Cross Country Skiing

Enjoy the quiet beauty of winter - cross country skiing. Thirty-two kilometers of groomed trails await skiers in seven Madison park locations: Elver Park, Door Creek Park, South Cherokee Marsh, Owen Conservation Park, Turville Woods, Monona Golf Course and Odana Hills Golf Course. Trail difficulties range from easy to advanced. Don't have your own skis? Rental skis are available at Elver Park (daily) and Odana Golf Course (weekends only).

A ski pass is required to use the trails at Elver and Odana Golf Course. Fees are \$8 for a daily pass and \$30 for an annual pass. These passes are also good on Dane County Park trails. You can purchase the pass at the trailhead or the annual pass on-line at: www.madisonpay.com

Outdoor Skating

A favorite outdoor winter activity is ice skating. What's better than taking the kids out for a day of ice skating - and then enjoying a cup of hot cocoa? Madison Parks has several parks with outdoor ice rinks: Vilas, Goodman, Rennebohm, Elver, Nakoma, Heritage Heights, Tenney, Olbrich, Westmorland, Wexford and Warner. For skate rentals and concessions, visit Tenney, Vilas and Elver Parks. For the winter 2012-2013 season, there is a change west side ice rink locations. There will no longer be an ice rink at Garner Park; instead the ice rink at Rennebohm Park will be re-opened.

We have various length trails in our parks that can be used as snowshoeing trails in the winter. In addition to the parks listed, snowshoeing is also permitted on Tom George Greenway, which is located between Heritage Prairie and Elvehjem Sanctuary. Snowshoers must stay on the trails. Please note snowshoes are not allowed on cross country ski trails at any time. Madison Parks does not rent snowshoes. Keep in mind that there needs to be sufficient snow to create a base for snowshoeing. The woods generally need more snow to fall because the trees protect the trails.

Madison Parks awarded \$18,000 grant from Madison Community Foundation for Oak Savanna Restoration

Madison Parks was awarded an \$18,000 grant from the Madison Community Foundation this fall. The grant allows Madison Parks to partner with Operation Fresh Start's Conservation Crew and engage in ongoing oak savanna restoration work at Cherokee Marsh (north and south units), Turville Point, Edna Taylor and Prairie Ridge

conservation parks.

During 2012-13, we plan to complete two phases of restoration: restoring the "woody structure" of the savanna and establishing the native grassy understory. This work will be followed by years of management by Parks staff to stabilize the savanna ecology.

The Madison Community Foundation grant award allows Madison Parks to

fund 12 weeks of time with Operation Fresh Start's Conservation Crew (OFS) to assist

with intensive work required to remove invasive and overrepresented trees and haul away heavy wood debris which has accumulated for decades on the forest floor. Madison Parks Staff will also engage volunteer Friends groups to assist with less intensive tasks, such as preparation for prescribed burns, scattering native seeds, and planting native shrubs.

"Madison Parks is grateful to the Madison Community Foundation for their continued support of Madison's parks," stated Kevin Briski, Madison Parks Superintendent. "Their grant not only allows us to partner with Operation Fresh Start but to also carry out our goals in the conservation parks."

The outcomes of the project will be: 1.) To complete the initial phases needed to restore 90 acres of oak savanna and recreate 250 acres of prairie/savanna complex in 4 Madison Conservation Parks; 2.) To engage at least 9 youth from OFS in employability skills training and exposure to work in natural resource management; and, 3.) To involve 60 volunteers in 300 total hours of work assisting with restoration activities.

"This project is a perfect synthesis of our objectives. We formerly funded the effort to make Operation Fresh Start a year round program. These young people will be advancing their employable skills while helping to restore some of Dane County's most iconic conservation habitats," said Bob Sorge, Madison Community Foundation Vice President of Strategic Partnerships.

The long-range goals of the Oak Savanna Restoration project is to diversify conservation habitat, beautify Madison's open spaces, and enhance the recreation and educational opportunities within our park system.

Work on these conservation projects will begin mid-December 2012.

Our Summer "Learn to Row" classes have historically been for boys and girls entering grades 9-12. Last summer what started out as a community outreach program turned into our new Middle School program! With over 25 6-8th graders excited about rowing, many parents asked "now what can they do that classes are over?" We answered this question by designing a fall rowing program for them, complete with their own coaches and separate from the High School program. We had every available space filled for the fall and are looking forward to them returning in the spring. Their excitement is contagious!

Our year-round high school team has seen much growth and success over the last few years. CRRC draws more than 80 athletes from eight area high schools and competes in Regattas throughout the midwest. This year the varsity team again sent two boats to US Junior Nationals in June. In October they also sent two boats to the Head of the Charles Regatta in Boston where more than 9000 athletes from across the country compete over two days. The Junior Men's 4+ placed 7th and the Junior Women's 4+ placed 17th out of over 80 entries in each event- What a great finish for the fall racing season!

The City of Madison Forestry Section has updated its Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) website. There are two new features on the website:

• Residents can enter their street address to find out if there is an ash street tree planted in front of their home or within the neighborhood.

• Residents can email the Forestry Section directly to report a suspected EAB sighting. If you don't know what to look for the website has information about the pest and images for you to help you identify the Emerald Ash Borer.

"The newly updated EAB website will help our Madison residents keep updated on this very important issue," stated Madison Parks Superintendent Kevin Briski. "Although EAB has

not been confirmed in Dane County, it has been confirmed in nearby counties. Therefore it is important that everyone know and understand how the city plans to combat this insect."

Madison Parks Outdoor Ice Skating

The City of Madison Parks Division is offering group ice skating lessons for all ages at our premier outdoor skating rinks at Tenney Park or Elver Park. These Learn to Skate classes offer a fun way to stay active in the winter months as you improve your confidence and ability on the ice. Our experienced instructors have completed basic skills training through the US Figure Skating Association. The natural beauty of our outdoor ice rinks makes them a unique and stunning setting in which to learn to skate.

Snowplow Sam 1, 2 & 3: Ages 3-6: focusing on fun, comfort and movement on ice. Each class builds on the skills learned from the previous class including falling and getting up properly, standing, marching and gliding to forward and backward swizzles and stops.

Basic 1-3: Ages 6-14: These classes are for older kids learning a variety of basic skating skills, proper techniques and safety. Each class builds on the skills learned from the previous class. Basic 1 teaches proper way to fall and get up safely, skating forward two foot swizzles, snowplow stop. Basic 2 will reinforce skills from Basic 1 and move on to forward and backward glides. Basic 3 will build on the skills from Basic 1 & 2 and will focus on forward to backward turn, continuous forward two foot sways, one foot snowplow stops.

Adult Beginner: For skaters over 14: This class is designed to promote physical fitness and improve balance and coordination while learning proper skating technique. Adult skaters progress at an individual rate while being both challenged and motivated.

- All classes are 7 weeks long.
- Cost is \$55 per class.
- All classes will be held outdoors at Tenney Park and Elver Park ice rinks.
- Free Skate rental during lessons from Madison Parks.
