West is 25.66 square miles and covers 364.7 miles of roadway	South is 9.09 square miles and covers 108.3 miles of roadway	Central is 3.82 square miles and covers 71.5 miles of roadway	East is 19.5 square miles and covers 256.6 miles of roadway	North is 17.87 square miles and covers 164.3 miles of roadway
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It requires 6 officers to staff 1 patrol beat, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

Officers work 8 hours a day, 6 days on, and 3 day off rotations.

Vacation, compensatory days, and attendance at state required trainings to maintain certification.

How we work

Most calls take two officers to respond.

An arrest takes two officers.

Arrests and major cases require immediate completion of reports.

Mission Statement

The mission of the Madison Police Department is to work in partnerships to create safer neighborhoods and preserve our special quality of life.

What kind of work do
these officers do?

Reactive, Proactive, and Coactive

Reactive

Responding to an incident, problem, or crime that has already occurred.

For officers, it is primarily responding to calls for service. For detectives, it is case follow up.

This has also been described as traditional policing or basic service.

Proactive

Activities that take place in anticipation of an incident, crime, or problem occurring.

Some of these strategies include: problem solving, crime prevention, and public education.

Some specific activities include crime suppression strategies (zero tolerance) and traffic enforcement.

Coactive

The relationship that exists between the police and citizen/stakeholders. This relationship exists on a relationship continuum.

A stakeholder is someone directly impacted by the problem or crime.

The continuum starts where citizens provide information to police and continue to full partnerships evolving into trust-based policing.

Community Oriented Policing (COP)

POP

Re-evaluation of an existing problem in an effort to find new and more effective ways to address the issue.

High value in:

- preventive responses**
- non-dependent on criminal justice system**
- engage other public agencies, community, and private sector**

U – uniform/description (description of person involved, color/type of clothes, license plate, make, model, and/or description of vehicle)

T – time (when did this occur, time and date)

E – equipment (what equipment did they have with them, if any)
