"Creating new partnerships has been a priority

Whew! Did that go fast! The end of 2019 marked the oneyear anniversary of me serving as Senior Center and Senior Services Manager with Madison Senior Center and I've enjoyed every bit of it.

Acclimating to MSC was easy given the well-developed staff, friendly participants and great community partners. I've spent most of the year observing operations and exploring new opportunities and partnerships for growth all with an eye toward remaining relevant in the life of older adults in Madison. We've been researching implementing programs that will help sustain the natural world around us, like planting pollinator gardens and beekeeping, and we're looking into adding more programs that will help us stay physically fit. Intergenerational programs are running strong and we have some great endeavors in store for 2020!

Creating new partnerships has been a priority of mine and it's been a pleasure to reach out and begin working with organizations like Allen Centennial Gardens, Downtown Madison, Inc. and the Building Improvement District. Allen Centennial Gardens helped us explore planting pollinator plants on the patio and beekeeping while Downtown Madison, Inc. helped us begin our work toward having the City designated as an Age Friendly Community. The Building Improvement District helped get us on the downtown map for activities like the family Halloween trick-or-treat celebration and the Fall Wine Walk. We've also been working with Successful Aging, Inc. an organization that seeks to increase health literacy and hope to be implementing some of their programming at the Center this fall. Cherokee Country Club will be the site of a 2020 fundraiser and we hope to connect more with Access Community Health. Other new partnerships include the YWCA, Epic, US Cellular, UW-Milwaukee School of Nursing, Public Health Madison Dane County, Sankofa, Common Bond, and UW School of Nursing.

All in all it's been a great year of growth, and I look forward to many more positive and productive years ahead with MSC.

Partnership Fund






