





Garver Path

The Garver Path is located on the east side of Madison, Wisconsin, in an area that features residential neighborhoods with majestic trees, the historic Garver Feed Mill, O.B. Sherry Park, and wetlands near Starkweather Creek. KL Engineering led the design engineering for the Garver Path project, which is a mile-long connector trail that now links the community to the Capital City Trail, a popular recreational pathway for walking, running, and biking, and the greater trail system. The project includes two new bridges over Starkweather Creek, and one new bridge over a wetland area, providing new pedestrian and bicycle access through the neighborhood. The project also included a significant reduction in pavement width on Starkweather Drive to protect the trees and shoreline wildlife habitat along the roadway and creek.


Atwood Ave – Currently in Construction

- Improved crossings




Wilson St – Phase One in Construction

Winter Arterial Path Maintenance

• Cleared by 7 AM, Monday-Friday

• Continued 2020 Service Level Enhancement

- Cleared on weekends and holidays within 12 hours after snow has stopped falling.
- Utilized Parks new Toolcat to better support bike paths snow clearing and to accommodate other growth snow clearing responsibilities.
- Reviewed and enhanced snow territories responsibilities to improve response quality and efficiency
- Increasing use of broom clearing as conditions allow to reduce sand/salt mix use and improve path conditions
- Piloting a new gas UTV w/ v-plow to increase response time and efficiency, as EV technology expands we intend to replace the gas model with an EV model.

Outcomes

- Reduced snow pack leading to improved path conditions.
- Increased access during weekends and holidays and customer/biker satisfaction.

Whitehorse Bike-a-Thon 2022

After an eight year hiatus, the Wisconsin Bike Fed partnered with the City of Madison's Pedestrian and Bicycle Outreach Specialist to reestablish the Whitehorse Bike-a-Thon.

- Dozens of sixth graders from Whitehorse Middle School rode electric bikes for 13 miles.
- At the end of their ride, they achieved an ice cream cone from Monona Bait and Ice Cream Shop.
- The intention of the ride was to teach road biking skills and techniques. However, due to the pandemic, students reported they were happy and excited to bike with their friends and see the city.



Olbrich Botanical Gardens, an outdoor botanical garden and conservatory located in Madison, hosted a <u>Blooming Butterflies</u> exhibit from July 2023 – August 2023.



- Free Bikes 4 Kidz, Wheels for Winners, an Bike Fed Camp participants received free passes.
- Dream Bikes, Wheels for Winners, and Slow Roll Cycles provided free bike tune ups.
- Olbrich Botanical Gardens arranged for valet bike parking as well as a Butterfly Bike Parade with butterfly bike decorations and costumes. Child participants received a complementary pass to the exhibit.







South Side Slow Roll

Free Bikes 4 Kidz hosted their first annual <u>South Side Slow Roll</u> on August 5, 2023.

- This free bike ride is 3 miles around the south side of Madison.
- While all levels of bikers are welcome, the goal of this ride was to introduce new bikers to trails around Madison, other bikers in the community, and bike co-ops found in the city.
- Prior to the bike ride, Wheels for Winners offered free repair services for bikers to ensure a safe ride.
- Bike Fitchburg additionally provided bike gear to keep bikers safe.
- Dane County Parks gave participants complementary trail passes on the Capital City State Trail.
- Olbrich Botanical Gardens gifted riders free seed bombs to stop and plant wildflowers along the bike paths.
- After the ride, Free Bikes 4 Kidz partnered with many stakeholders (UW Health, Capitol Bank, City of Madison, etc.) to hold a celebration of community.



Mobile Repair Events

A partnership with Wisconsin Bike Fed, DreamBikes, Wheels for Winners, Budget Bicycles, and the City, brought repair stands to underserved communities for free bike repair. We also threw a dash of education in there teaching kids how to do an ABC check on their bikes and even hosting a mini bike rodeo at some locations if space allowed.
