## Central District Officers Presenters at a National Policing Conference

This past August, Sergeant Dave McCaw, from the Central District Community Policing Team, and Police Officer Tony Fiore, the Langdon Street Neighborhood Police Officer, traveled to Fairfax, VA, to present at the 2007 College and University Police and Investigators Conference. The conference was held over four days and provided training opportunities for over 300 police officers, investigators, detectives and supervisors representing over 120 law enforcement agencies.

Sgt. McCaw has over 22 years of policing experience and for the past two years has served as the supervisor for the Central District Community Policing Team. For this conference, Sgt. McCaw presented information on how the Madison Police Department's Central District proactively addresses house parties in the student housing areas of downtown. His presentation showed how the Madison model combines education and enforcement and how they routinely disperse large, out-of-control house parties safely and at the same time document and hold those responsible for hosting the party accountable. Sgt. McCaw's presentation walked attendees through step-by-step so they could apply these same methods and techniques in the own cities or campuses.

As the Langdon Street Neighborhood Officer, PO Fiore has worked with the UW's Greek community on issues such as safety, alcohol and house party enforcement. Officer Fiore's presentation focused on joining forces with the Greek community to address safety issues. The Langdon Street Neighborhood Watch program received a great deal of enthusiasm from attendees, and PO Fiore's presentation showed how creating ownership and "buy-in" from students can create a positive and proactive relationship between the Greek community and law enforcement.



This conference was a tremendous opportunity for the Madison Police Department to share their success stories with other law enforcement agencies and at the same time to learn from officers from around the country. Sgt. McCaw and Officer Fiore gave their 1-1/2 hour presentation twice during the conference, and they received very positive feedback from those who attended.

## THE TRAFFIC STOP

For many of us, trying to "beat the light" has become a way to save a few minutes when we're in a hurry. Or it's become habit to speed up when we see a yellow light instead of slowing down and stopping. Another problem is driver distraction; when drivers aren't paying attention or are distracted by other passengers, they may run red lights or stop signs.

Whatever the reason, red light running is costly in terms of injuries, traffic tickets and damage to vehicles. Red light and



stop sign running are top causes of motor vehicle-related death and injury. Angle collisions can result in very serious head injuries to passengers in vehicles that are hit broadside by motorists running red lights or stop signs. Whiplash and injuries to the back, knee, ankle, wrist and hand are also common. Typically it is the driver who
