



2000-2024 Active Attack Data

This data includes all active attacks identified from 2000–2024 by the FBI and ALERRT. It is a rolling list; as new events happen, or are found, the data adjusts accordingly. There have been **597** active attacks identified.

Civilian Response to Active Shooter Events



Officers teaching CRASE are trained through Advance Law Enforcement Rapid Response Training (ALERT™). The Civilian Response to Active Shooter Events (CRASE) course is designed and built on the Avoid Deny Defend™ strategy developed by ALERT in 2004.

Per the US Department of Homeland Security, “an Active Shooter is an individual or individuals actively engaged in killing or attempting to kill people in a confined and populated area; in most cases, active shooters use a firearm (s) and there is no pattern or method to their selection of victims.” If you experience an active shooter event, follow the Avoid Deny Defend strategy:



Avoid starts with your state of mind

- Pay attention to your surroundings
- Have an exit plan
- Move away from the source of the threat as quickly as possible
- The more distance and barriers between you and the threat, the better



Deny when getting away is difficult or impossible

- Keep distance between you and the source
- Locking doors is good, barricading them is better
- Turn the lights off
- Remain out of sight and quiet by hiding behind large objects and silence your phone



Defend because you have the right to protect yourself

- If you cannot Avoid or Deny, be prepared to defend yourself
- Be aggressive and committed to your actions
- Do not fight fairly
- Use the element of surprise if possible
