AASHTO T-99, Method C. Compaction testing shall be performed by the Contractor. Testing shall be conducted at a minimum frequency of 1 test per 2-foot layer per 200 feet of wall, or major portion thereof. Documentation of the results of all compaction

testing shall be delivered to the Engineer at the time of testing. The City Of Madison may perform quality control compaction tests on walls less than 5 ft. tall to ensure compliance with Subsection 207.3.6 of the WisDOT Standard Specifications.

Backfilling operations shall be conducted in such a manner as to prevent damage or misalignment of the wall facing units, soil reinforcement, or other wall components. Any such damage or misalignment shall be corrected at the Contractor's expense as directed by the Engineer. A field representative of the wall supplier shall be available during wall construction to provide technical assistance to the Contractor and the Engineer.

No tracked or wheeled equipment may operate on the backfill within 3 feet from the back face of modular blocks. The Engineer may order the removal of any large or heavy equipment, which may cause damage, or misalignment of the wall facing units.

Soil Reinforcement: Soil reinforcement shall be placed at the positions and to the lengths as indicated on the accepted shop drawings. Backfill materials below the reinforcement layer shall be compacted and leveled prior to reinforcement placement. Backfill placement over the positioned soil reinforcement elements shall not cause damage or misalignment of these elements. Any such damage or misalignment shall be corrected as directed by the Engineer. No wheeled or tracked equipment shall be allowed to operate directly on the soil reinforcement. A minimum cover of 6 inches is required before such operation is allowed.

Geogrid Layers: Geogrid material shall be placed and anchored between wall unit layers in the same manner as used to determine the Geogrid Connection Load (T_B). The grid material shall be placed so that the machine direction of the grid is perpendicular to the wall face. Each grid layer shall be continuous throughout the lengths indicated on the plans. Grid strips shall be joined with straps, rings, hooks or other mechanical devices to prevent movement during backfilling operations. Prior to placing backfill on the grid, the grids shall be pulled taut and held in position with pins, stakes or other methods approved by the Engineer.

Steel layers: Steel reinforcement shall be placed full width in one piece as shown on the plans. No splicing will be allowed. Elements shall be maintained in position during backfilling.

METHOD OF MEASUREMENT

Mechanically Stabilized Earth Modular Block Wall shall be measured by the square foot of face on a vertical plane between the top of the leveling pad and a line indicating the top of wall including wall cap or copings as required and shown on the plans. Unless ordered by the Engineer, wall area constructed above or below these limits will not be measured for payment. The total quantity will be the sum of the quantities for each wall.

BASIS OF PAYMENT

Mechanically Stabilized Earth Modular Block Wall, measured as provided above, will be paid for at the contract unit price per square foot, which shall be full compensation for supplying a design and shop drawings, site preparation, including all necessary excavation and disposal of surplus materials, supplying all necessary wall components to produce a functional system, construction of the retaining system, backfill, backfilling, compaction testing, and for furnishing all tools, labor, and equipment necessary to complete the work. Parapets, railings, and other items above the wall cap or coping will be paid for separately. Any required topsoil, fertilizer, seeding or sodding and mulch will be paid for separately.

BID ITEM 90002 – REPAIR EXISTING CONCRETE RETAINING WALL

DESCRIPTION

This special provision describes completion of the work necessary to repair the existing concrete retaining wall along the north edge of the University Avenue parking lot as described here and shown in the plans. Work required to repair the concrete retaining wall includes excavation, sawcutting, forming, supplying and placement of reinforcing steel and concrete necessary to repair the existing retaining wall. All work required to repair the existing concrete retaining wall shall be in accordance with Part III of the Standard Specifications, and the plans, details, and as hereinafter provided.

METHOD OF MEASUREMENT

Repair Concrete Retaining Wall shall be measured by the square foot of face on a vertical plane between the top of the footing and a line indicating the top of wall. Unless ordered by the Engineer, wall area constructed above or below these limits will not be measured for payment.

BASIS OF PAYMENT

Repair Concrete Retaining Wall, measured as provided above, will be paid for at the contract unit price per square foot, which shall be full compensation for site preparation, including all necessary excavation and disposal of surplus materials, supplying all necessary materials and equipment to produce a functional repair to the existing wall, backfill, backfilling, compaction testing, and for furnishing all tools, labor, and equipment necessary to complete the work. Any required topsoil, seeding and mulching will be paid for separately.

BID ITEM 90003 – TEXTURED AND COLORED CONCRETE SIDEWALK 5”

DESCRIPTION

This special provision describes furnishing and installing Textured and Colored 5-Inch Concrete Sidewalk, complete and accepted in place, including base materials, sealer and samples in accordance with Article 303 of the Standard Specifications, and the plans, details, and as hereinafter provided.

MATERIALS – GENERAL

At least fifteen working days prior to the start of textured and colored concrete installation, supply one 4 foot x 4-foot panel sample of the textured and colored concrete. Obtain approval from the Engineer for the final color and stamp pattern prior to placing any colored imprinted concrete in the field.

The sample shall become the property of the City of Madison upon completion of this project.

WATER EVAPORATIVE REDUCER (CON FILM)

Use a water evaporative reducer to hold in the bleed water for the dry shake color hardener application. The water evaporative reducer shall be Dayton Superior Sure Film (J-74), Master Builders Confilm, or equal as approved by the Engineer. It is recommended that the Contractor confirm the type of water evaporative reducer to be used with the manufacturer of color hardener.

DRY SHAKE COLOR HARDENER

Use Brickform Rafco Products color #700, Terra Cotta, dry shake color hardener.

RELEASE AGENT

Use Brickform Rafco Products color #300, Nutmeg powder release agent.

CURING COMPOUND

The curing compound shall meet the specifications of ASTM C 1315 Type I Class A clear non-yellowing curing compound.

IMPRINTING PATTERN

Use a 6" x 6" cobblestone pattern matching previous segments of East Washington Avenue.

CONSTRUCTION

An experienced Contractor who has installed a minimum of 30,000 square feet of colored and imprinted concrete shall install Textured and Colored 5-Inch Concrete Sidewalk. The Contractor shall submit written documentation of imprinted concrete work to the Engineer prior to the start of construction.

Apply water evaporative reducer per manufacturer's recommendations. Protect all adjoining areas of concrete. Finish concrete and apply dry shake color hardener in accordance to the manufacturer's recommendations. Hand-broadcast the color hardener uniformly across the concrete in two separate broadcasting operations (shakes). Apply two-thirds of the material in the first shake and without one-third for the second shake and final touch-up, as necessary. Apply the two shakes at 90 degrees to each other. The necessary moisture for wetting the color hardener must come from the concrete substrate. Adding water to the concrete surface to work in the dry shake color hardener is not permitted. Use a wood float for applying the dry shake color hardener unless the use of a wood float is in conflict with the manufacturer's recommendation.

Apply release agent in accordance to the manufacturer's recommendations.

Stamping method shall be in accordance to the manufacturer's specified methods. Check all depths of imprints by tool-to-tool surface leveling.

Perform tooling as stamping tools are removed after imprinting. Eliminate all squeeze joints between stamping tools, if any, with hand tools prior to concrete settings.

Remove excess release agent from the concrete seventy two (72) hours after placement using a stiff brush and a mild murataic acid solution (approximately 4 oz per 2.5 gallons water) to achieve desired color. Rinse and let dry. Apply curing compound at 350 SF/gal coverage rate or in accordance to manufacturer's recommendations to seal the concrete immediately after drying.

Joint the concrete in accordance with the standard specifications amended as follows: Saw joints such that the saw joint follows the concrete recess.

Textured and Colored 5-Inch Concrete Sidewalk shall match the visual appearance of the approved reference sample. Replace Textured and Colored 5-Inch Concrete Sidewalk not conforming to the reference sample at a Contractor expense.

METHOD OF MEASUREMENT

Textured and Colored 5-Inch Concrete Sidewalk shall be measured by the square feet of Textured and Colored 5-Inch Concrete Sidewalk installed and accepted.

BID ITEM 90030 – CONSTRUCTION SITE TRACKING CONTROL

DESCRIPTION

Work performed under this bid item shall include all labor, materials, and incidentals necessary to control sediment tracking off the construction site. Specific requirements will be determined by the Construction Engineer. Site requirements may include as necessary: a small, clear stone tracking pad (approximately 20'x10'), street sweeping, and application of polymer stabilization, or any combination of these. The purpose of this bid item is to provide the Contractor and the Construction Engineer the means to mitigate and control off-site tracking of sediment from this small construction site. Any clear stone required to meet the directives of the Construction Engineer shall be considered incidental to this bid item.

METHOD OF MEASUREMENT

Construction Site Tracking Control shall be measured as a lump sum.

BASIS OF PAYMENT

Construction Site Tracking Control shall be measured as described above, which shall be considered full compensation for all work, materials, and incidentals to complete the work as described above.

BID ITEM 90031 – BIORETENTION BASIN

DESCRIPTION

Work under this item shall include: all work (including but not limited to: excavation, removal, and disposal of existing material, provision and placement of engineered material) and materials (including but not limited to 3-inch clear stone, filter fabric, engineered fill, light riprap and mulch), labor, and incidentals required to construct the bioretention system meeting the sizes, locations, specifications, and detail drawings contained in this document and in the plan set.

The Contractor shall review the detail drawings for each system in detail. The size of the bioretention basin is specific as is the means of providing stormwater to the system. This item does not include planting of the bioretention systems. Planting will be completed by others during the summer of 2012.

Specifically included are the following:

- 1) Excavation, removal and disposal off site, at a location provided by the Contractor, of existing material to the bottom of bio-retention system grade shown on the detail drawings.
- 2) Standard excavation shall begin at the outer polygon shown on the detail drawings and shall be on a continuous slope from the existing elevation to the finish horizontal location and elevation as depicted by the inner polygon. This inner polygon represents the bottom (or effective infiltration area of the bioretention system). Excavation below finish grade and replacement of existing material with engineered fill and clear stone is required only below the inner polygon. Excavation below finish grade inside the inner polygon shall consist of five (5) feet of excavation below the finish grade shown on the detail drawings. This volume shall then be filled with two (2) feet of 3-inch clear stone, followed by three (3) feet of engineered fill (meeting the specifications below) to

the finish grade noted on the detail. Three inches of wood mulch shall be added above the finish elevations noted on the details.

- 3) All ULO's needed to construct each bioretention; there are utilities (gas, sanitary & water) near this feature. All work necessary to locate and work around these utilities is included in the price for these items. If any utility is located within the excavation depths of the clear stone or engineered fill, the Contractor shall excavate with caution and use proper construction methods. The Contractor shall install Rock Shield around the existing utility to provide protection which shall be incidental to this item.
- 4) Provision and proper placement of all required 3-inch clear stone, which shall be the foundation for the bioretention basin.
- 5) Provision and placement of Type HR filter fabric. The fabric shall be placed between the clear stone and engineered fill, and between the clear stone and native soil, as shown on the detail drawing. Filter fabric shall be placed according to manufacturer's instructions, including overlap instructions.
- 6) Provision and placement of engineered fill as called out on the detail drawing. Fill materials shall meet the specifications below.
- 7) All finishing work required to provide a finished engineered soil layer prior to placement of mulch.
- 8) Provision and placement of wood mulch cover. Mulch shall be placed on top of engineered fill and above the finish grade noted in the plan set and shall be placed immediately after finish grading is complete. Wood mulch available at the City of Madison brush processing facility is acceptable material. The Contractor shall coordinate the purchase and supply of this mulch.
- 9) Construction of the bioretention basin outlet structure and flume shall be paid for under separate bid items.

ENGINEERED SOIL SHALL MEET THE FOLLOWING:

- 1) The planting mixture shall consist of a mixture of sand, compost and topsoil. The mix shall be designed to approximate the following percentages, by volume.

Engineered Soil Component	% Composition by Volume
Sand	45-55%
Topsoil	10-15%
Compost	30%-50%

- 2) The sand component shall at a minimum meet the following criteria:
 - a. Crushed & screened sandstone
 - b. 100% passing a #4 sieve
 - c. Maximum of 5% passing a #200 sieve
- 3) **The topsoil component shall be a USDA classified sandy loam, loamy sand or loam texture. The topsoil component textural class shall be verified by a laboratory analysis or a professional acceptable to the jurisdiction having authority. The topsoil shall be pulverized prior to mixing with the other materials. No soil particle size over 1" diameter shall be accepted and will require removal of all material from the site and a new mix being provided.**
- 4) The compost component shall meet the requirements listed below:
 - a. Particle Size – 98% of the compost shall pass through a 0.75-inch screen.
 - b. Physical Contaminants – Less than 1% combined glass, metal and plastic.

- c. Organic Matter/Ash Content – At least 40% organic matter; less than 60% ash content.
 - d. Carbon to Nitrogen Ratio – 10-20:1 C:N ratio.
 - e. Ph – Between 6 and 8.
 - f. Soluble Salts – Electrical conductivity below 10 Ds m-1 (mmhos cm -1)
 - g. Moisture Content – Between 35% and 50% by weight.
 - h. Maturity – The compost shall be resistant to further decomposition and free of compounds, such as ammonia and organic acids, in concentrations toxic to plant growth.
 - i. Residual Seeds & Pathogens – Pathogens and noxious seeds shall be minimized.
 - j. Pathogens – The compost shall meet the Class A requirements for pathogens as specified in s. NR 204.07(6)(a), Wis. Adm. Code.
 - k. Other Chemical Contaminants – The compost shall meet the high quality pollutant concentrations as specified in s. NR 204.07(5)I, Wis. Adm. Code.
- 5) The engineered soil mix shall be free of rocks, stumps, roots, brush or **other material over 1 inch in diameter**. No other materials shall be mixed with the planting soil that may be harmful to plant growth or prove a hindrance to planting or maintenance.

METHOD OF MEASUREMENT

Bioretention Basin shall be measured as a lump sum for all work described above.

BASIS OF PAYMENT

Bioretention System shall be measured as described above which shall be full compensation for all work, materials and incidentals to complete the work as described above.

BID ITEM 90032 – CONCRETE FLUME

DESCRIPTION

Work performed under this bid item shall include all labor, materials, and incidentals necessary to construct a concrete flume as depicted on the plan set. The Contractor shall construct a curbed flume that ties into the curb and gutter of the parking lot, per the detail drawing. Any rebar or clear stone subgrade material required for construction of the flume shall be considered incidental to this bid item.

METHOD OF MEASUREMENT

Concrete Flume shall be measured as each flume completed in the field.

BASIS OF PAYMENT

Concrete Flume shall be measured as described above, which shall be considered full compensation for all work, materials, and incidentals to complete the work as described above.

BID ITEM 90033 – REMOVE ACCESS STRUCTURE CASTING

DESCRIPTION

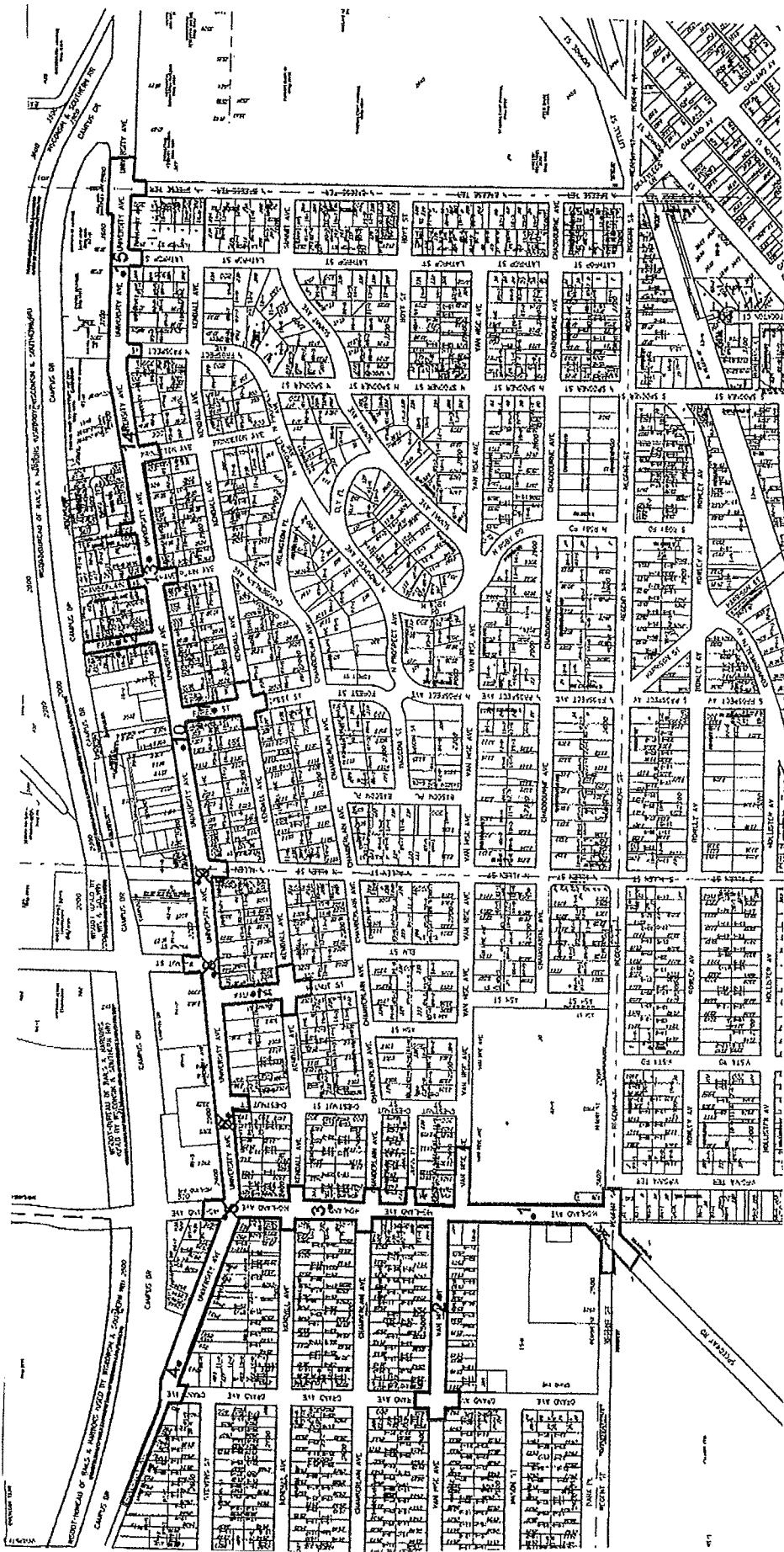
Work performed under this bid item shall include all labor, materials, and incidental required to remove the existing access structure casting, as noted on the plan set. The void in the access structure shall be covered with a 1” steel plate of adequate size so that there is a minimum of 6 inches of overlap on all sides of the void. The plate shall be bolted in place with galvanized steel bolts a minimum of 1/2-inch in diameter and adequate length.

METHOD OF MEASUREMENT

Remove Access Structure Casting shall be measured as each for all work described above.

BASIS OF PAYMENT

Remove Access Structure Casting shall be measured as described above, which shall be considered full compensation for all work, materials, and incidentals to complete the work as described above.

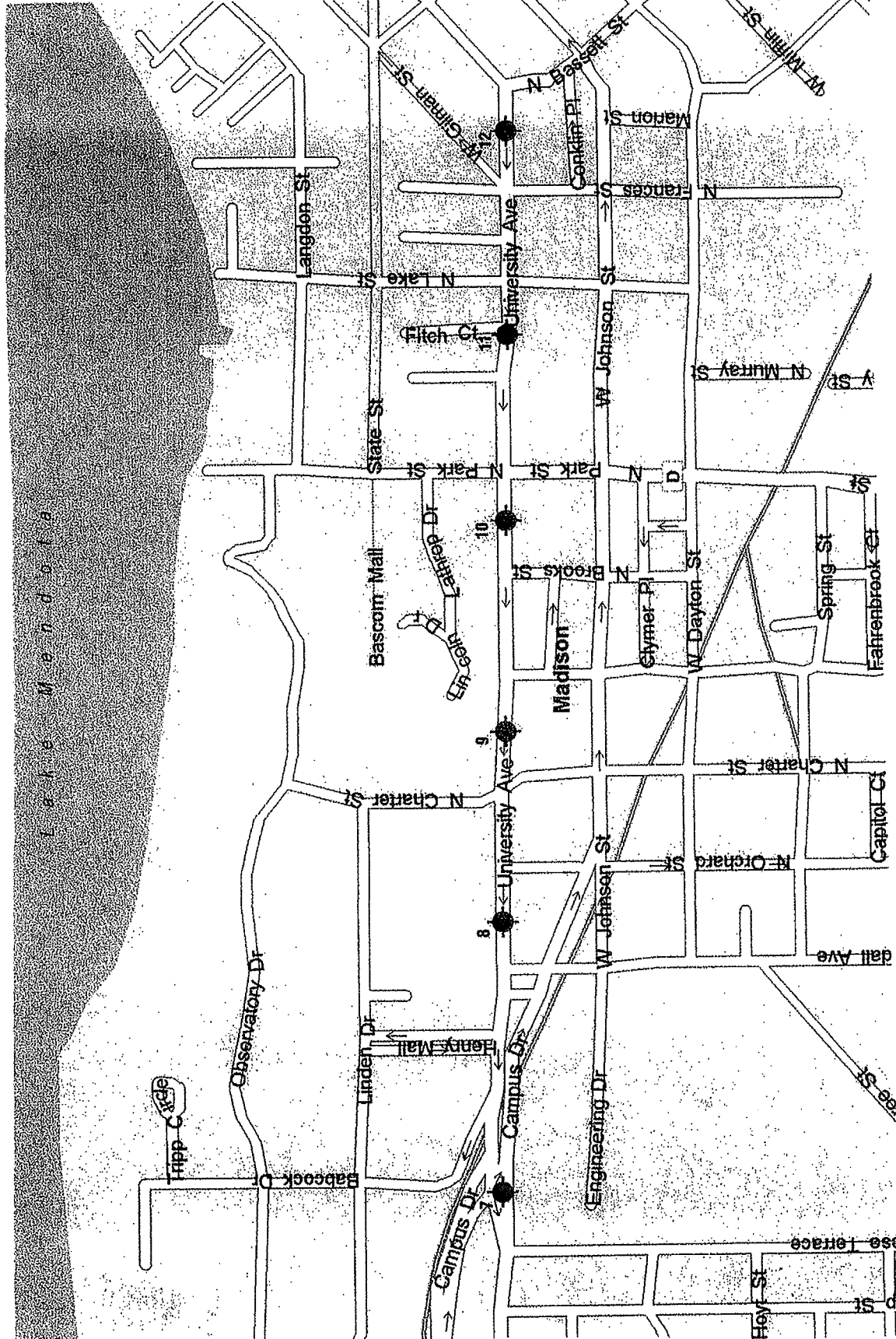

SECTION G: AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT made this _____ day of _____ in the year Two Thousand and Twelve between _____ hereinafter called the Contractor, and the City of Madison, Wisconsin, hereinafter called the City.

WHEREAS, the Common Council of the said City of Madison under the provisions of a resolution adopted _____, _____, and by virtue of authority vested in the said Council, has awarded to the Contractor the work of performing certain construction.

NOW, THEREFORE, the Contractor and the City, for the consideration hereinafter named, agree as follows:

1. **Scope of Work.** The Contractor shall, perform the construction, execution and completion of the following listed complete work or improvement in full compliance with the Plans, Specifications, Standard Specifications, Supplemental Specifications, Special Provisions and contract; perform all items of work covered or stipulated in the proposal; perform all altered or extra work; and shall furnish, unless otherwise provided in the contract, all materials, implements, machinery, equipment, tools, supplies, transportation, and labor necessary to the prosecution and completion of the work or improvements:

2. **Completion Date/Contract Time.** Construction work must begin within seven (7) calendar days after the date appearing on mailed written notice to do so shall have been sent to the Contractor and shall be carried on at a rate so as to secure full completion SEE SPECIAL PROVISIONS, the rate of progress and the time of completion being essential conditions of this Agreement.
3. **Contract Price.** The City shall pay to the Contractor at the times, in the manner and on the conditions set forth in said specifications, the sum of _____ (\$ _____) Dollars being the amount bid by such Contractor and which was awarded to him/her as provided by law.
4. **Wage Rates for Employees of Public Works Contractors**

General and Authorization. The Contractor shall compensate its employees at the prevailing wage rate in accordance with section 66.0903, Wis. Stats., DWD 290 of the Wisconsin Administrative Code and as hereinafter provided.

“Public Works” shall include building or work involving the erection, construction, remodeling, repairing or demolition of buildings, parking lots, highways, streets, bridges, sidewalks, street lighting, traffic signals, sanitary sewers, water mains and appurtenances, storm sewers, and the grading and landscaping of public lands.

“Building or work” includes construction activity as distinguished from manufacturing, furnishing of materials, or servicing and maintenance work, except for the delivery of mineral aggregate such as sand, gravel, bituminous asphaltic concrete or stone which is incorporated into

the work under contract with the City by depositing the material directly in final place from transporting vehicle.

“Erection, construction, remodeling, repairing” means all types of work done on a particular building or work at the site thereof in the construction or development of the project, including without limitation, erecting, construction, remodeling, repairing, altering, painting, and decorating, the transporting of materials and supplies to or from the building or work done by the employees of the Contractor, Subcontractor, or Agent thereof, and the manufacturing or furnishing of materials, articles, supplies or equipment on the site of the building or work, by persons employed by the Contractor, Subcontractor, or Agent thereof.

“Employees working on the project” means laborers, workers, and mechanics employed directly upon the site of work.

“Laborers, Workers, and Mechanics” include preapprentices, helpers, trainees, learners and properly registered and indentured apprentices but exclude clerical, supervisory, and other personnel not performing manual labor.

Establishment of Wage Rates. The Department of Public Works shall periodically obtain a current schedule of prevailing wage rates from DWD. The schedule shall be used to establish the City of Madison Prevailing Wage Rate Schedule for Public Works Construction (prevailing wage rate). The Department of Public Works may include known increases to the prevailing wage rate which can be documented and are to occur on a future specific date. The prevailing wage rate shall be included in public works contracts subsequently negotiated or solicited by the City. Except for known increases contained within the schedule, the prevailing wage rate shall not change during the contract. The approved wage rate is attached hereto.

Workforce Profile. The Contractor shall, at the time of signature of the contract, notify the City Engineer in writing of the names and classifications of all the employees of the Contractor, Subcontractors, and Agents proposed for the work. In the alternative, the Contractor shall submit in writing the classifications of all the employees of the Contractor, Subcontractors and Agents and the total number of hours estimated in each classification for the work. This workforce profile(s) shall be reviewed by the City Engineer who may, within ten (10) days, object to the workforce profile(s) as not being reflective of that which would be required for the work. The Contractor may request that the workforce profile, or a portion of the workforce profile, be submitted after the signature of the contract but at least ten (10) days prior to the work commencing. Any costs or time loss resulting from modifications to the workforce profile as a result of the City Engineer’s objections shall be the responsibility of the Contractor.

Payrolls and Records. The Contractor shall keep weekly payroll records setting forth the name, address, telephone number, classification, wage rate and fringe benefit package of all the employees who work on the contract, including the employees of the Contractor’s subcontractors and agents. Such weekly payroll records must include the required information for all City contracts and all other contracts on which the employee worked during the week in which the employee worked on the contract. The Contractor shall also keep records of the individual time each employee worked on the project and for each day of the project. Such records shall also set forth the total number of hours of overtime credited to each such employee for each day and week and the amount of overtime pay received in that week. The records shall set forth the full weekly wages earned by each employee and the actual hourly wage paid to the employee.

The Contractor shall submit the weekly payroll records, including the records of the Contractor’s subcontractors and agents, to the City Engineer for every week that work is being done on the

contract. The submittal shall be within twenty-one (21) calendar days of the end of the Contractor's weekly pay period.

Employees shall receive the full amounts accrued at the time of the payment, computed at rates not less than those stated in the prevailing wage rate and each employee's rate shall be determined by the work that is done within the trade or occupation classification which should be properly assigned to the employee.

An employee's classification shall not be changed to a classification of a lesser rate during the contract. If, during the term of the contract, an employee works in a higher pay classification than the one which was previously properly assigned to the employee, then that employee shall be considered to be in the higher pay classification for the balance of the contract, receive the appropriate higher rate of pay, and she/he shall not receive a lesser rate during the balance of the contract. For purposes of clarification, it is noted that there is a distinct difference between working in a different classification with higher pay and doing work within a classification that has varying rates of pay which are determined by the type of work that is done within the classification. For example, the classification "Operating Engineer" provides for different rates of pay for various classes of work and the Employer shall compensate an employee classified as an "Operating Engineer" based on the highest class of work that is done in one day. Therefore, an "Operating Engineer's" rate may vary on a day to day basis depending on the type of work that is done, but it will never be less than the base rate of an "Operating Engineer". Also, as a matter of clarification, it is recognized that an employee may work in a higher paying classification merely by chance and without prior intention, calculation or design. If such is the case and the performance of the work is truly incidental and the occurrence is infrequent, inconsequential and does not serve to undermine the single classification principle herein, then it may not be required that the employee be considered to be in the higher pay classification and receive the higher rate of pay for the duration of the contract. However, the Contractor is not precluded or prevented from paying the higher rate for the limited time that an employee performs work that is outside of the employee's proper classification.

Questions regarding an employee's classification, rate of pay or rate of pay within a classification, shall be resolved by reference to the established practice that predominates in the industry and on which the trade or occupation rate/classification is based. Rate of pay and classification disputes shall be resolved by relying upon practices established by collective bargaining agreements and guidelines used in such determination by appropriate recognized trade unions operating within the City of Madison.

The Contractor, its Subcontractors and Agents shall submit to interrogation regarding compliance with the provisions of this ordinance.

Mulcting of the employees by the Contractor, Subcontractor, and Agents on Public Works contracts, such as by kickbacks or other devices, is prohibited. The normal rate of wage of the employees of the Contractor, Subcontractor, and Agents shall not be reduced or otherwise diminished as a result of payment of the prevailing wage rate on a public works contract.

Hourly contributions. Hourly contributions shall be determined in accordance with the prevailing wage rate and with DWD. 290.01(10), Wis. Admin. Code.

Apprentices and Subjourneypersons. Apprentices and subjourneypersons performing work on the project shall be compensated in accordance with the prevailing wage rate and with DWD 290.02, and 290.025, respectively, Wis. Admin. Code.

Straight Time Wages. The Contractor may pay straight time wages as determined by the prevailing wage rate and DWD 290.04, Wis. Admin. Code.

Overtime Wages. The Contractor shall pay overtime wages as required by the prevailing wage rate and DWD 290.05, Wis. Admin. Code.

Posting of Wage Rates and Hours. A clearly legible copy of the prevailing wage rate, together with the provisions of Sec. 66.0903(10)(a) and (11)(a), Wis. Stats., shall be kept posted in at least one conspicuous and easily accessible place at the project site by the Contractor and such notice shall remain posted during the full time any laborers, workers or mechanics are employed on the contract.

Evidence of Compliance by Contractor. Upon completion of the contract, the Contractor shall file with the Department of Public Works an affidavit stating:

- a. That the Contractor has complied fully with the provisions and requirements of Sec. 66.0903(3), Wis. Stats., and Chapter DWD 290, Wis. Admin. Code; the Contractor has received evidence of compliance from each of the agents and subcontractors; and the names and addresses of all of the subcontractors and agents who worked on the contract.
- b. That full and accurate records have been kept, which clearly indicate the name and trade or occupation of every laborer, worker or mechanic employed by the Contractor in connection with work on the project. The records shall show the number of hours worked by each employee and the actual wages paid therefor; where these records will be kept and the name, address and telephone number of the person who will be responsible for keeping them. The records shall be retained and made available for a period of at least three (3) years following the completion of the project of public works and shall not be removed without prior notification to the municipality.

Evidence of Compliance by Agent and Subcontractor. Each agent and subcontractor shall file with the Contractor, upon completion of their portion of the work on the contract an affidavit stating that all the provisions of Sec. 66.0903(3), Wis. Stats., have been fully complied with and that full and accurate records have been kept, which clearly indicate the name and trade or occupation of every laborer, worker or mechanic employed by the Contractor in connection with work on the project. The records shall show the number of hours worked by each employee and the actual wages paid therefor; where these records shall be kept and the name, address and telephone number of the person who shall be responsible for keeping them. The records shall be retained and made available for a period of at least three (3) years following the completion of the project of public works and shall not be removed without prior notification to the municipality.

Failure to Comply with the Prevailing Wage Rate. If the Contractor fails to comply with the prevailing wage rate, she/he shall be in default on the contract.

5. **Affirmative Action.** In the performance of the services under this Agreement the Contractor agrees not to discriminate against any employee or applicant because of race, religion, marital status, age, color, sex, disability, national origin or ancestry, income level or source of income, arrest record or conviction record, less than honorable discharge, physical appearance, sexual orientation, political beliefs, or student status. The Contractor further agrees not to discriminate against any subcontractor or person who offers to subcontract on this contract because of race, religion, color, age, disability, sex or national origin.

The Contractor agrees that within thirty (30) days after the effective date of this agreement, the Contractor will provide to the City Affirmative Action Division certain workforce utilization statistics, using a form to be furnished by the City.

If the contract is still in effect, or if the City enters into a new agreement with the Contractor, within one year after the date on which the form was required to be provided, the Contractor will provide updated workforce information using a second form, also to be furnished by the City. The second form will be submitted to the City Affirmative Action Division no later than one year after the date on which the first form was required to be provided.

The Contractor further agrees that, for at least twelve (12) months after the effective date of this contract, it will notify the City Affirmative Action Division of each of its job openings at facilities in Dane County for which applicants not already employees of the Contractor are to be considered. The notice will include a job description, classification, qualifications and application procedures and deadlines. The Contractor agrees to interview and consider candidates referred by the Affirmative Action Division if the candidate meets the minimum qualification standards established by the Contractor, and if the referral is timely. A referral is timely if it is received by the Contractor on or before the date started in the notice.

Articles of Agreement

Article I

The Contractor shall take affirmative action in accordance with the provisions of this contract to insure that applicants are employed, and that employees are treated during employment without regard to race, religion, color, age, marital status, disability, sex or national origin and that the employer shall provide harassment free work environment for the realization of the potential of each employee. Such action shall include, but not be limited to, the following: employment, upgrading, demotion or transfer, recruitment or recruitment advertising, layoff or termination, rates of pay or other forms of compensation and selection for training including apprenticeship insofar as it is within the control of the Contractor. The Contractor agrees to post in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants notices to be provided by the City setting out the provisions of the nondiscrimination clauses in this contract.

Article II

The Contractor shall in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the Contractor state that all qualified or qualifiable applicants will be employed without regard to race, religion, color, age, marital status, disability, sex or national origin.

Article III

The Contractor shall send to each labor union or representative of workers with which it has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding a notice to be provided by the City advising the labor union or worker's representative of the Contractor's equal employment opportunity and affirmative action commitments. Such notices shall be posted in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment.

Article V

The Contractor agrees that it will comply with all provisions of the Affirmative Action Ordinance of the City of Madison, including the contract compliance requirements. The Contractor agrees to

submit the model affirmative action plan for public works contractors in a form approved by the Director of Affirmative Action.

Article VI

The Contractor will maintain records as required by Section 39.02(9)(f) of the Madison General Ordinances and will provide the City Affirmative Action Division with access to such records and to persons who have relevant and necessary information, as provided in Section 39.02(9)(f). The City agrees to keep all such records confidential, except to the extent that public inspection is required by law.

Article VII

In the event of the Contractor's or subcontractor's failure to comply with the Equal Employment Opportunity and Affirmative Action Provisions of this contract or Section 39.03 and 39.02 of the Madison General Ordinances, it is agreed that the City at its option may do any or all of the following:

1. Cancel, terminate or suspend this Contract in whole or in part.
2. Declare the Contractor ineligible for further City contracts until the Affirmative Action requirements are met.
3. Recover on behalf of the City from the prime Contractor 0.5 percent of the contract award price for each week that such party fails or refuses to comply, in the nature of liquidated damages, but not to exceed a total of five percent (5%) of the contract price, or five thousand dollars (\$5,000), whichever is less. Under public works contracts, if a subcontractor is in noncompliance, the City may recover liquidated damages from the prime Contractor in the manner described above. The preceding sentence shall not be construed to prohibit a prime Contractor from recovering the amount of such damage from the non-complying subcontractor.

Article VIII

The Contractor shall include the above provisions of this contract in every subcontract so that such provisions will be binding upon each subcontractor. The Contractor shall take such action with respect to any subcontractor as necessary to enforce such provisions, including sanctions provided for noncompliance.

Article IX

The Contractor shall allow the maximum feasible opportunity to small business enterprises to compete for any subcontracts entered into pursuant to this contract.

APPRENTICES:	Pay apprentices a percentage of the applicable journey person's hourly basic rate of pay and hourly fringe benefit contributions specified in this determination. Obtain the appropriate percentage from each apprentice's contract or indenture.
SUBJOURNEY:	Subjourney wage rates may be available for some of the trades or occupations indicated below with the exception of laborers, truck drivers and heavy equipment operators. Any employer interested in using a subjourney classification on this project MUST complete Form ERD-10880 and request the applicable wage rate from the Department of Workforce Development PRIOR to using the subjourney worker on this project.

This document **MUST BE POSTED** by the **CONTRACTING AGENCY** in at least one conspicuous and easily accessible place on **the site of the project**. A local governmental unit may post this document at the place normally used to post public notices if there is no common site on the project. This document **MUST** remain posted during the entire time any worker is employed on the project and **MUST** be physically incorporated into the specifications and all contracts and subcontracts. The following statutory provisions apply to local governmental unit projects of public works and are set forth below pursuant to the requirements of s. 66.0903(8), Stats.

s. 66.0903 (1) (f) & s. 103.49 (1) (c) "PREVAILING HOURS OF LABOR" for any trade or occupation in any area means 10 hours per day and 40 hours per week and may not include any hours worked on a Saturday or Sunday or on any of the following holidays:

1. January 1.
2. The last Monday in May.
3. July 4.
4. The first Monday in September.
5. The 4th Thursday in November.
6. December 25.
7. The day before if January 1, July 4 or December 25 falls on a Saturday.
8. The day following if January 1, July 4 or December 25 falls on a Sunday.

s. 66.0903 (10) RECORDS; INSPECTION; ENFORCEMENT.

(a) Each contractor, subcontractor, or contractor's or subcontractor's agent performing work on a project of public works that is subject to this section shall keep full and accurate records clearly indicating the name and trade or occupation of every person performing the work described in sub. (4) and an accurate record of the number of hours worked by each of those persons and the actual wages paid for the hours worked.

s. 66.0903 (11) LIABILITY AND PENALTIES.

- (a) 1. Any contractor, subcontractor, or contractor's or subcontractor's agent who fails to pay the prevailing wage rate determined by the department under sub. (3) or who pays less than 1.5 times the hourly basic rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of the prevailing hours of labor is liable to any affected employee in the amount of his or her unpaid wages or his or her unpaid overtime compensation and in an additional amount as liquidated damages as provided under subd. 2., 3., whichever is applicable.
2. If the department determines upon inspection under sub. (10) (b) or (c) that a contractor, subcontractor, or contractor's or subcontractor's agent has failed to pay the prevailing wage rate determined by the department under sub. (3) or has paid less than 1.5 times the hourly basic rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of the prevailing hours of labor, the department shall order the contractor to pay to any affected employee the amount of his or her unpaid wages or his or her unpaid overtime compensation and an additional amount equal to 100 percent of the amount of those unpaid wages or that unpaid overtime compensation as liquidated damages within a period specified by the department in the order.
3. In addition to or in lieu of recovering the liability specified in subd. 1. as provided in subd. 2., any employee for and in behalf of that employee and other employees similarly situated may commence an action to recover that liability in any court of competent jurisdiction. If the court finds that a contractor, subcontractor, or contractor's or subcontractor's agent has failed to pay the prevailing wage rate determined by the department under sub. (3) or has paid less than 1.5 times the hourly basic rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of the prevailing hours of labor, the court shall order the contractor, subcontractor, or agent to pay to any affected employee the amount of his or her unpaid wages or his or her unpaid overtime compensation and an additional amount equal to 100 percent of the amount of those unpaid wages or that unpaid overtime compensation as liquidated damages.
5. No employee may be a party plaintiff to an action under subd. 3. unless the employee consents in writing to become a party and the consent is filed in the court in which the action is brought. Notwithstanding s. 814.04 (1), the court shall, in addition to any judgment awarded to the plaintiff, allow reasonable attorney fees and costs to be paid by the defendant.

BUILDING OR HEAVY CONSTRUCTION

Includes sheltered enclosures with walk-in access for the purpose of housing persons, employees, machinery, equipment or supplies and non-sheltered work such as canals, dams, dikes, reservoirs, storage tanks, etc. A sheltered enclosure need not be "habitable" in order to be considered a building. The installation of machinery and/or equipment, both above and below grade level, does not change a project's character as a building. On-site grading, utility work and landscaping are included within this definition. Residential buildings of four (4) stories or less, agricultural buildings, parking lots and driveways are NOT included within this definition.
