MAN SERVING TIME FOR ROBBERY ARRESTED FOR DOING 3 ROBBERIES WHILE RELEASED FROM JAIL

On 6/16 at 9:15 am, a man entered the Mobil Mart at 3505 E. Washington Ave. The man demanded money and implied he had a gun. The man fled the area on foot. The store clerk recognized the suspect as the same man that had robbed the station two other times over the past several weeks. Officers gave the description of the suspect to the Madison Metro drivers. A bus driver recognized that the suspect was on her bus. Officers responded to the location of the bus and took the suspect into custody. It was later determined that the suspect was serving jail time for a previous robbery and was out on Huber privileges attending MATC. Instead of going to MATC, he robbed the Mobil station 3 times.

SHOTS FIRED IN DARBO AREA

On 6/9, at 8:45 pm, officers were sent to the 300 blk of Clyde Gallagher for a report of shots fired. They contacted a few people in the area who heard the shots and saw a group of young men in the area. No one saw anyone fire a gun.

SUSPICIOUS PERSON

On 6/17 on 8:25 pm, two teenage girls reported that they were walking dogs in the area of Rocky Rococo's when

they were approached by a male in a vehicle. They could hear him mumbling something and asked what he was saying. He then asked one of the girls if she had a boyfriend and told her she was cute. The girls hid behind a vehicle in the lot waiting for the man to leave. When they thought he was gone, they began to walk towards Dean Ave. when the male approached again. After they yelled at him he took off. The described the man as a light skinned male black, with about ear to shoulder length braids, approximately 28 to 35 years old, wearing a white t-shirt and a slender to average build. His teeth were described as "small" in the front and looked like little stubs. He was driving an older model, white, possibly Honda hatchback that was "loud" with some small "dings" and rust near the door.

SEXUAL ASSAULT IN CAMDEN RD AREA

On 6/19 at approx. 10:00 pm, a male entered the home of a woman and sexually assaulted her. He is believed to have entered through an unlocked front door. He is described as a black male, 30's, 6', 250 lbs, bald.

NUMEROUS VEHICLES DAMAGED

On June 1, between 6pm and 8pm several vehicles were damaged by someone throwing landscaping stones from a moving vehicle. A neighbor of one of the victims saw a black 4 door compact car drive by and the passenger throw the stone at the parked car damaging it. The damaged cars were on S. Thompson, Greenbriar, Merryturn and Brynwood.

SUSPICIOUS PERSON

On 6/20, an 18 yr old female was walking when a male driver contacted her and started to make sexual comments. He was driving a black convertible and was described as black male, 45, 5'6", chunky build.

SOLICITORS ARRESTED

On 6/10, officers contacted 2 men and a woman who were selling magazines for Face to Face Technologies in the Merryturn area. All were from out of state and none had a permit from the City to sell door to door. All three were cited and required to post on their tickets. DRUNK DRIVING FATHER HAS ACCIDENT WITH TWO CHILDREN

On 6/27, officers responded to Hwy 30 at the Thompson Rd exit for a Jeep that had rolled over several times. They contacted the 45 yr old male driver who was not injured, but appeared to be intoxicated. The officers also contacted the man's 3 yr old son who had suffered a severe injury to his hand and his 6 yr old daughter who appeared uninjured. The children were conveyed to the hospital and the man was arrested. During the officer's contact with the man, he never inquired about his children, but seemed quite concerned with some money he had in his Jeep.

ARMED ROBBERY

Occurred 6/27 at 8 pm at Pay Day Loans, 2717 E. Washington. Two suspects entered and displayed a handgun. They fled on foot after the robbery. Both were described as black males, early 20's, one shorter, one taller.

DRUNK MAN BARRICADES SELF FROM POLICE AND FIGHTS WITH POLICE AND CANINE

On 6/28, officers responded to an East side address for a 27 yr old man who was causing a disturbance at his mother's house. The man had been released from jail that morning and had become intoxicated during the day. Before police could arrive, the man fled to his grandmother's house near by. There he broke into a storage area and blocked the door so police could not get to him. He had entered this storage area by tearing the door off, causing the screws of the hinges to pull out from the wood. As officers tried to talk to him, he swore and threatened to kill the officers. A canine officer arrived and advised the man that the dog would be sent in if he failed to surrender. The man continued to swear and told the officers to send in the dog so he could kill the dog. The man appeared at the door swinging a pipe and threatening to kill the officers. At one point the man opened

the door wide enough that the canine officer and another officer grabbed hold on him. The man began to wildly fight the officers causing the canine to bite him. Eventually officers were able to handcuff the man who continued to kick and fight. The man's ankles were put in restraints. When officers took the man to a squad car, the man began slamming his head down on the truck causing it to dent. Fire rescue was called to help convey the man to a local hospital to be checked over. The man continued to struggle wildly in the ambulance and at the hospital. Hospital staff had to sedate the man in order to check him over. The man was eventually conveyed to jail.

THIEVES CAUGHT ON TAPE

On 6/14, at approx. 8:30pm, a theft occurred at an East side location. The suspects were driving what appeared to be a black Chevy pick up truck. The driver was a white male, about 20 yrs old, with light brown short hair and a slender to average build. The passenger was a white male, about 20, with short dark hair.
