

**P.A. Permit** is required when adding amplified sound to your event, such as a DJ, Band, or karaoke.

Temporary Structure Permit is required when adding a tent, bouncey house, or temporary gazebo to your event.

Alcohol Permit is required when your event will serve alcohol in an alcohol-free park.

### **OUTDOOR GARDENS**

Olbrich's outdoor gardens showcase beautiful Midwest-hardy plants set in prairie style landscapes, creating breathtaking displays throughout the year. Visitors can experience the exquisite artistry and exotic culture of Thailand in Olbrich's Thai Pavilion and Garden. The Thai Pavilion is the only such structure in the continental United States. Olbrich's Rose Garden highlights innovative mixed borders of shrub roses and perennials. Other gardens include the Herb, Rock, Meadow, Sunken, Perennial, Rain and Wildflower Gardens.

### **BOLZ CONSERVATORY**

The Bolz Conservatory, a sunny glass pyramid, houses a diverse collection of tropical plants, fragrant flowers, a rushing waterfall, free-flying birds and blooming orchids year-round. The temperature in the conservatory is maintained between 65 and 80 degrees Fahrenheit (and may warm to 95 degrees on hot summer days) with a relative humidity above 60 percent year round. Escape to the tropics without leaving Madison!

- •Bike to the Gardens! Olbrich is located on the Capital City Bike Trail and a B-Cycle station is located in the parking lot, making Olbrich a short pedal-powered ride to many places in Madison.
- •Olbrich donates more than 500 pounds of produce from the Children's Kitchen Garden to Second Harvest Foodbank of Southern Wisconsin.

- •Have you noticed the Olbrich-inspired planters on State Street? Olbrich staff plants the container gardens on State Street and recently installed a Gravel Garden outside the Triangle Market. More Olbrich-inspired areas will pop up in Madison parks in 2013 as part of the Parks Beautification Project, so stay tuned!
- •Madison Gas and Electric (MGE) installed a 'Solar Sunflower' at the Gardens that contributes energy to the power grid and is a great solar demonstration project. Visit www.mge.com to get a live look at how much energy is produced by the solar sunflower.
- •Olbrich is accessible to everyone in our community the outdoor gardens are always free (donations appreciated) and the Bolz Conservatory is just \$2 per person and free to everyone on Wednesday & Saturday mornings from 10 a.m. to noon. 
### **GUIDED GARDEN STROLLS**

Madison Parks is proud to announce that we have the highest playground to resident ratio in the country, according to a report from the Trust for Public Land. The report considered the 100 most populous U.S. cities and Madison tops the playground chart with seven playgrounds per 10,000 residents. With a grand total of 164 playgrounds, there is sure to be a park near you to enjoy! Whether you're swinging on the monkey bars at Door Creek or climbing the rock wall at Thut Park, you can find playgrounds in all of our major parks. Try the brand new KaBoom! community-built equipment at Wirth Court for a weekend play date. Other great places to find playgrounds include: Wexford, Kennedy, Olive Jones and Olbrich. Don't forget, these are just a few of the places that offer playgrounds and finding one in your neighborhood is a walk in the park!

# Madison Parks Tops the Charts again this year!

Madison Parks works hard to make our city as beautiful and sustainable as possible. These efforts are recognized each year by numerous national city rankings. One of the most prestigious is the Trust for Public Lands City Park Facts; these rankings are a collection of statistics comparing the parks of America's 100 most populous cities. Madison has come out on top in many categories in 2012, continuing a legacy of scenic open spaces in this city. "Madison Parks takes great pride in helping preserve some of Madison's most beautiful spaces," says Kevin Briski, Parks Superintendent. "It is an honor to be recognized again this year by the Trust for Public Lands as one of the top cities nationwide."

Madison continues to dominate certain park categories, ranking #1 for number of playgrounds and number of basketball hoops per resident. In fact, Madison has almost 2 playgrounds more per 1,000 residents than the city that got second place. From Elver Park to Pilgram Park you can barely go around a corner in Madison without finding a unique playground and a sturdy basketball hoop. We are also continually improving our ranking in other categories, Madison jumped to #4 in the nation for number of off-leash dog parks per 1,000 residents, with plans to possibly open new parks in the coming year Madison is sure to continue to rise in this ranking as well. Don't forget to take Rover out to Demetral Park or Quann Park to enjoy these great doggie friendly facilities! Remember one dog park pass gives you access to all six Madison off leash dog parks.

It is not just our rankings in the Public Trust for Lands that makes Madison nationally recognized as an incredible city. With convenient bike lanes and scenic bike paths, it is not a surprise Madison is one of the most bikable cities in America! Madison was given 98 out of 100 for bikability by Walk Score for our 43 miles of bike paths and availability of bike lanes on city streets. In fact, in a 2012 Bicycling Magazine ranked Madison #6 nationwide for most bike friendly city. Never fear, even when winter is here! Madison has also been ranked in the top ten most bikable cities in winter. Madison Parks staff work quickly and efficiently to clear paths of snow for your commuting ease.

Will Rogers, the president of the Trust for Public Land, believes there cannot be a great city without a great park system. While we most certainly cannot take all the credit, the Parks Division is proud to be a part of what makes Madison such a vibrant and livable city.





# **Forest Hill Cemetery**

Although the cemetery was established by the city in 1858, its history goes back to approximately 900 to 1200 A.D. when it was a site where American Indians constructed effigy mounds to remember of their loved ones and to uphold the religious beliefs of their ancestors. Traditionally, they built many effigy mounds in the shape of various animals. The mound at Forest Hill, located on the southeast side, is in the shape of a goose.

Popular places for visitors are the two Civil War plots where both Union and Confederate soldiers are buried. In the section known as Confederate's Rest, 140 soldiers were laid to rest and in the plot marked for Union soldiers, 240 burials took place. Many veterans from the Spanish-American War as well as World War I were also laid to rest here.

The 140-acre plot is also the final resting ground for many prominent figures, not only locally but also nationally. Well-known and celebrated surnames like Olin, La Follette, Fairchild, Tenney, Olbrich and Vilas, among many others, are a part of the long lineage of important figures in Madison and beyond.

Disc golf, which has become one of the fastest growing sports in recent years, is fun for all and easy to learn! To play a round of disc golf is low cost, low impact exercise, and a great way to explore Madison's Parks. Disc golf courses are located at Hiestand Park, 4302 Milwaukee Street and Elver Park, 1250 McKenna Blvd. The Disc Golf Courses are open to the public. Hiestand Park Course is open year-round except during the early months of spring. Elver Park Course is open late spring through late fall.

Madison Parks requires a permit for players ages 17 and older. Full for kills ages 16 and under

# **DISC GOLF PERMITS - WHY THE CHANGE?**

The courses at Elver Park and Hiestand Park are showing the wear and tear of this increased usage. In order to improve the quality of the courses and the amenities such as benches, tee boxes, turf maintenance, a 'pay to play' permit will be required.

The disc golf permit fee will be used exclusively on disc golf course maintenance and improvements.

Daily: \$5.00 Annual: \$40.00 Permits are on sale at the kiosks at the courses, in the Madison Parks administration office, some retail vendors and on-line.







# **Organizing A Special Event**


If you're interested in hosting a special event, Madison is the perfect place for a celebration. As host to over 250 special events a year, Madison Parks' wide-ranging repertoire of special events from concerts to parades to athletic events has established the city as a popular setting for special events. When organizing a special event, it is important that the event organizer contact the Madison Parks Division to review the following:

- Determine if the event officially qualifies as a City of Madison Special Event
- Research the date of the proposed event
- Decide on the location and verify its availability
- Format an event plan, including a detailed budget outline
- Acquire the necessary permits for event
- Create a notification plan for impacted residents, merchants and alders
- Complete the appropriate Special Event packet application

# People for Parks-Volunteers

The People for Parks Program is designed for citizens to actively participate in their parks be either donating money or time. People for Parks has two components: volunteer program and People for Parks matching fund.

# **Volunteer Program**

Many individuals and groups of volunteers dedicate countless hours in one of our 260 parks on a one-time basis while others make an ongoing commitment to a specific park, project or event.

Volunteers can help out on a periodic basis at one our volunteer days including:

- Dog Park Clean Up Day
- Earth Day Challenge
- Take a Stake in the Lakes
- Days of Caring
- Special events such as Ride the Drive and Elver Park Fireworks
- Saturday projects in various parks

Many volunteers also make a more significant commitment to Madison Parks by participating in one of our volunteer programs.

# **Volunteer Programs**

- Adopt-a-Park: Volunteers agree to maintain a designated park, trail or open space for at least one year
- Adopt Ice Program: Volunteers maintain neighborhood ice rinks in the winter
- Flower Garden Volunteers: Volunteers maintain a flower garden in one of our parks
- Park Watch: Volunteers keep an eye on a park and report any problems or concerns

Volunteers help us do many things in our parks including weeding, invasive species removal, pruning or trimming, trash pickup and other beautification projects. Madison Parks volunteer registration forms, upcoming volunteer projects, and other details can be found on our website.

### **People for Parks Matching Program**

The People for Parks Matching Fund is a program for neighborhood associations or groups to participate in a capital improvement in their park. Madison Parks may match private donations up to a one-to-one level. Madison Parks staff work together with these groups to approve a project and determine the funding split between private and city resources. Projects funded through this program vary, but some examples are additional playground equipment, landscaping or sun shelters.

Formed in 2006, the Friends of Cherokee Marsh has maintained their pledge to protect, preserve and restore the beauty, value and health of the Cherokee Marsh and upper Yahara watershed. Their tireless advocacy and volunteer efforts have supported land acquisition, enhanced restoration efforts, and inspired pride in conservation parks and native wetlands. They've written numerous articles in the Northside News educating the public about the unique natural values of the Cherokee Marsh, and have organized numerous restoration projects. # ATHLETIC FACILITIES

From organized softball games to friendly tennis matches, Madison's athletic fields and facilities are popular places during the warm months.

The high-quality fields and facilities of Madison Parks draw in a variety of patrons and have helped to build and maintain a reputation as the perfect place to host everything from pickup games to league tournaments.

Conveniently, many fields and facilities are available on a first come, first served basis; however, there are several spaces that require a reservation. A reservation is required if you are hosting a tournament or want to begin a new league.

To reserve a field, call the Parks office in advance to find out what fields and facilities are available. Then follow the Madison Parks guidelines in order to secure the space of your choice. It is recommended that leagues requesting space on a regular basis submit a request no later than mid-January for the upcoming season. For one-time reservations, leagues should submit a request at least two weeks prior to their event. Detailed instructions for reservations, as well as a list of available fields and facilities, can be found at the Madison Parks website.






# Ride the Drive -Downtown, June 2, 2013 10am-3pm





Enveloped in an ambience that is both serene and breathtaking, Madison's diverse and expansive conservation parks play an important role in preserving the city's wildlife communities while serving as an excellent learning environment for all who visit.

Madison's innovative Conservation Parks Program began in 1971, and today, with over 1600 acres and 14 unique conservation parks, the program has become a staple in the city. These parks allow visitors and tourists the opportunity to experience unique environments and activities.

- Cherokee Marsh, located on Madison's eastside, Dane County's largest wetland area. Consisting of wetlands, fields, oak savannahs, two glacial drumlins, and restored prairies, Cherokee Marsh is a diverse habitat and serves as the site for many educational field trips throughout the year. Totaling 7.1 miles of trails, the park is equipped with observation decks, cross-country ski trails, boat launch sites and two Native American effigy mounds.
  - » Cherokee Marsh, North Unit, 6098 N. Sherman Dr.
  - » Cherokee Marsh, South Unit, 5002 School Rd.
  - » Cherokee Marsh, Mendota Unit, 104 W. Sauthoff Rd.
- Edna Taylor Conservation Park, 802 Femrite Drive, a marshy park, the perfect place for an environmental field trip. Trek 1.3 miles of trails and discover an ancient American Indian Effigy Mound, among other features.
- Elvehjem Sanctuary, 1314 Painted Post Dr., located within Elvehjem Park, is a red oak-basswood forest on a northwest facing hillside with exposed sandstone hedrock
- Heritage Sanctuary, 600 Meadowlark Dr., a peak trillium bloom in mid-May is unequaled. Under an oak forest canopy is a wildflower carpet more typical of a maple forest.
- **Heritage Prairie**, 5414 Queensbridge Dr., although grazed, a remnant of dry prairie persisted on a thin layer of soil over the rocky hillside.
- **Hiestand Woods,** 4302 Milwaukee St., large red oaks dominate this wooded park.
- **Kettle Pond,** 5805 Old Middleton Rd., a park that got its name from a glacier melting leaving many "kettle holes" in the area.
- **Knollwood Park,** 3334 Westview Ln., surrounded by many Black Oak trees, it also features a two-acre sand prairie.
- Owen Conservation Park, 6021 Old Sauk Rd., is a densely vegetated environment filled with a variety of plants from goldenrods to bluestems, to coneflowers and countless others resulting in beautiful layers of colors that change throughout the year.
- Paunack (A.O.) Park, 6399 Bridge Rd., features a gorgeous backdrop of Lake Monona and is located at the Yahara River outlet. A bike ride around Lake Monona is the perfect way to experience this east-side park.
- Prairie Ridge Conservation Park, 2406 Berkley Dr., a 52-acre area located on the city's southwest side, is a diverse environment that will soon be connected to the Ice Age Trail.
- Sandburg Woods, 2902 Independence Ln., a 20-acre park located next to Sandburg School.
- Stricker's Pond, 7214 Longmeadow Rd., is the perfect place for visitors to stay busy exploring the woods and restored grassland while also watching for migrating waterfowl.
- Turville Point Park, 1156 Olin Turville Ct., conveniently located near downtown, has a great backdrop of Lake Monona. This 65-acre park houses a variety of wildflowers as well as a 7-acre prairie.

# WALK WITH A DOC

In 2012, Madison Parks introduced an exciting new health and wellness walking series. Walk with a Doc is a free program for anyone interested in taking steps for their health by enjoying a refreshing, rejuvenating walk in the park. The organized walks will start in a Madison Park and will be led by a local doctor. The walks will be held at all times of the day: morning, afternoon, evening; weekday/weekends. The physicians, specialists and healthcare professionals will provide 5 minute talk at the beginning of the event about a health topic of their choice and then lead the walk and answer questions from participants. Each walk will be approximately 30-45 minutes.

# **Woof Madison Parks**

Madison's six off-leash and ten on-leash dog parks provide a great place for you and your furry friend to enjoy the outdoors.

All dogs are required to have an annual permit and valid municipal license to enter any public dog park in the City of Madison or surrounding communities. Permits are valid from January through December of the calendar year and are good for access into the six City of Madison off-leash dog parks, ten on-leash dog park areas, six Dane County parks and pet exercise areas in Middleton and Sun Prairie.





# #4 in Nation Woof!

Madison's off-leash dog parks are something to bark about! The **2012 City Park Facts** ranked Madison number four overall in off-leash dog parks per resident.







### **EMERALD ASH BORER**

This exotic beetle is a threat to our beautiful Ash trees. The Emerald Ash Borer is an exotic beetle that quickly spreads from tree to tree and eventually kills the trees it infests. EAB is metallic green and very small - about a ½ an inch long. As of May 2013, they have not been spotted in Madison, but they have been seen as close as Janesville. Know the signs and symptoms to help spot and prevent the spread of this bug!

## What can I do to help?

If you see any signs or symptoms contact the City of Madison Forestry section immediately. You can also help prevent the spread of the Emerald Ash Borer by only buying firewood from certified dealers and following firewood movement guidelines in Wisconsin.

The City of Madison Forestry Section has updated its Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) website. There are two new features on the website: www.cityofmadison.com/parks/eab

- Residents can enter their street address to find out if there is an ash street tree planted in front of their home or within the neighborhood
- Residents can email the Forestry Section directly to report a suspected EAB sighting. If you don't know what to look for the website has information about the pest and images for you to help you identify the Emerald Ash Borer.

# MADISON PARKS FORESTRY

The Forestry Section provides tree planting, trimming and maintenance for over 100,000 trees along Madison's 700 miles of city streets. In addition, the Forestry Section is responsible for hundreds of thousands of trees that are located in the city's parks, golf courses, cemetery, and greenways.

Forestry staff is trained to follow rigid safety standards. Whether planting a new tree or cleaning up after a major wind storm, the safety of the work, the public and property are never compromised.

The Madison Parks Forestry Section provides online resources to help you care for trees on your property. These resources include warnings about current pest outbreaks, proper tree care, and what to do with storm damaged trees.



In 2013, Madison was once again named a Tree City USA!! The National Arbor Foundation gives this award annually in cooperation with the USDA Forest Service. Madison has repeatedly been awarded the Tree City USA title due to our city's innovative urban forestry program.

In 2012 the Forestry section launched a new program called the Heritage Tree Program to foster appreciation and inspire awareness of the contribution of city owned street and park trees to the City's history and heritage. This program is a way for citizens to officially recognize special, significant, or cherished city owned trees in their community.







# **Winter Recreation**

As winter arrives, so does spectacular winter scenery, sledding, cross-country skiing, and skating at our 260 parks and over 6,000 acres of natural areas. We encourage individuals and families to celebrate winter's beauty and fun with a visit to one of our winter facilities for ice skating, skiing, snowshoeing or sledding. Madison Parks offer some terrific opportunities to get outside and enjoy a winter wonderland of exercise, scenery and fun.

# **CROSS COUNTRY SKIING**

Cross country skiing doesn't require hills and can be enjoyed on almost any snow-covered location. It's also easy to learn and offers an entire body aerobic workout. Madison Parks maintains over 18 miles of groomed cross-country ski trails at Elver Park, Odana Hills Golf Course, Monona Golf Course, Door Creek Park, Turville Woods, Owen Conservation Park and South Cherokee Marsh. Trails are available for skiers of all skill levels. A ski trail permit is needed at Elver Park, Odana Hills Golf Course and at all groomed Dane County Park trails. If you don't own skis, you can rent them at Elver Park and Odana Hills Golf Course.

### **ICE SKATING**

When winter settles in, lace up the skates or grab a hockey stick to take advantage of one of 12 outdoor rinks. Many offer separate rinks for general skating and recreational uses such as hockey, broomball and pond hockey. Some rinks have warming shelters, concessions, and skate rentals. Our Park crews are committed to providing the best rinks possible despite winter's unpredictable weather. Check our website for updated conditions.

### **SLEDDING**


Our sledding hills are great places to spend those snowy winter days. We have seven parks with sledding hills: Elver, Olbrich, Sycamore, Hiestand, Garner, Berkley and Warner Parks. At Elver Park we have lights and a snow making machine for the sledding hill, so we can create snow even when mother nature doesn't.

### **SNOWSHOEING**

Snowshoeing is a sport you can enjoy your first time out. It is a great way to get out and explore the scenic trails in our city. Anyone from young children to senior citizens can easily learn to snowshoe.

### FOUR PREMIER PARKS FOR WINTER FUN

Madison Parks maintains 4 premiere winter facilities that offer concessions, equipment rentals, and a warming shelter.

- **Tenney Park:** This picturesque location is a great place for ice skating and hockey seven days a week. It features a beautiful new shelter, fireplace, concessions, ice skate rentals, and lighted rinks.
- **Elver Park:** Elver Park offers ice skating, XC skiing, and sledding all with lights to keep the fun going into the evening. This is a great destination that has a warming shelter, concessions, ice skate rentals, XC ski equipment rentals, and a reservable room.
- **Vilas Park:** This central location offers ice skating on a lagoon and hockey rink and offers ice skate rentals, concessions, and lights for evening skating.
- *Odana Hills Golf Course*, 4635 Odana Rd., offers 5.7K of groomed ski trails for traditional and skate skiing. The clubhouse is open on weekends and serves as a warming shelter with XC ski rentals and concessions.
