WHAT'S NEW IN 2014

» Central Park Skate Park

Madison's very first skate park, which has been in the development phase for ten years, is finally set to break ground June 2014! The skate park will include a bowl, ramps and obstacles, and a "plaza" designed to mimic public concrete venues. The park, named *Central Park*, will be built in the Marquette neighborhood between East Washington Avenue and Williamson (Willy) Street. Central Park, which will provide Madisonians with a place to legally skate in the city, will also eventually include community gardens, a playground, and an amphitheater, among many other features.

» Splash Parks

Madison is building two new splash parks in 2014! Thanks to a fundraising campaign by the Madison Parks Foundation, kids in the Reindahl Park and Elver Park areas will have a new way to stay cool in the summers! Both *Reindahl Splash Park* and *Elver Splash Parks* will include water features for kids of all ages. Additionally, the splash parks will include water conserving equipment which will treat and recirculate the splash park water. These parks will begin construction in the spring of 2014.

» Breese Stevens Artificial Turf

Originally built in the 1920s and named after a former Madison mayor, *Breese Stevens Athletic Field* serves as home for several local soccer teams. The 4,000 seat stadium is beloved by many for its history and its central location. Over the last 5 years, millions of dollars of updates have been put into the stadium, from concrete decking repair, ADA compliance and a new elevated press box. Due to its popularity and the Wisconsin weather, the stadium's natural turf limited how often this popular facility could be used. After years of discussion, artificial turf will be installed at Breese Stevens Field beginning in August 2014. The artificial turf will allow for more frequent and more diverse use of the facility.



Whether you're looking for a reception hall for a formal wedding or a carefree outdoor shelter for your next family reunion, Madison Parks offers a variety of scenic locations that can accommodate a gathering of any size or budget!

Fully equipped with picnic tables, restroom facilities, electrical outlets, lights, and water, a Madison shelter is a great place for a family reunion, company gathering or even a wedding reception. With most park shelters located near playgrounds, athletic areas, bike paths, beaches, and boat launches, entertainment is just a step away.

Reservations can be made in person or over the phone in late fall for the following year. Please remember that your shelter reservation entitles you to exclusive use only of the shelter, not the park. Park Staff highly recommends that you visit your location of choice prior to reserving a shelter.

Parks that do not have shelters may be used for small ceremonies or parties without a reservation. However, to ensure your day is special please call Madison Parks in advance and we will inform you of any scheduled events.

GATES OF HEAVEN

Built in 1863, Gates of Heaven is the fourth-oldest surviving synagogue building in the nation and is an ideal location to commemorate your love through the past, present, and into the future.

PERMITS YOU MAY NEED

When planning a special event in a park, you may also need to secure permits, depending on the event.

P.A. Permit is required when adding amplified sound to your event, such as a DJ, Band, or karaoke.

Temporary Structure Permit is required when adding a tent, an inflatable, dunk tank, or stage to your event.

Alcohol Permit is required when your event will serve alcohol in an alcohol-free park.

Vending Permit is required when your event will include the sale of anything in the park

Beer Sales Permit is required when your event will include the SALE of beer or alcohol.

Be inspired by 16 acres of outdoor display gardens and a year-round tropical conservatory, plus a botanical center with a gift shop, gardening library, and meeting rooms. Events, concerts, and garden-related classes and workshops for children and adults are offered year-round.

OUTDOOR GARDENS

Olbrich's outdoor gardens showcase beautiful Midwest-hardy plants set in prairie style landscapes, creating breathtaking displays throughout the year. Visitors can experience the exquisite artistry and exotic culture of Thailand in Olbrich's Thai Pavilion and Garden. BOLZ CONSERVATORY

The Bolz Conservatory, a sunny glass pyramid, houses a diverse collection of tropical plants, fragrant flowers, a rushing waterfall, free-flying birds, and blooming orchids year-round. The temperature ranges between 65 and 80 degrees Fahrenheit (and may warm to 95 degrees on hot summer days) with a relative humidity above 60-percent year round. Escape to the tropics without leaving Madison!

A GRAVEL GARDEN???

Olbrich Botanical Gardens is planting a new gravel garden by the entrance to the Botanical Center in 2014. A gravel garden utilizes drought-tolerant perennials that are well-adapted to the Midwest region's growing conditions. The plants are planted in a 4 to 5 inch layer of small, quartzite gravel over the existing native soil. Once established, gravel gardens require about 80% less maintenance than a typical perennial garden. Stop by Olbrich this season to see the progress!

Also look for examples of gravel gardens in other Madison parks – Olbrich staff has been working with Madison Parks to establish gravel gardens and other low-maintenance gardens in major parks as part of a collaborative "Parks Beautification Project."

CELEBRATE THE LEGACY OF 120 YEARS

Madison's first park was founded by residents who wanted to escape the city, if only for a few hours. It was the 1890s, and the city limits were roughly from Bascom Hill to Mansion Hill to the hilly south side of the Isthmus. In those days, it was fashionable to celebrate fine summer days on a horse-drawn carriage ride into the countryside and along the lakeshores.

Three Madisonians – Edward T. Owen, Edward E. Hammersley and John M. Olin – created the first such Pleasure Drive by contributing acres of land and generous easements, building bridges, and raising funds to pave their roadways with gravel. On July 7, 1894, the city's horse-and-buggy crowd organized a group to build more scenic routes. They called it the Madison Park & Pleasure Drive Association and installed Olin as president.

Warner Park Community Recreation Center, located at 1625 Northport Dr., is the product of the collaboration between different organizations to create a shared

community space. For the past 13 years, the awardwinning center has offered recreational, educational, cultural, and community programs and activities. The

partnership between Madison Parks, Madison School Community Recreation (MSCR), and the North Eastside Senior Coalition (NESCO) allows this center to address the diverse needs of the Madison community with a special focus on seniors and youth.

This 32,000 square foot facility has a mix of recreation, education, and community service activities. WPCRC features classrooms meant to address many different activities including meeting rooms, wet and dry craft rooms, and a great game room. MSCR runs a varied set of classes at Warner Park Community Recreation Center. From children's ballet to Tai Chi, there is something fun for everyone! With an emphasis on giving seniors the chance to stay social and active, NESCO provides classes at WPCRC from Chair Yoga to a weekly Sewing Circle.

Don't think you fit the rigid schedule of a weekly class? WPCRC has a state-of-the-art exercise room where you can get a workout on your own schedule! And no need to worry about what to do with the kids while you work out. WPCRC has on-site child



care, a full gymnasium, and a fantastic game room to keep them busy while you get in shape.



Organizing a Special Event

If you're interested in hosting a special event, Madison is the perfect place for a celebration. As host to over 300 special events a year, from festivals to concerts to runs, walks, and athletic activities, Madison Parks provide a wonderful setting for special events.

When organizing a special event, it is important to plan ahead. Most events will need a minimum of six months lead time for the permitting process. Please contact the Madison Parks Division with your preliminary plans for assistance with the following:

- Determine if the activity/event you are planning qualifies as a special event and requires permits
- Check on the availability of locations and dates for an event
- Direction on completing the appropriate permit application(s)

The People for Parks Program is designed for citizens to actively participate in their parks by either donating time or money.

Volunteers can help out on a periodic basis at one our volunteer days including:

Volunteer Programs

- Flower Garden: Volunteers maintain a flower garden in one of our parks
- Park Watch: Volunteers keep an eye on a park and report any problems or concerns

Volunteers help us do many things in our parks including weeding, invasive species removal, pruning or trimming, trash pickup, and other beautification projects.

In addition, she also has been delighting the community with colorful, creative, and surprise art installations that add a whimsical, magical touch at the Forest Hill Cemetery and as part of Ride the Drive. "It is truly amazing how many people stop in to comment about how it always puts a smile on their face as they pass by on their way to and from work," Kevin Sorenson said. "My personal favorite was the giant asparagus spears that looked to be straight out of Jack and the Beanstalk!"

Volunteer Group of the Year – Friends of Cherokee Marsh

Formed in 2006, the Friends of Cherokee Marsh has maintained their pledge to protect, preserve, and restore the beauty, value, and health of the Cherokee Marsh and upper Yahara watershed. Their tireless advocacy and volunteer efforts have supported land acquisition, enhanced restoration efforts, and inspired pride in conservation parks and native wetlands. They've written numerous articles in the Northside News educating the public about the unique natural values of the Cherokee Marsh, and have organized numerous restoration projects. The Friends of Cherokee Marsh are a great example to follow in the preservation of our wonderful conservation parks.

Athletic Facilities

From organized softball games to friendly tennis matches, Madison's athletic fields and facilities are popular places during the warm months.

Forest Hill Cemetery

Although the cemetery was established by the city in 1858, its history goes back to approximately 900 to 1200 A.D. when it was a site where American Indians constructed effigy mounds to remember their loved ones and to uphold the religious beliefs of their ancestors. Traditionally, they built many effigy mounds in the shape of various animals. The mound at Forest Hill, located on the southeast side, is in the shape of a goose.


Popular places for visitors are the two Civil War sections where both Union and Confederate soldiers are buried. In the section known as Confederate's Rest, 140 soldiers were laid to rest, and in the plot marked for Union soldiers, 240 burials took place. Many veterans from the Spanish-American War as well as World War I were also laid to rest here.


The 140-acre plot is also the final resting ground for many prominent figures, not only locally but also nationally. Well-known and celebrated surnames like Olin, La Follette, Fairchild, Tenney, Olbrich and Vilas, among many others, are a part of the long lineage of important figures in Madison and beyond.





Enveloped in an ambience that is both serene and breathtaking, Madison's diverse and expansive conservation parks play an important role in preserving the city's wildlife communities while serving as an excellent learning environment for all who visit.

Madison's innovative Conservation Parks Program began in 1971, and today, with over 1600 acres and 14 unique conservation parks, the program has become a staple in the city. These parks allow visitors and tourists the opportunity to experience unique environments and activities.

- Cherokee Marsh, located on Madison's east side, Dane County's largest
 wetland area. Consisting of wetlands, fields, oak savannahs, two glacial
 drumlins, and restored prairies, Cherokee Marsh is a diverse habitat and serves
 as the site for many educational field trips throughout the year. With 7.1 miles
 of trails, the park is equipped with observation decks, cross-country ski trails, a
 boat launch site, and three Native American effigy mounds.
 - Cherokee Marsh, North Unit, 6098 N. Sherman Dr.
 - » Cherokee Marsh, South Unit, 5002 School Rd.
 - » Cherokee Marsh, Mendota Unit, 104 W. Sauthoff Rd.
- Edna Taylor Conservation Park, 802 Femrite Drive, a mix of wetland, prairie, and oak savanna with majestic 200 year old open grown oaks. Trek 1.3 miles of trails and discover an ancient American Indian Effigy Mound.
- Elvehjem Sanctuary, 1314 Painted Post Dr., located within Elvehjem Park. The Sanctuary is a red oak-basswood forest on a northwest facing hillside with exposed sandstone bedrock.
- Heritage Sanctuary, 600 Meadowlark Dr., a peak trillium bloom in mid-May is unequaled. Under an oak forest canopy is a wildflower carpet more typical of a maple forest.
- Heritage Prairie, 5414 Queensbridge Dr., although grazed, a remnant of dry prairie persisted on a thin layer of soil over the rocky hillside.
- Hiestand Woods, 4302 Milwaukee St., large red oaks dominate this wooded park.
- **Kettle Pond,** 5805 Old Middleton Rd., a park that got its name from a glacier melting leaving many "kettle holes" in the area.
- **Knollwood Park,** 3334 Westview Ln., surrounded by many black oak trees, it also features a two-acre sand prairie.
- Owen Conservation Park, 6021 Old Sauk Rd., sitting on a glacial moraine blanketed with prairie wildflowers, oak woodlands, and ponds. The park provides a glimpse into what the natural landscape looked like in the mid-1800s.
- Paunack (A.O.) Park, 6399 Bridge Rd., features a gorgeous backdrop of Lake Monona and is located at the Yahara River outlet. A bike ride around Lake Monona is the perfect way to experience this east-side park.
- Prairie Ridge Conservation Park, 2406 Berkley Dr., a 52-acre area located on the city's southwest side, is a diverse environment that will soon be connected to the Ice Age Trail.
- Sandburg Woods, 2902 Independence Ln., a 20-acre oak woodland filled with spring wildflowers such as yellow violets and large-flowered bellwort.
- Stricker's Pond, 7214 Longmeadow Rd., is the perfect place for visitors to stay busy exploring the woods and restored grassland while also watching for migrating waterfowl.
- Turville Point Park, 1156 Olin Turville Ct., conveniently located near downtown, has a great backdrop of Lake Monona. This 65-acre park houses a variety of wildflowers as well as a 7-acre prairie.

EMERALD ASH BORER

City of Madison officials received confirmation of the presence of Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) on the north side of Madison near Warner Park in November 2013. As a result, Dane County will be quarantined. The quarantine prohibits some wood products from being moved out of the county to areas that are not infested.

What is the City of Madison's Response?

The City of Madison has been working on its tactical response to EAB since 2008. An Emerald Ash Borer Taskforce, including representatives of Madison Parks, Forestry, Mayor's Office, City Streets Division, and City Fleet Division was created. Its job was to coordinate assessment of the EAB threat, plan various response strategies, review the latest research, and act to mitigate impacts on the city's tree canopy, ensure public safety, protect the environment, and contain costs. The EAB Plan was approved by the Common Council in September 2012 and updated in September 2013.

The City of Madison has an estimated 21,700 publicly-owned street (terrace) ash trees, an unknown number of ash trees in parks and thousands more on private property. In the Warner Park area where EAB is confirmed, there are over 2600 publicly-owned ash trees.

The following summary of the City's plans for public trees is based off the approved EAB Plan:

- 1. Madison Parks Forestry will continue with branch sampling in all areas of the city to look for any other infestation locations.
- 2. Forestry staff will remove publicly-owned ash trees (street and park trees) that are in poor condition and/or are located under power lines.
- 3. Madison Parks Forestry implemented a chemical treatment program for trees that are in healthy condition and over 10 inches diameter. The city uses an injection treatments rather than soil drench treatments to ensure the protection of ground and surface water quality.
- 4. Madison Parks Forestry launched an "Adopt-a-Park Tree" program for private citizens to help save, at their own expense, a publicly-owned ash tree in a Madison park.
- 5. Madison Parks Forestry will replant publicly-owned trees in most locations. To support this undertaking, a specific fund has been created with the Madison Parks Foundation for those who would like to donate.



MADISON PARKS FORESTRY

The Forestry Section provides tree planting, trimming and maintenance for over 100,000 trees along Madison's 700 miles of city streets. In addition, the Forestry Section is responsible for hundreds of thousands of trees that are located in the city's parks, golf courses, cemetery, and greenways.


Forestry staff is trained to follow rigid safety standards. Whether planting a new tree or cleaning up after a major wind storm, the safety of the work, public, and property are never compromised.

The Madison Parks Forestry Section provides online resources to help you care for trees on your property. These resources include warnings about current pest outbreaks, proper tree care, and what to do with storm damaged trees.



In 2014, Madison was named a 25 year Tree City USA!! The National Arbor Foundation gives this award annually in cooperation with the USDA Forest Service. Madison has repeatedly been awarded the Tree City USA title due to our innovative urban forestry program.

The Heritage Tree Program, started in 2012, fosters appreciation and inspires awareness of the contribution of city owned street and park trees to the City's history and heritage. This program is a way for citizens to officially recognize special, significant, or cherished city-owned trees in their community.



Winter Recreation

As winter arrives, so does spectacular winter scenery, sledding, cross-country skiing, and skating at our 260 parks and over 6,000 acres of natural areas. We encourage individuals and families to celebrate winter's beauty and fun with a visit to one of our winter facilities for ice skating, skiing, snowshoeing, or sledding. Madison Parks offer some terrific opportunities to get outside and enjoy a winter wonderland of exercise, scenery, and fun.

CROSS COUNTRY SKIING

Cross country skiing doesn't require hills and can be enjoyed on almost any snow-covered location. It's also easy to learn and offers an entire-body aerobic workout. Madison Parks maintains over 18 miles of groomed cross-country ski trails at Elver Park, Odana Hills Golf Course, Monona Golf Course, Door Creek Park, Turville Woods, Owen Conservation Park, and South Cherokee Marsh. Trails are available for skiers of all skill levels. A ski trail permit is needed at Elver Park, Odana Hills Golf Course, and at all groomed Dane County Park trails. If you don't own skis, you can rent them at Elver Park and Odana Hills Golf Course.

ICE SKATING

When winter settles in, lace up the skates or grab a hockey stick to take advantage of one of 12 outdoor rinks. Many offer separate rinks for general skating and recreational uses such as hockey, broomball, and pond hockey. Some rinks have warming shelters, concessions, and skate rentals. Our Park crews are committed to providing the best rinks possible despite winter's unpredictable weather. Check our website for updated conditions.

SLEDDING

Our sledding hills are great places to spend those snowy winter days. We have seven parks with sledding hills: Elver, Olbrich, Sycamore, Hiestand, Garner, Berkley, and Warner Parks. At Elver Park we have lights and a snow making machine for the sledding hill, so we can create snow even when mother nature doesn't.

SNOWSHOEING

Snowshoeing is a sport you can enjoy your first time out. It is a great way to get out and explore the scenic trails in our city. Anyone from young children to senior citizens can easily learn to snowshoe.




FOUR PREMIER PARKS FOR WINTER FUN

Madison Parks maintains 4 premiere winter facilities that offer concessions, equipment rentals, and a warming shelter.

- Tenney Park: This picturesque location is a great place for ice skating and hockey seven days a week. It features a beautiful new shelter, fireplace, concessions, ice skate rentals, and lighted rinks.
- Elver Park: Elver Park offers ice skating, XC skiing, and sledding, all with lights to keep the fun going into the evening. This is a great destination that has a warming shelter, concessions, ice skate rentals, XC ski equipment rentals, and a reservable room.
- Vilas Park: This central location offers ice skating on a lagoon and hockey rink, and offers ice skate rentals, concessions, and lights for evening skating.
- Odana Hills Golf Course, 4635 Odana Rd., offers 5.7K of groomed ski trails for traditional XC skiing and skate skiing. The clubhouse is open on weekends and serves as a warming shelter with XC ski rentals and concessions.
