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1 NOTICE TO PROPOSERS

1.1 Summary of Services Requested

The City of Madison is seeking proposals from a firm or team (the Consultant) for advanced watershed modeling and planning services for two (2) distinct watersheds in the City of Madison, WI. This Request for Proposals (RFP) is intended to solicit information from interested firms including qualifications of project team and key personnel, project understanding and potential challenges, previous related project experience, level of effort, and schedule of services. City of Madison Engineering staff will use submitted RFP responses to select the consultant(s) for each Watershed.

These RFPs are the beginning of the process to develop actionable mitigation measures in the aforementioned watersheds to meet the City's goals of reducing damages associated with flooding events, prioritizing for flood mitigation projects and providing enough guidance to budget for the construction of projects identified in the watershed plans. Phase 1 is for model development, analysis of existing conditions, and conceptual level mitigation alternatives. Phase 2 is anticipated to cover more detailed modeling of preferred mitigation measures and cost-benefit and design feasibility analyses. Phase 3 is anticipated to cover final modeling, mitigation alternative refinement and report documentation.

1.2 Summary

The City of Madison, like many communities, has seen a recent increase in extreme flood events. This increase has occurred most notably in Madison since 2016, when a large and intense rain event in late July caused extensive flooding of public and private property on Madison's west side. Large events in July 2017 and June 2018 caused similar flooding, again largely focused on Madison's west side.

On August 20, 2018, Dane County experienced an unusual precipitation event that caused flooding in excess of that seen in any of the prior events mentioned. Rain gages monitoring that event registered between 3-4" of precipitation on Madison's east side and 8-10" of precipitation on its west side over (approximately) a 12-hr period. Many of Madison's west side neighborhoods experienced flash flooding, resulting in millions of dollars in property damage.

In response to the damage incurred due to recent extreme rainfall events as well as the likely increasing frequency of such events due to global climate change, the Madison Common Council authorized the City of Madison Engineering Division (City Engineering) to develop watershed models and plans for watersheds of greatest concern in the Madison area. The Request for Proposal includes work specifically for Dunn's Marsh and Green Tree/McKenna watersheds. Specific watershed information is included in Exhibits 1a-1b.

1.3 Project Areas

The watersheds included in this RFP process are listed below. Specific watershed information is found in Exhibits 1a-1b.

- 1a. Dunn's Marsh
- 1b. Green Tree/McKenna

It is expected that the CONSULTANT complete site investigations to become familiar with each watershed they are submitting a proposal for.

Where unique information is not requested, only one document for non-unique information is required for any and all submittals.

Submit one hard copy of the unique information specified for each watershed and the information that applies to multiple watersheds (if submitting on more than one watershed). Also submit an electronic copy of all materials provided on a flash drive. Electronic Proposals in a PDF format shall be identical in content and sequence to hardcopy Proposals submitted.

The City will not consider illegible Proposals.

Elaborate Proposals (i.e., expensive artwork) beyond that sufficient to present a complete and effective Proposal, are not necessary or desired.

1.20 Proposers Responsibility

Proposers shall examine this RFP and shall exercise their judgment as to the nature and scope of the work required. No plea of ignorance concerning conditions or difficulties that exist or may hereafter arise in the execution of the work under the resulting contract, as a consequence of failure to make necessary examinations and investigations, shall be accepted as an excuse for any failure or omission on the part of the Proposers to fulfill the requirements of the resulting contract.

2 SCOPE OF SERVICES

Specific tasks for this RFP have been identified below, along with the required deliverable per task. All cost estimates shall reference the specific task number or sub-task component as outlined in the **Cost Proposal** document, included with the RFP.

PHASE 1

TASK 1 Review Existing Data and Support Data Collection Plan Development

- 1.1 CONSULTANT will review existing data for the watershed including City-provided GIS data. City data provided is listed in *Exhibit 2*. CONSULTANT will also identify additional sources of data that will be used and/or needed for model setup/calibration.
- 1.2 CONSULTANT will determine where field survey data is required to complete model input requirements, or as necessary for conducting the stormwater modeling. Survey data may include: open channel cross sections, culvert crossings, pipe inverts / size, and manhole rims, to provide the necessary input data for the modeling. Exact locations will be identified in collaboration with the City.

Consultant will provide survey for requested locations. All survey data will utilize Wisconsin County Coordinate System – Dane Zone, NAD83 (HARN). All survey data shall be referenced to NAVD 88 (pre-2007 adjustment) feet for vertical datum.

Task 1 Deliverables: List of data gaps, list of data needs, point shapefile of requested survey locations, and completed survey.

TASK 2 Public Engagement

2.1 CONSULTANT will provide information materials and two (2) staff people to help conduct Public Information Meeting #1 (PIM #1). The purpose of PIM #1 is to introduce the project and to discuss process and approach.

PIM #1 will be held at the beginning of the project. The City has developed a general PowerPoint presentation structure for PIM #1. CONSULTANT will review the City's presentation, and provide input on the presentation, and shall provide the City with watershed-specific statistics (including but not limited to watershed area and quantity of stormwater infrastructure) and graphics for insertion into the presentation. CONSULTANT shall be the lead presenter of the PowerPoint at PIM #1.

2.2 CONSULTANT will facilitate up to ten (10) focus group or stakeholder meetings, as authorized by the City, with affected residents or neighborhoods. The purpose of the meetings will be to gather additional information and gain input regarding flooding impacts in specific locations. Meetings will be paid for by the Unit price for this task as identified in the Cost Proposal provided with the Proposal.

The City will identify the group(s) for each meeting and arrange for a suitable location. CONSULTANT will provide the materials created for PIM #1 as well as an 11x17" figure of the focus group/stakeholder's area of interest.

CONSULTANT will conduct the listening session and document the citizen comments.

Task 2 Deliverables:

- 1) Edits to City's standard PIM#1 PowerPoint presentation, including watershed-specific statistics and graphics
- 2) Other presentation materials as necessary.
- 3) Compile feedback and responses to questions and provide report to the City. This report shall include an executive summary that can be posted to the City website.

TASK 3 Develop and Calibrate Existing Conditions InfoSWMM Model for the Watershed

CONSULTANT will conduct the hydrologic and hydraulic modeling as described in this project using Innovyze's InfoSWMM 1-D and 2-D software. The version of InfoSWMM will be the most recent version and will not change after the calibration process. CONSULTANT will also use ArcGIS as-needed for the project; where the City is on a different version of ArcGIS than the CONSULTANT, CONSULTANT will save files to version City is in. City is currently utilizing ArcGIS v10.5.

- 3.1 An InfoSWMM Model Guidance document has been created for the Watershed Studies to provide for consistency in modeling among all watersheds. It is understood this document will evolve as modeling tools and data change. The CONSULTANT will coordinate with City and the other Consultant to update the InfoSWMM Modeling Guidance document where appropriate for this watershed study (see Exhibit 3). Coordination may be done via email or phone.
 - 3.1.1 The Modeling Guidance document will be updated and maintained to reflect joint decisions on the modeling source documents, naming conventions, standardized coordinate systems, modeling input parameters, and other factors to maximize the consistency among the models being developed for all watersheds.
 - 3.1.2 The Modeling Guidance document will include a documentation of modeling parameters and changes to parameters with a log of dates, and agreed upon changes by the City and CONSULTANTs.
- 3.2 The public conveyance system will be included in the models.
- 3.3 Applicable portions of the private conveyance system will also be included; the expectation is that all private systems and private properties will be analyzed to the extent necessary to build and calibrate the models. This effort is not intended to result in solutions to solve flooding on private property but it may be necessary in order to accurately build and calibrate the model. If additional work beyond the assumptions are required on a case by case basis, that should be noted and provided to the City for consideration of additional compensation.
- 3.4 For the purpose of this contract, the level of effort required shall be reflected in the assumptions made within the Modeling Guidance document, dated April 9, 2019 and provided with this RFP. Any further assumptions or changes to the Modeling Guidance document that will result in a measurable increase in the level of effort will be consulted with the City and adjustments to the contract cost will be determined prior to proceeding.
- 3.5 Following the development of the existing conditions model, the CONSULTANT will calibrate the model with available data.
 - 3.5.1 The City of Madison will monitor key locations within each Watershed in accordance with the joint USGS-City of Madison monitoring plan for each Watershed. Monitoring data will be provided to the CONSULTANT on a monthly basis as it is collected. Calibration will be attempted for no more than three (3) 2019-monitored storm events. The three (3) events will be selected by City and CONSULTANT(s). If suitable events do not occur in 2019, CONSULTANT and City will agree on revised schedule for both monitoring and remainder of modeling.
 - For purposes of this project, the model will be considered to be calibrated if the overall average model bias for water surface elevations is within +/- 5% with reasonable effort made to minimize the largest absolute error while at the same time balancing that effort with the relative importance of the model results at each monitoring site location. The largest absolute error at each monitored location is defined as +/- 25 percent. It is understood that there may be some circumstances where calibration cannot be accomplished.
 - 3.5.2 CONSULTANT will participate in one (1) in-person meeting with City staff to discuss the calibration methodology prior to creation of the existing conditions model. This may be done in conjunction with the monthly progress meetings. Calibration parameters will be discussed and agreed upon and documented in the Modeling Guidance document.

- 3.5.3 The number of calibration locations within the watershed shall be based on the actual number of locations successfully monitored by the USGS with qualifying rain events.
- 3.5.4 Initial calibration using existing data shall be complete by October 31, 2019.
- 3.5.5 Calibration will consider applicable rainfall data collected and damage information from August 20, 2018 storm if available. It will also consider anecdotal information collected during PIM #1, debris line surveys, or other pertinent information provided by the City or the public.
- 3.5.6 Final calibration using field-collected data shall be complete by March 31, 2020. This schedule assumes suitable rain events are successfully monitored in 2019 and the monitored data is available to CONSULTANT by October 15, 2019.
- 3.6 CONSULTANT will complete field verification, site visits, and evaluations, as necessary to complete and verify the existing conditions model.

Task 3 Deliverables: InfoSWMM input and output files including flow and rainfall data used for calibration, and data collected. InfoSWMM results will be documented tabular for key locations within the watershed and graphically on maps.

TASK 4 Execute Existing Conditions InfoSWMM Model

- 4.1 CONSULTANT will run calibrated InfoSWMM model for the 2-, 5-, 10-, 25-, 50-, 100-, and 500-yr, 24-hr design events using the MSE4 rainfall distribution and the rainfall depths provided by the City. CONSULTANT will perform modeling tasks in 1-D for the entire watershed and selected areas will be modeled in 2D.
- 4.2 CONSULTANT shall also run one long-duration (>24-hr) event as described in the Modeling Guidance document for the existing conditions model. Note: at the time of the RPF, the long-duration storm event has not be identified; it is expected to be identified prior to the fall of 2019.
- 4.3 CONSULTANT will perform an inlet capacity analysis for all public storm sewer in the watershed by confirming there are enough inlets to fill existing pipe. The analysis will be based on aggregating the capacity of all inlets within a delineated subbasin discharging to a single storm sewer. Inlet sizes will be based upon available City GIS data, assumptions, and/or field observations by surveyors. CONSULTANT is not expected to inspect each inlet. Upon agreement with the City, factors may be applied to represent inlet clogging, and other factors, in the inlet capacity analysis. Initial clogging values shall be as shown in the Modeling Guidance document. It is anticipated that during model calibration these clogging factors may need to be reviewed and / or adjusted. All adjustments will be documented.
- 4.4 CONSULTANT will review model results with City Engineering staff. This meeting shall be face-to-face and may be done in conjunction with the monthly progress meetings.
- 4.5 CONSULTANT will prepare a Draft Watershed Existing Conditions Report and provide draft documents for City staff review. Report shall include the following:
 - 1) Introduction
 - 2) Description of existing conditions
 - · Current land uses and assumptions
 - Land use maps
 - Soils maps
 - Major storm infrastructure networks
 - Environmental considerations such as landfill, well or well head protection zones, cemeteries, sensitive areas such as conservation parks, etc.
 - City, County, State or Federal lands or lands owned by the Madison Metropolitan School District
 - Railroads, major high-power electric distribution lines or high-pressure gas pipelines or distribution lines

- Other considerations (limited to high bedrock, high groundwater, and wetland indicators that can be found on publicly available web sites), that would limit the siting design alternatives
- 3) Areas of identified stormwater conveyance deficiencies that do not meet the City's stated goals.
- 4) Maximum extent of flooding figures / inundation mapping under the 2-, 10-, 25-, 50-, 100-, and 500-yr, 24-hr design events
- 5) Modeling Guidance documentation
- 6) Conceptual solutions for priority deficiencies. Priority deficiencies will be identified in collaboration with City staff.

Task 4 Deliverables:

- 1) Prepare color figures showing the maximum extent of flooding during each storm event. The figures shall be color coded to show depth of flooding (typical ranges utilized are: 0.01'-0.25', 0.25'-0.5', 0.5'-1.0', and greater than 1').
- 2) Prepare table noting the flooding depth and duration for up to 25 locations for each design storm. Locations will be determined through coordination with City Staff.
- Existing condition map showing percent capacity limited by aggregated inlets for each subcatchment.
- 4) Draft report for existing conditions.
- 5) Model files and documentation.
- GIS files generated for model development. All files shall be delivered to the City on an external hard drive.

TASK 5 Public Engagement (Present Existing Conditions Results and Get Feedback from Stakeholders)

5.1 CONSULTANT will provide information materials and two (2) staff people to help conduct Public Information Meeting #2 (PIM #2). The purpose of PIM #2 is to present the existing conditions modeling results and ask for public feedback regarding the results.

PIM #2 will be held following the calibration of the existing conditions model. CONSULTANT will create materials including a PowerPoint presentation and a map showing the project area. CONSULTANT shall provide draft PowerPoint presentation to the City and work with City staff to finalize the presentation.

5.2 CONSULTANT will facilitate up to ten (10) focus group or stakeholder meetings, as authorized by the City, with affected residents or neighborhoods. The purpose of the meetings will be to gather additional information and gain input regarding flooding impacts in specific locations.

The City will identify the group(s) for each meeting and arrange for a suitable location. CONSULTANT will provide the materials created for PIM #2 as well as an 11x17" figure of the focus group/stakeholder's area of interest.

CONSULTANT will conduct the listening session and document the citizen comments.

Task 5 Deliverables:

- 1) Presentation in PowerPoint format
- 2) Large format poster of map results
- 3) Handout of frequently asked questions or other documentation related to the existing conditions model results, up to 5 pages in length, single-sided
- 4) Amended existing conditions report compiling feedback and responses to questions shall be provided to the City. This report shall include an executive summary that can be posted to the City website.

PHASE 2

CONSULTANT shall not move on to Phase 2 without express direction by the City. All comments and changes as identified by the City in Phase 1 and any respective modeling, calibration and draft report modifications shall be addressed prior to starting the mitigation alternative analysis.

TASK 6 Evaluate Flood Mitigation Alternatives

- 6.1 CONSULTANT will develop three (3) model scenario alternatives (each scenario may consist of up to 10 proposed improvements) that meet mitigation goals. CONSULTANT will perform modeling tasks in both 1D and 2D for specific areas. Proposed mitigation measures shall be feasible and shall include the following:
- 1) Run calibrated InfoSWMM model for the 2-, 5-, 10-, 25-, 50-, 100-, and 500-yr, 24-hr design events using the MSE4 rainfall distribution and the rainfall depths provided by the City for each alternative examined.
- 2) CONSULTANT shall also run one long-duration (>24-hr) event as described in the Modeling Guidance document for all alternative analyses.
- 30% conceptual drawings showing necessary pipe sizing, layout, grading, etc., and topographic (based on available LiDAR) and utility information included. Include storage calculations and flow calculations.
 - Note: The City is also seeking green infrastructure solutions as part of the alternative analysis. The CONSULTANT will need to provide options which also include green infrastructure solutions to advance the City's goal of being green and resilient.
- 4) Provide preliminary cost estimate using City-provided unit prices and complete a Cost/Benefit Analysis. CONSULTANT will meet with the City to rank the scenarios based on their flood reduction benefits, estimated initial costs, long-term maintenance costs, social impacts, permitting feasibility, and public acceptability. Relative weighting factors and scoring values will be assigned to the evaluation categories to aid in the ranking process.
- 5) Preliminary evaluation of permitting requirements and identification and documentation of potential permits will be completed and will include consultation with the respective permitting agencies. CONSULTANT will identify land use limitations, including environmental issues from publicly available data, related to the location of the improvement (example: use of an existing public park for a pond should be reviewed for feasibility as part of the alternative review).
- 6.2 CONSULTANT will meet with City staff to discuss alternative results. This meeting will be face-to-face and will be done in conjunction with the monthly progress meetings.
- 6.3 Draft Watershed Proposed Solutions Report:

CONSULTANT will provide a draft document for the proposed alternatives to be reviewed by the City. The report shall include the following:

- 1) Overview and description of the modeling approach and selection of alternative locations
- 2) Proposed solutions for deficiencies
- 3) Aggregated inlet capacity analysis for all public storm sewer in the watershed by confirming there are enough cumulative inlets in each subcatchment to fill existing pipe/proposed pipe
- 4) Maximum extent of flooding/inundation maps comparing existing and proposed alternatives
- Critical elevations in areas where structural flooding is occurring for the 500-yearflood extent.
- 6) Critical elevations for structures will be based on available data provided by the City and/or from field survey work conducted by the survey firm under City contract.

Task 6 Deliverables

- 1) Prepare color figures showing the maximum extent of flooding during each storm event for each alternative. The figures shall be color coded to show depth of flooding (typical ranges utilized are: 0.01'- 0.25', 0.25'-0.5', 0.5'-1.0', and greater than 1.0').
- 2) Prepare table noting the flooding depth and duration for up to 25 locations for each design storm. Locations will be determined through coordination with City Staff.
- 3) Map showing percent capacity limited by aggregated inlets in each subcatchment for each scenario.
- 4) Draft Watershed Proposed Solutions Report.

TASK 7 QA/QC Other Watershed Models and Review Proposed Mitigation Alternatives

7.1 CONSULTANT will attend an early project meeting with the City and other CONSULTANT to review and discuss initial modeling questions, judgments, criteria, etc. that are, or will be incorporated into the model development. The purpose of this meeting is to avoid inconsistent modeling approaches early in the project. This meeting should be attended by all City and consultant modeling staff.

CONSULTANT will provide the existing conditions watershed model and proposed alternative scenarios to the City and other CONSULTANT for review.

- 7.2 Reviews will occur at three distinct times:
 - Following completion of the initially calibrated existing conditions model. Peer review will include review of hydrologic parameters (subcatchment delineation, percent impervious development for each subcatchment, and subcatchment slope), hydraulic conveyance system, 2D model components, and initial calibration parameters.
 - 2) Following completion of the final calibrated existing conditions model (review will concentrate on final calibration parameters).
 - 3) Following completion of the selected proposed alternative scenario.

Models will be reviewed for:

- 1) Consistency with the Modeling Guidance document as updated over the course of the study.
- 2) Standard hydrologic and hydraulic modeling practice
- 3) Correct use of InfoSWMM software
- 7.3 CONSULTANT will review and provide comments on the existing conditions and proposed alternatives watersheds model developed by the other CONSULTANT noted in this RFP.
- 7.4 CONSULTANT will attend three half-days meeting with City staff and other CONSULTANT to review QA/QC and alternatives comments. The budget includes up to three (3) CONSULTANT staff to attend model review meetings. Review meeting dates/times will be selected by City and CONSULTANT and will be expected to occur following completion of each modeling phase. All other discussions will be held via conference call.
- 7.5 CONSULTANT will address comments in the model and mitigation alternatives as discussed during meeting as directed by the City.

Task 7 Deliverables: Written QA/QC review of the existing conditions watershed model and proposed alternatives watershed models.

TASK 8 Public Engagement (Present Mitigation Alternatives)

8.1 CONSULTANT will provide information materials and two (2) staff people to help conduct Public Information Meeting #3 (PIM #3). The purpose of PIM #3 is to present the proposed conditions selected alternative scenario and solicit public feedback.

PIM #3 will be held after the complete of the proposed conditions peer review. CONSULTANT will create materials including a PowerPoint presentation and a map showing the project area. CONSULTANT shall provide draft PowerPoint presentation to the City and work with City staff to finalize the presentation.

8.2 If authorized by the City, additional public informational meeting may be required based on feedback from the City, policy makers or the public. Additional meetings are not budgeted under the initial contract. A contract amendment for each additional meeting will be executed by the City if additional meetings are requested.

Task 8 Deliverables:

- 1) Presentation in PowerPoint format
- 2) Large format poster of map results
- Handout of frequently asked questions or other documentation related to the alternative analysis model results, up to 5 pages in length, single-sided
- 4) Compile feedback and responses to questions and provide report to the City. This report shall include an executive summary that can be posted to the City website.

PHASE 3 - FINAL REPORT

CONSULTANT shall not move on to Phase 3 without express direction by the City. All comments and changes as identified by the City in both Phase 1 and Phase 2 and the respective modeling, alternative analysis and draft report shall be addressed prior to final preparation of the final deliverables in Task 9.

TASK 9 Prepare Detailed Written Report and Deliver InfoSWMM Model

CONSULTANT will prepare a detailed Watershed Report that includes the existing conditions report, modeling results, maximum extent of flooding/inundation maps, and proposed mitigation alternatives, as detailed in Tasks 4 and 6.

The report shall also include an executive summary that identifies and prioritizes the recommended improvements and, if necessary, identifies improvements that would need to be completed in a specific order. A draft report will be prepared for City review, and a final report will be prepared based on City review comments.

The final report will also refine cost estimates as identified in Task 6.1 for the top five (5) improvements identified in the summary. The cost refinements will be based upon updated unit cost information provided by the City. The report will also include response to QA/QC comments as identified in Task 7.

Task 9 Deliverables:

Reports will be provided to the City as follows:

- 1) Two (2)-copies of a colored, bound hard copy report, including all necessary maps, exhibits, etc. as identified in the Scope of Services.
- 2) 1-digital copy of the document in the software in which it was prepared.
- 3) 1-digital copy of the document in PDF format.
- 4) Digital copies shall be provided on a hard drive or flash drive.

CONSULTANT will also provide:

The final InfoSWMM model, fully QA/QC'ed, to the City including the existing conditions models
for the respective storms as identified in Task 4 and all alternative analysis or scenarios as
identified in Task 6. The model shall be provided to the City on a hard drive.

2) All related files used in the creation of the InfoSWMM model shall be provided to the City as part of the final deliverables, including but not limited to, GIS, CADD, topographic surveys, Access database or Excel files.

PROJECT COORDINATION

TASK 10 Progress Meetings and Coordination

CONSULTANT will attend the kick-off meeting and up to fourteen (14) additional in-person monthly progress meetings as requested by the City and participate in preparing meeting minutes summarizing the discussions held during the meetings.

CONSULTANT will attend up to five (5) weekly progress meetings via conference call as-needed and participate in preparing meeting minutes summarizing the discussions held during the meetings.

Task 10 Deliverables: CONSULTANT will work with other CONSULTANT to provide meeting summaries within 3 days of each meeting.

ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES:

Responsibilities of the City of Madison

- 1. Provide the initial Purchase Order of \$10,000 for project start-up/initial modeling activities following selection of Consultant for each watershed study area.
- 2. The City of Madison Engineering Division will provide the following data as provided for in *Exhibit* 2: Data provided by City

 - d. Pipe data
 - e. Storm structure data

1. <u>General</u>. Throughout this document, "City of Madison," "City" and "Purchasing" shall be synonymous and mean the City of Madison. The words "bid" and "proposal" are synonymous, as are the words "bidder," "proposer" and "contractor." The phrases "request for proposal," "invitation for bids," "request," "invitation," and "solicitation" shall also be synonymous.

As applied to the winning or selected bidder, the words "bid," "proposal," and "contract" are synonymous.

2. <u>Entire Agreement, Order of Precedence</u>. These standard terms and conditions shall apply to any Purchase Order issued as a result of this Request for Bid/Proposal, except where expressly stated otherwise in the RFP or in a written instrument covering this purchase signed by an authorized representative of the City and the Contractor, in a form approved by the City Attorney (a "Separate Contract"). If such a separate contract is executed it shall constitute the entire agreement and no other terms and conditions, whether oral or written, shall be effective or binding unless expressly agreed to in writing by the City.

If a Separate Contract is not executed, these Standard Terms and Conditions, the City's request for proposals, the version of the vendor's bid that was accepted by the City, and the City's Purchase Order (if any) shall constitute a contract and will be the entire agreement.

Order of Precedence: If there is a conflict between this Section A and any terms in the vendor's accepted bid or proposal, this Section

A shall control unless the parties expressly agree to another order of precedence, in writing. If there is a conflict between this Section A and a Separate Contract, the terms and conditions of the Separate Contract shall control.

I. TERMS FOR SUBMISSION OF BIDS: The following section applies to the bid/selection process only.

3. This invitation for bids does not commit the City to award a contract, pay any costs incurred in preparation of bids, or to procure or contract for services or equipment. The City may require the bidder to participate in negotiation and to submit such additional price or technical or other revisions to his or her bids as may result from negotiation. The bidder shall be responsible for all costs incurred as part of his or her participation in the pre-award process.

The City reserves the right to accept or reject any or all bids submitted, in whole or in part, and to waive any informalities or technicalities which at the City's discretion are determined to be in the best interests of the City. Further, the City makes no representations that a contract will be awarded to any offeror responding to this request. The City expressly reserves the right to reject any and all bids responding to this invitation without indicating any reasons for such rejections(s).

The City reserves the right to postpone due dates and openings for its own convenience and to withdraw this solicitation at any time without prior notice.

- 4. <u>Addenda</u>. Changes affecting the specifications will be made by addenda. Changes may include, or result in, a postponement in the bid due date. Bidders are required to complete the Bidder Response Sheet, acknowledging receipt of all parts of the bid, including all addenda.
- 5. <u>Price Proposal</u>. All bidders are required to identify the proposed manufacturer and model, and to indicate the proposed delivery time on the attached Proposal Form. Failure to do so may cause the bid to be considered not responsive. If desired, the bidder may include product literature and specifications. The price quoted will remain firm throughout each contract period. Any price increase proposed shall be submitted sixty (60) calendar days prior to subsequent contract periods and shall be limited to fully documented cost increases to the bidder which are demonstrated to be industry-wide.
- 6. <u>Price Inclusion</u>. The price quoted in any bid shall include all items of labor, materials, tools, equipment, and other costs necessary to fully complete the furnishing and delivery of equipment or services pursuant to the specifications attached thereof. Any items omitted from the specifications which are clearly necessary for the completion of the project shall be considered a portion of the specifications although not directly specified or called for in these specifications.

7. Pricing and Discount.

- a. Unit prices shown on the bid/proposal or contract shall be the price per unit of sale (e.g., gal., cs., doz., ea., etc.) as stated on the bid/proposal or contract. For any given item, the quantity multiplied by the unit price shall establish the extended price. If an apparent mistake exists in the extended price, the unit price shall govern in the bid/proposal evaluation and contract administration.
- b. In determination of award, discounts for early payment will only be considered when all other conditions are equal. Early payment is defined as payment within fifteen (15) days providing the discount terms are deemed favorable. All payment terms must allow the option of Net 30.
- 8. <u>F.O.B. Destination Freight Prepaid</u>. Bid prices must include all handling, transportation and insurance charges. Failure to bid FOB Destination Freight Prepaid may disqualify your bid.

Award.

- a. The City will have sole discretion as to the methodology used in making the award. Where none is specified, the award will be made to the lowest responsible bidder in compliance with the specifications and requirements of this solicitation.
- b. The right is reserved to make a separate award of each item, group of items or all items, and to make an award in whole or in part, whichever is deemed in the best interest of the City.
- 10. <u>Responsiveness and Responsibility</u>. Award will be made to the responsible and responsive bidder whose bid is most advantageous to the City with price and other factors considered. For the purposes of this project, responsiveness is defined as the bidder's conformance to the requirements of the solicitation. Being not responsive includes the failure to furnish information requested.

Responsibility is defined as the bidder's potential ability to perform successfully under the terms of the proposed contract. Briefly, a responsible bidder has adequate financial resources or the ability to obtain said resources; can comply with required delivery taking into

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account other business commitments; has a satisfactory performance record; has a satisfactory record of integrity and business ethics; and has the necessary organization, experience and technical skills.

The City reserves the right to refuse to accept any bid from any person, firm or corporation that is in arrears or is in default to the City, or has failed to perform faithfully any previous contract with the City. If requested, the bidder must present within five (5) working days evidence satisfactory to the City of performance ability and possession of necessary facilities, financial resources, adequate insurance, and any other resources required to determine the bidder's ability to comply with the terms of this solicitation document.

11. Cancellation.

- a. The City reserves the right to cancel any contract in whole or in part without penalty due to non-appropriation of funds.
- b. In the event the Bidder shall default in any of the covenants, agreements, commitments, or conditions and any such default shall continue unremedied for a period of ten (10) days after written notice to the Bidder, the City may, at its option and in addition to all other rights and remedies which it may have, terminate the Agreement and all rights of the Bidder under the Agreement.
- c. Failure to maintain the required certificates of insurance, permits, licenses and bonds will be cause for contract termination. If the Bidder fails to maintain and keep in force the insurance, if required, the City shall have the right to cancel and terminate the contract without notice.
- II. CONDITIONS OF PURCHASE: The following section applies to purchases/contracts after the award. See Paragraphs 1 & 2 for applicability and order of precedence.

12. Specifications.

- a. All bidders must be in compliance with all specifications and any drawings provided with this solicitation. Exceptions taken to these specifications must be noted on your bid.
- b. When specific manufacturer and model numbers are used, they are to establish a design, type, construction, quality, functional capability and/or performance level desired. When alternates are bid/proposed, they must be identified by manufacturer, stock number, and the bidder/proposer is responsible for providing sufficient information to establish equivalency. The City shall be the sole judge of equivalency. Bidders are cautioned to avoid bidding alternates which do not meet specifications, which may result in rejection of their bid/proposal.

Seller represents and warrants that the goods or services furnished hereunder, including all labels, packages, and container for said goods, comply with all applicable standards, rules and regulations in effect under the requirements of all Federal, State and local laws, rules and regulations as applicable, including the Occupational Safety and Health Act (OSHA), as amended, with respect to design, manufacture or use for their intended purpose of said goods or services. Seller shall furnish Material Safety Data Sheets (MSDS) whenever applicable.
- b. If it is determined by the City that such standards are not met, the seller agrees to bear all costs required to meet the minimum standards as stated above for the equipment/products furnished under this contract.
- 14. <u>Warranty</u>. Unless otherwise specifically stated by the bidder, products shall be warranted against defects by the bidder for ninety (90) days from the date of receipt. If bidder or manufacturer offers warranty that exceeds 90 days, such warranty shall prevail.
- 15. Ownership of Printing Materials. All artwork, camera-ready copy, negative, dies, photos and similar materials used to produce a printing job shall become the property of the City. Any furnished materials shall remain the property of the City. Failure to meet this requirement will disqualify your bid.
- 16. <u>Item Return Policy</u>. Bidder will be required to accept return of products ordered in error for up to twenty-one (21) calendar days from date of receipt, with the City paying only the return shipping costs. Indicate in detail on the Bidder Response Sheet, your return policy.
- 17. Payment Terms and Invoicing. The City will pay properly submitted vendor invoices within thirty (30) days of receipt, providing good and/or services have been delivered, installed (if required), and accepted as specified.
 - a. Payment shall be considered timely if the payment is mailed, delivered, or transferred within thirty (30) days after receipt of a properly completed invoice, unless the vendor is notified in writing by the agency of a dispute before payment is due.
 - b. Invoices presented for payment must be submitted in accordance with instructions contained on the purchase order, including reference to purchase order and submittal to the correct address for processing. Invoice payment processing address is shown on the upper middle section of the purchase order. Send invoices to Accounts Payable address on the purchase order. Do not send invoices to Purchasing or ship to address.
 - c. Bidders, proposers shall include discounts for early payment as a percent reduction of invoice. Invoice discounts shall be determined where applicable, from the date of acceptance of goods and/or the receipt of invoice, whichever is later. Discounts for early payment terms stated on the bid/proposal must be shown plainly on the invoice; discounts for early payment not shown on the invoice will be taken.
 - d. Invoices submitted not in accordance with these instructions will be removed from the payment process and returned within ten (10) days.
- 18. <u>F.O.B. Destination Freight Prepaid</u>. Unless otherwise agreed in writing, the vendor shall bear all handling, transportation and insurance charges. Title of goods shall pass upon acceptance of goods at the City's dock.
- 19. <u>Tax Exemption</u>. The City of Madison is exempt from the payment of Federal Excise Tax and State Sales Tax. **The City Tax Exempt number** is **ES 42916**. Any other sales tax, use tax, imposts, revenues, excise, or other taxes which are now, or which may hereafter be imposed by Congress, the State of Wisconsin, or any other political subdivision thereof and applicable to the sale of material delivered as a result of the bidder's bid and which, by terms of the tax law, may be passed directly to the City, will be paid by the City.

20. Affirmative Action.

A. The following language applies to all successful bidders employing fifteen (15) or more employees (MGO 39.02(9)(c):

The Contractor agrees that, within thirty (30) days after the effective date of this Contract, Contractor will provide to the City of Madison Department of Civil Rights (the "Department"), certain workforce utilization statistics, using a form provided by the City.

If the Contract is still in effect, or if the City enters into a new Agreement with the Contractor, within one year after the date on which the form was required to be provided, the Contractor will provide updated workforce information using a second form, also to be furnished by the City. The second form will be submitted to the Department no later than one year after the date on which the first form was required to be provided.

The Contractor further agrees that, for at least twelve (12) months after the effective date of this Contract, it will notify the Department of each of its job openings at facilities in Dane County for which applicants not already employees of the Contractor are to be considered. The notice will include a job description, classification, qualifications, and application procedures and deadlines, shall be provided to the City by the opening date of advertisement and with sufficient time for the City to notify candidates and make a timely referral. The Contractor agrees to interview and consider candidates referred by the Department, or an organization designated by the Department, if the candidate meets the minimum qualification standards established by the Contractor, and if the referral is timely. A referral is timely if it is received by the Contractor on or before the date stated in the notice.

The Department will determine if a contractor is exempt from the above requirements (Sec. 20.A.) at the time the Request for Exemption in 20.B.(2) is made.

B. Articles of Agreement, Request for Exemption, and Release of Payment:

The "ARTICLES OF AGREEMENT" beginning on the following page, apply to all contractors, unless determined to be exempt under the following table and procedures:

- (1) <u>Exempt Status</u>: In this section, "Exempt" means the Contractor is exempt from the Articles of Agreement in section 20.B.(5) of this Contract and from filing an Affirmative Action plan as required by Section IV of the Articles of Agreement. The Department of Civil Rights ("Department") makes the final determination as to whether a contractor is exempt. If the Contractor is not exempt, sec. 20.B.(5) shall apply and Contractor shall select option A. or B. under Article IV therein and file an Affirmative Action Plan.
- (2) <u>Request for Exemption Fewer Than 15 Employees</u>: (MGO 39.02(9)(a)2.) Contractors who believe they are exempt based on number of employees shall submit a Request for Exemption on a form provided by the Department within thirty (30) days of the effective date of this Contract.
- (3) <u>Exemption Annual Aggregate Business</u>: (MGO 39.02(9)(a)c.): The Department will determine, at the time this Contract is presented for signature, if the Contractor is exempt because it will have less than \$50,000 in annual aggregate business with the City for the calendar year in which the contract is in effect. CONTRACTORS WITH 15 OR MORE EMPLOYEES WILL LOSE THIS EXEMPTION AND BECOME SUBJECT TO SEC. 20.B.(5) UPON REACHING \$50,000 OR MORE ANNUAL AGGREGATE BUSINESS WITH THE CITY WITHIN THE CALENDAR YEAR, BEGINNING IN 2019.
- (4) Release of Payment: (MGO 39.02(9)(e)1.b.) All non-exempt contractors must have an approved Affirmative Action plan meeting the requirements of Article IV below on file with the Department within thirty (30) days of the effective date of this Contract and prior to release of payment by the City. Contractors that are exempt based on number of employees agree to file a Request for Exemption with the Department within thirty (30) days of the effective date and prior to release of payment by the City.

(5) Articles of Agreement:

ARTICLE I

The Contractor shall take affirmative action in accordance with the provisions of this Contract to insure that applicants are employed, and that employees are treated during employment without regard to race, religion, color, age, marital status, disability, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or national origin and that the employer shall provide harassment-free work environment for the realization of the potential of each employee. Such action shall include, but not be limited to, the following: employment, upgrading, demotion or transfer, recruitment or recruitment advertising, layoff or termination, rates of pay or other forms of compensation and selection for training including apprenticeship insofar as it is within the control of the Contractor. The Contractor agrees to post in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants notices to be provided by the City setting out the provisions of the nondiscrimination clauses in this Contract.

ARTICLE II

The Contractor shall in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the Contractors state that all qualified or qualifiable applicants will be employed without regard to race, religion, color, age, marital status, disability, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or national origin.

^{**}As determined by the Department of Civil Rights

ARTICLE III

The Contractor shall send to each labor union or representative of workers with which it has a collective bargaining Agreement or other Contract or understanding a notice to be provided by the City advising the labor union or workers representative of the Contractor's equal employment opportunity and affirmative action commitments. Such notices shall be posted in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment.

ARTICLE IV

(This Article applies to non-public works contracts.)

The Contractor agrees that it will comply with all provisions of the Affirmative Action Ordinance of the City of Madison (MGO 39.02) including the Contract compliance requirements. The Contractor warrants and certifies that one of the following paragraphs is true (check one):

A. Contractor has prepared and has on file an affirmative action plan that meets the format requirements of Federal Revised Order No, 4, 41 CFR part 60-2, as established by 43 FR 51400 November 3, 1978, including appendices required by City of Madison ordinances or it has prepared and has on file a model affirmative action plan approved by the Madison Common Council.
 B. Within thirty (30) days after the effective date of this Contract, Contractor will complete an affirmative action plan that meets the format requirements of Federal Revised Order No. 4, 41 CFR Part 60-2, as established by 43 FR 51400, November 3, 1978, including appendices required by City of Madison ordinance or within thirty (30) days after the effective date of this Contract, it will complete a model affirmative action plan approved by the Madison Common Council.
 C. Contractor believes it is exempt from filing an affirmative action plan because it has fewer than fifteen (15) employees and has filed, or will file within thirty (30) days after the effective date of this Contract, a form required by the City to confirm exempt status based on number of employees. If the City determines that Contractor is not exempt, the Articles of Agreement will apply.
 D. Contractor believes it is exempt from filing an affirmative action plan because its annual aggregate business with the City for the calendar year in which the contract is in effect is less than fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000), or for another reason listed in MGO 39.02(9)(a)2. If the City determines that Contractor is not exempt, the Articles of Agreement will apply.

ARTICI F V

(This Article applies only to public works contracts.)

The Contractor agrees that it will comply with all provisions of the Affirmative Action Ordinance of the City of Madison, including the Contract compliance requirements. The Contractor agrees to submit the model affirmative action plan for public works Contractors in a form approved by the Director of Affirmative Action.

ARTICLE VI

The Contractor will maintain records as required by Section 39.02(9)(f) of the Madison General Ordinances and will provide the City's Department of Affirmative Action with access to such records and to persons who have relevant and necessary information, as provided in Section 39.02(9)(f). The City agrees to keep all such records confidential, except to the extent that public inspection is required by law.

ARTICLE VII

In the event of the Contractor's or subcontractor's failure to comply with the Equal Employment Opportunity and Affirmative Action provisions of this Contract or Sections 39.03 and 39.02 of the Madison General Ordinances, it is agreed that the City at its option may do any or all of the following:

- A. Cancel, terminate or suspend this Contract in whole or in part.
- B. Declare the Contractor ineligible for further City contracts until the Affirmative Action requirements are met.
- C. Recover on behalf of the City from the prime Contractor 0.5 percent of the Contract award price for each week that such party fails or refuses to comply, in the nature of liquidated damages, but not to exceed a total of five percent (5%) of the Contract price, or ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), whichever is less. Under public works contracts, if a subcontractor is in noncompliance, the City may recover liquidated damages from the prime Contractor in the manner described above. The preceding sentence shall not be construed to prohibit a prime Contractor from recovering the amount of such damage from the noncomplying subcontractor.

ARTICLE VIII

(This Article applies to public works contracts only.)

The Contractor shall include the above provisions of this Contract in every subcontract so that such provisions will be binding upon each subcontractor. The Contractor shall take such action with respect to any subcontractor as necessary to enforce such provisions, including sanctions provided for noncompliance.

ARTICLE IX

The Contractor shall allow the maximum feasible opportunity to small business enterprises to compete for any subcontracts entered into pursuant to this Contract. (In federally funded contracts the terms "DBE, MBE, and WBE" shall be substituted for the term "small business" in this Article.)

21. <u>Non-Discrimination</u>. In the performance of work under this Contract, the Contractor agrees not to discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, religion, marital status, age, color, sex, handicap, national origin or ancestry, income level or source of income, arrest record or conviction record, less than honorable discharge, physical appearance, sexual orientation, gender identity, political beliefs or student status. Contractor further agrees not to discriminate against any subcontractor or person who offers to subcontract on this Contract because of race, religion, color, age, disability, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or national origin.

- 22. <u>Prevailing Wage.</u> Where applicable under federal law, the Contractor warrants that prevailing wages will be paid to all trades and occupations.
- 23. <u>Indemnification</u>. The Contractor shall be liable to and hereby agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the City of Madison, and its officers, officials, agents, and employees against all loss or expense (including liability costs and attorney's fees) by reason of any claim or suit, or of liability imposed by law upon the City or its officers, officials, agents or employees for damages because of bodily injury, including death at any time resulting therefrom, sustained by any person or persons or on account of damages to property, including loss of use thereof, arising from, in connection with, caused by or resulting from the acts or omissions of Contractor and any of Contractor's subcontractors in the performance of this agreement, whether caused by or contributed to by the negligence of the City or its officers, officials, agents or employees.

24. Insurance.

The Contractor will insure, and will require each subcontractor to insure, as indicated, against the following risks to the extent stated below. The Contractor shall not commence work under this Contract, nor shall the Contractor allow any Subcontractor to commence work on its Subcontract, until the insurance required below has been obtained and corresponding certificate(s) of insurance have been approved by the City Risk Manager.

- a. Commercial General Liability The Contractor shall procure and maintain during the life of this contract, Commercial General Liability insurance including, but not limited to, products and completed operations, bodily injury, property damage, personal injury, and products and completed operations (unless determined to be inapplicable by the Risk Manager) in an amount not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence. This policy shall also provide contractual liability in the same amount. Contractor's coverage shall be primary and list the City of Madison, its officers, officials, agents and employees as additional insureds. Contractor shall require all subcontractors under this Contract (if any) to procure and maintain insurance meeting the above criteria, applying on a primary basis and listing the City of Madison, its officers, officials, agents and employees as additional insureds.
- b. Automobile Liability The Contractor shall procure and maintain during the life of this contract Business Automobile Liability insurance covering owned, non-owned and hired automobiles with limits of not less than \$1,000,000 combined single limit per accident. Contractor shall require all subcontractors under this Contract (if any) to procure and maintain insurance covering each subcontractor and meeting the above criteria.
- c. Worker's Compensation The Contractor shall procure and maintain during the life of this contract statutory Workers' Compensation insurance as required by the State of Wisconsin. The Contractor shall also carry Employers Liability limits of at least \$100,000 Each Accident, \$100,000 Disease Each Employee, and \$500,000 Disease Policy Limit. Contractor shall require all subcontractors under this Contract (if any) to procure and maintain such insurance, covering each subcontractor.
- d. Professional Liability The Contractor shall procure and maintain professional liability insurance with coverage of not less than \$1,000,000. If such policy is a "claims made" policy, all renewals thereof during the life of the contract shall include "prior acts coverage" covering at all times all claims made with respect to Contractor's work performed under the contract. This Professional Liability coverage must be kept in force for a period of six (6) years after the services have been accepted by the City.
- e. Acceptability of Insurers The above-required insurance is to be placed with insurers who have an A.M. Best rating of no less than A-(A minus) and a Financial Category rating of no less than VII.
- f. Proof of Insurance, Approval. The Contractor shall provide the City with certificate(s) of insurance showing the type, amount, effective dates, and expiration dates of required policies prior to commencing work under this Contract. Contractor shall provide the certificate(s) to the City's representative upon execution of the Contract, or sooner, for approval by the City Risk Manager. If any of the policies required above expire while this Contract is in effect, Contractor shall provide renewal certificate(s) to the City for approval. Certificate Holder language should be listed as follows:

The Contractor shall provide copies of additional insured endorsements or insurance policies, if requested by the City Risk Manager. The Contractor and/or Insurer shall give the City thirty (30) days advance written notice of cancellation, non-renewal or material changes to any of the above-required policies during the term of this Contract.

25. Work Site Damages. Any damage, including damage to finished surfaces, resulting from the performance of this contract shall be repaired to the Owner's satisfaction at the Contractor's expense.

26. Compliance.

- a. Regulations. The Contractor shall give all notices and comply with all laws, ordinances, rules, regulations and lawful orders of any public authority bearing on the performance of the work.
- b. Licensing and Permits. The Contractor selected under this bid shall be required to demonstrate valid **possession of appropriate required licenses and will** keep them in effect for the term of this contract. The Contractor shall also be required, when appropriate, to obtain the necessary building permits prior to performing work on City facilities.

27. Warranty of Materials and Workmanship.

- a. The Contractor warrants that, unless otherwise specified, all materials and equipment incorporated in the work under the Contract shall be new, first class, and in accordance with the Contract Documents. The Contractor further warrants that all workmanship shall be first class and in accordance with the Contract Documents and shall be performed by persons qualified in their respective trades.
- b. Work not conforming to these warranties shall be considered defective.
- c. This warranty of materials and workmanship is separate and independent from and in addition to any other guarantees in this Contract.
- 28. Replacement of Defective Work or Materials. Any work or material found to be in any way defective or unsatisfactory shall be corrected or replaced by the Contractor at its own expense at the order of the City notwithstanding that it may have been previously overlooked or passed

by an inspector. Inspection shall not relieve the Contractor of its obligations to furnish materials and workmanship in accordance with this contract and its specifications.

- 29. Reservation of the Right to Inspect Work. At any time during normal business hours and as often as the City may deem necessary, the Contractor shall permit the authorized representatives of the City to review and inspect all materials and workmanship at any time during the duration of this contract, provided, however, the City is under no duty to make such inspections, and any inspection so made shall not relieve the Contractor from any obligation to furnish materials and workmanship strictly in accordance with the instructions, contract requirements and specifications.
- 30. Sweatfree Procurement of Items of Apparel. If this bid results in the procurement of \$5,000 or more in garments or items of clothing, any part of which is a textile, or any shoes/ footwear, then Sec. 4.25 of the Madison General Ordinances, "Procurement of Items of Apparel", is hereby incorporated by reference and made part of this contract. See Section 4.25(2) at www.municode.com for applicability specifics. The contractor shall follow labor practices consistent with international standards of human rights, meaning that, at a minimum, contractor shall adhere to the minimum employment standards found in Section 4.25 and shall require all subcontractors and third-party suppliers to do the same. For purposes of sec. 4.25, "Subcontractor" means a person, partnership, corporation or other entity that enters into a contract with the contractor for performance of some or all of the City-contracted work and includes all third-party suppliers or producers from whom the contractor or its contractors obtains or sources goods, parts or supplies for use on the city contract and is intended to include suppliers at all level of the supply chain. The standards in Sec. 4.25 shall apply in all aspects of the contractor's and subcontractor's operations, including but not limited to, manufacture, assembly, finishing, laundering or dry cleaning, (where applicable), warehouse distribution, and delivery. Contractor acknowledges that by entering into this contract, Contractor shall be subject to all of the requirements and sanctions of sec. 4.25 of the Madison General Ordinances.

The sanctions for violating Sec. 4.25 under an existing contract are as follows:

- a. Withholding of payments under an existing contract.
- b. Liquidated damages. The contractor may be charged liquidated damages on an existing contract of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) per violation, or an amount equaling twenty percent (20%) of the value of the apparel, garments or corresponding accessories, equipment, materials, or supplies that the City demonstrates were produced in violation of the contract and/or this ordinance per violation; whichever is greater.
- c. Termination, suspension or cancellation of a contract in whole or in part.
- d. Nonrenewal when a contract calls for optional renewals.
- e. Nonrenewal for lack of progress or impossible compliance. The City reserves the right to refuse to renew the contract that calls for optional renewals, when the contractor cannot comply with the minimum standard under (4)(b) and the noncompliance is taking place in a country where:
 - (1) Progress toward implementation of the standards in this Ordinance is no longer being made; and
 - (2) Compliance with the employment standards in the Ordinance is deemed impossible by the City and/or any independent monitoring agency acting on behalf of the City. Such determination shall be made in the sole opinion of the City and may be based upon examination of reports from governmental, human rights, labor and business organizations and after consultation with the relevant contractors and sub-contractors and any other evidence the City deems reliable.
- f. Disqualification of the contractor from bidding or submitting proposals on future City contracts, or from eligibility for future city procurements as defined in sub. (2), whether or not formal bidding or requests for proposals are used, for a period of one (1) year after the first violation is found and for a period of three (3) years after a second or subsequent violation is found. The disqualification shall apply to the contractor who committed the violation(s) whether that be under the same corporate name, or as an individual, or under the name of another corporation or business entity of which he or she is a member, partner, officer, or agent.

The exercise by the City of any or all of the above remedies, or failure to so exercise, shall not be construed to limit other remedies available to the City under this Contract nor to any other remedies available at equity or at law.

31. <u>Local Purchasing</u>. The City of Madison has adopted a local preference purchasing policy granting a 5 percent request for proposal and 1 percent request for bid scoring preference to local vendors.

To facilitate the identification of local suppliers, the City has provided an on-line website as an opportunity for suppliers to voluntarily identify themselves as local, and to assist City staff with their buying decisions. Proposers seeking to obtain local preference are required to register on the City of Madison online registration website. Only vendors registered as of the bid due date will receive preference. Additional information is available at: www.cityofmadison.com/business/localPurchasing.

- 32. Weapons Prohibition. Contractor shall prohibit, and shall require its subcontractors to prohibit, its employees from carrying weapons, including concealed weapons, in the course of performance of work under this Contract, other than while at the Contractor's or subcontractor's own business premises. This requirement shall apply to vehicles used at any City work site and vehicles used to perform any work under this Contract, except vehicles that are an employee's "own motor vehicle" pursuant to Wis. Stat. sec. 175.60(15m). This section does not apply to employees who are required to carry a weapon under the express terms of the Contract (such as armed security guard services, etc.).
- 33. Software & Technology Purchases.
 - a. <u>Software Licenses</u>. All software license agreements shall include the City's mandatory legal terms and conditions as determined by the City Attorney. Please be advised that no City employee has the authority to bind the City by clicking on an End User License Agreement (EULA) or any other click-through terms and conditions without being specifically authorized by the City's Chief Information Officer through procedures approved by the City Attorney and Risk Manager. All legal documents associated with the purchase or download of software must be reviewed by the City Attorney and may only be signed by an individual authorized to do so.
 - b. <u>Network Connection Policy</u>. If this purchase includes software support, software maintenance, network services, and/or system development services and will require a Network Connection the City Network (as defined in the following link), the City's Network Connection Policy found at this link: www.cityofmadison.com/attorney/documents/posNetworkConnection.doc is hereby incorporated and made a part of the Contract and Contractor agrees to comply with all of its requirements.

34. Ban the Box - Arrest and Criminal Background Checks.

This provision applies to service contracts of more than \$25,000 executed by the City on January 1, 2016 or later, unless exempt by Sec. 39.08 of the Madison General Ordinances (MGO).

a. <u>Definitions</u>. For purposes of this requirement, "Arrest and Conviction Record" includes, but is not limited to, information indicating that a person has been questioned, apprehended, taken into custody or detention, held for investigation, arrested, charged with, indicted or tried for any felony, misdemeanor or other offense pursuant to any law enforcement or military authority.

"Conviction record" includes, but is not limited to, information indicating that a person has been convicted of a felony, misdemeanor or other offense, placed on probation, fined, imprisoned or paroled pursuant to any law enforcement or military authority.

"Background Check" means the process of checking an applicant's arrest and conviction record, through any means.

- b. Requirements. For the duration of any contract awarded under this RFP, the successful contractor shall:
 - (1) Remove from all job application forms any questions, check boxes, or other inquiries regarding an applicant's arrest and conviction record, as defined herein.
 - (2) Refrain from asking an applicant in any manner about their arrest or conviction record until after a conditional offer of employment is made to the applicant in question.
 - (3) Refrain from conducting a formal or informal background check or making any other inquiry using any privately or publicly available means of obtaining the arrest or conviction record of an applicant until after a conditional offer of employment is made to the applicant in question.
 - (4) Make information about this ordinance available to applicants and existing employees, and post notices in prominent locations at the workplace with information about the ordinance and complaint procedure, using language provided by the City.
 - (5) Comply with all other provisions of Sec. 39.08, MGO.
- c. Exemptions: This section does not apply when:
 - (1) Hiring for a position where certain convictions or violations are a bar to employment in that position under applicable law, or
 - (2) Hiring a position for which information about criminal or arrest record, or a background check is required by law to be performed at a time or in a manner that would otherwise be prohibited by this ordinance, including a licensed trade or profession where the licensing authority explicitly authorizes or requires the inquiry in question.

To be exempt under sec. C.1. or 2. above, contractor must demonstrate to the City that there is a law or regulation that requires the background check in question. If so, the contractor is exempt from this section for the position(s) in question.

- Cancel, terminate or suspend this Contract in whole or in part.

14. SEVERABILITY.

It is mutually agreed that in case any provision of this Contract is determined by any court of law to be unconstitutional, illegal or unenforceable, it is the intention of the parties that all other provisions of this Contract remain in full force and effect.

16. STATUS OF CONTRACTOR/INDEPENDENT/TAX FILING.

It is agreed that Contractor is an independent Contractor and not an employee of the City, and that any persons who the Contractor utilizes and provides for services under this Contract are employees of the Contractor and are not employees of the City of Madison.

Contractor shall provide its taxpayer identification number (or social security number) to the Finance Director, 210 Martin Luther King Jr. Blvd, Room 406, Madison, WI 53703, prior to payment. The Contractor is informed that as an independent Contractor, s/he may have a responsibility to make estimated tax returns, file tax returns, and pay income taxes and make social security payments on the amounts received under this Contract and that no amounts will be withheld from payments made to this Contractor for these purposes and that payment of taxes and making social security payments are solely the responsibility and obligation of the Contractor. The Contractor is further informed that s/he may be subject to civil and/or criminal penalties if s/he fails to properly report income and pay taxes and social security taxes on the amount received under this Contract.

17. GOODWILL

Any and all goodwill arising out of this Contract inures solely to the benefit of the City; Contractor waives all claims to benefit of such goodwill.

18. THIRD PARTY RIGHTS.

This Contract is intended to be solely between the parties hereto. No part of this Contract shall be construed to add, supplement, amend, abridge or repeal existing rights, benefits or privileges of any third party or parties, including but not limited to employees of either of the parties.

19. AUDIT AND RETAINING OF DOCUMENTS.

The Contractor agrees to provide all reports requested by the City including, but not limited to, financial statements and reports, reports and accounting of services rendered, and any other reports or documents requested. Financial and service reports shall be provided according to a schedule (when applicable) to be included in this Contract. Any other reports or documents shall be provided within five (5) working days after the Contractor receives the City's written requests, unless the parties agree in writing on a longer period. Payroll records and any other documents relating to the performance of services under the terms of this Contract shall be retained by the Contractor for a period of three (3) years after completion of all work under this Contract, in order to be available for audit by the City or its designee.

20. CHOICE OF LAW AND FORUM SELECTION.

This Contract shall be governed by and construed, interpreted and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Wisconsin. The parties agree, for any claim or suit or other dispute relating to this Contract that cannot be mutually resolved, the venue shall be a court of competent jurisdiction within the State of Wisconsin and the parties agree to submit themselves to the jurisdiction of said court, to the exclusion of any other judicial district that may have jurisdiction over such a dispute according to any law..

21. COMPLIANCE WITH APPLICABLE LAWS.

The Contractor shall become familiar with, and shall at all times comply with and observe all federal, state, and local laws, ordinances, and regulations which in any manner affect the services or conduct of the Contractor and its agents and employees.

22. **CONFLICT OF INTEREST.**

- A. The Contractor warrants that it and its agents and employees have no public or private interest, and will not acquire directly or indirectly any such interest, which would conflict in any manner with the performance of the services under this Agreement.
- B. The Contractor shall not employ or Contract with any person currently employed by the City for any services included under the provisions of this Agreement.

23. COMPENSATION.

It is expressly understood and agreed that in no event will the total compensation under this Contract exceed \$

24. BASIS FOR PAYMENT.

A. GENERAL

- (1) The City will pay the Contractor for the completed and accepted services rendered under this Contract on the basis and at the Contract price set forth in Section 23 of this Contract. The City will pay the Contractor for completed and approved "extra services", if any, if such "extra services" are authorized according to the procedure established in this section. The rate of payment for "extra services" shall be the rate established in this Contract. Such payment shall be full compensation for services rendered and for all labor, material, supplies, equipment and incidentals necessary to complete the services.
- (2) The Contractor shall submit invoices, on the form or format approved by the City and as may be further specified in Section 3 of this Contract. The City will pay the Contractor in accordance with the schedule, if any, set forth in Section 3. The final invoice, if applicable, shall be submitted to the City within three months of completion of services under this Agreement.
- (3) Should this Agreement contain more than one service, a separate invoice and a separate final statement shall be submitted for each individual service.
- (4) Payment shall not be construed as City acceptance of unsatisfactory or defective services or improper materials.
- (5) Final payment of any balance due the Contractor will be made upon acceptance by the City of the services under the Agreement and upon receipt by the City of documents required to be returned or to be furnished by the Contractor under this Agreement.
- (6) The City has the equitable right to set off against any sum due and payable to the Contractor under this Agreement, any amount the City determines the Contractor owes the City, whether arising under this Agreement or under any other Agreement or otherwise.
- (7) Compensation in excess of the total Contract price will not be allowed unless authorized by an amendment under Section 9, AMENDMENT.
- (8) The City will not compensate for unsatisfactory performance by the Contractor.

B. SÉRVICE ORDERS, EXTRA SERVICE, OR DECREASED SERVICE.

- (1) Written orders regarding the services, including extra services or decreased services, will be given by the City, using the procedure set forth in Section 15, NOTICES.

- (3) If in the Contractor's opinion the order for extra service would entitle it to extra compensation or extra time, or both, the Contractor shall not proceed to carry out the extra service, but shall notify the City, pursuant to Section 15 of this Agreement. The notification shall include the justification for the claim for extra compensation or extra time, or both, and the amount of additional fee or time requested.
- (4) The City shall review the Contractor's submittal and respond in writing, either authorizing the Contractor to perform the extra service, or refusing to authorize it. The Contractor shall not receive additional compensation or time unless the extra compensation is authorized by the City in writing.

25. **DEFAULT/TERMINATION.**

- A. In the event Contractor shall default in any of the covenants, agreements, commitments, or conditions herein contained, and any such default shall continue unremedied for a period of ten (10) days after written notice thereof to Contractor, the City may, at its option and in addition to all other rights and remedies which it may have at law or in equity against Contractor, including expressly the specific enforcement hereof, forthwith have the cumulative right to immediately terminate this Contract and all rights of Contractor under this Contract.
- B. Notwithstanding paragraph A., above, the City may in its sole discretion and without any reason terminate this Agreement at any time by furnishing the Contractor with ten (10) days' written notice of termination. In the event of termination under this subsection, the City will pay for all work completed by the Contractor and accepted by the City.

26. **INDEMNIFICATION.**

The Contractor shall be liable to and hereby agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the City of Madison, and its officers, officials, agents, and employees against all loss or expense (including liability costs and attorney's fees) by reason of any claim or suit, or of liability imposed by law upon the City or its officers, officials, agents or employees for damages because of bodily injury, including death at any time resulting therefrom, sustained by any person or persons or on account of damages to property, including loss of use thereof, arising from, in connection with, caused by or resulting from the contractors and/or any subcontractor's negligent acts, errors or omissions, in the performance of this Agreement.

27. INSURANCE.

A. The Contractor will insure, and will require each subcontractor to insure, as indicated, against the following risks to the extent stated below. The Contractor shall not commence work under this Contract, nor shall the Contractor allow any

Subcontractor to commence work on its Subcontract, until the insurance coverage required below has been obtained and approved by the City Risk Manager, under the procedures in Section 27.C., below.

Commercial General Liability

The Contractor shall procure and maintain during the life of this Contract, Commercial General Liability insurance including, but not limited to bodily injury, property damage, personal injury, and products and completed operations (unless determined to be inapplicable by the Risk Manager) in an amount not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence. This policy shall also provide contractual liability in the same amount. Contractor's coverage shall be primary and list the City of Madison, its officers, officials, agents and employees as additional insureds. Contractor shall require all subcontractors under this Contract (if any) to procure and maintain insurance meeting the above criteria, applying on a primary basis and listing the City of Madison, its officers, officials, agents and employees as additional insureds.

Automobile Liability

The Contractor shall procure and maintain during the life of this Contract Business Automobile Liability insurance covering owned, non-owned and hired automobiles with limits of not less than \$1,000,000 combined single limit per accident. Contractor shall require all subcontractors under this Contract (if any) to procure and maintain insurance covering each subcontractor and meeting the above criteria.

Worker's Compensation

The Contractor shall procure and maintain during the life of this Contract statutory Workers' Compensation insurance as required by the State of Wisconsin. The Contractor shall also carry Employers Liability limits of at least \$100,000 Each Accident, \$100,000 Disease – Each Employee, and \$500,000 Disease – Policy Limit. Contractor shall require all subcontractors under this Contract (if any) to procure and maintain such insurance, covering each subcontractor.

Professional Liability

The Contractor shall procure and maintain professional liability insurance with coverage of not less than \$1,000,000. If such policy is a "claims made" policy, all renewals thereof during the life of the Contract shall include "prior acts coverage" covering at all times all claims made with respect to Contractor's work performed under the Contract. This Professional Liability coverage must be kept in force for a period of six (6) years after the services have been accepted by the City.

- B. <u>Acceptability of Insurers</u>. The above-required insurance is to be placed with insurers who have an A.M. Best rating of no less than A- (A minus) and a Financial Category rating of no less than VII.
- C. Proof of Insurance, Approval. The Contractor shall provide the City with certificate(s) of insurance showing the type, amount, effective dates, and expiration dates of required policies prior to commencing work under this Contract. Contractor shall provide the certificate(s) to the City's representative upon execution of the Contract, or sooner, for approval by the City Risk Manager. If any of the policies required above expire while this Contract is still in effect, Contractor shall provide renewal certificate(s) to the City for approval. Certificate Holder language should be listed as follows:

City of Madison ATTN: Risk Management, Room 406 210 Martin Luther King, Jr. Blvd. Madison, WI 53703

The Contractor shall provide copies of additional insured endorsements or insurance policies, if requested by the City Risk Manager.

D. <u>Notice of Cancellation</u>. The Contractor and/or Insurer shall give the City thirty (30) days advance written notice of cancellation, non-renewal or material changes to any of the above-required policies during the term of this Contract.

28. OWNERSHIP OF CONTRACT PRODUCT.

All of the work product, including, but not limited to, documents, materials, files, reports, data, including magnetic tapes, disks of computer-aided designs or other electronically stored data or information (the "Documents"), which the Contractor prepares pursuant to the terms and conditions of this Contract are the sole property of the City. The Contractor will not publish any such materials or use them for any research or publication, other than as expressly required or permitted by this Contract, without the prior written permission of the City. The grant or denial of such permission shall be at the City's sole discretion.

The Contractor intends that the copyright to the Documents shall be owned by City, whether as author (as a Work Made For Hire), or by assignment from Contractor to City. The parties expressly agree that the Documents shall be considered a Work Made For Hire as defined by Title 17, United States Code, Section 101(2).

As further consideration for the City entering into this Contract, the Contractor hereby assigns to City all of the Contractor's rights, title, interest and ownership in the Documents, including the right to procure the copyright therein and the right to secure any renewals, reissues and extensions of any such copyright in any foreign country. The City shall be entitled to the sole and exclusive benefit of the Documents, including the copyright thereto, and whenever required by the City, the Contractor shall at no additional compensation, execute all documents of assignment of the full and exclusive benefit and copyright thereof to the City. Any subcontractors and other independent Contractors who prepare portions of the Documents shall be required by the Contractor to execute an assignment of ownership in favor of the City before commencing work.

29. BAN THE BOX - ARREST AND CRIMINAL BACKGROUND CHECKS. (Sec. 39.08, MGO. Applicable to contracts exceeding \$25,000.)

A. DEFINITIONS.

For purposes of this section, "Arrest and Conviction Record" includes, but is not limited to, information indicating that a person has been questioned, apprehended, taken into custody or detention, held for investigation, arrested, charged with, indicted or tried for any felony, misdemeanor or other offense pursuant to any law enforcement or military authority.

"Conviction record" includes, but is not limited to, information indicating that a person has been convicted of a felony, misdemeanor or other offense, placed on probation, fined, imprisoned or paroled pursuant to any law enforcement or military authority.

"Background Check" means the process of checking an applicant's arrest and conviction record, through any means.

- B. REQUIREMENTS. For the duration of this Contract, the Contractor shall:
 - (1) Remove from all job application forms any questions, check boxes, or other inquiries regarding an applicant's arrest and conviction record, as defined herein.
 - (2) Refrain from asking an applicant in any manner about their arrest or conviction record until after conditional offer of employment is made to the applicant in question.
 - (3) Refrain from conducting a formal or informal background check or making any other inquiry using any privately or publicly available means of obtaining the arrest or conviction record of an applicant until after a conditional offer of employment is made to the applicant in question.
 - (4) Make information about this ordinance available to applicants and existing employees, and post notices in prominent locations at the workplace with information about the ordinance and complaint procedure using language provided by the City.
 - Comply with all other provisions of Sec. 39.08, MGO.
- C. EXEMPTIONS: This section does not apply when:
 - (1) Hiring for a position where certain convictions or violations are a bar to employment in that position under applicable law, or
 - (2) Hiring a position for which information about criminal or arrest record, or a background check is required by law to be performed at a time or in a manner that would otherwise be prohibited by this ordinance, including a licensed trade or profession where the licensing authority explicitly authorizes or requires the inquiry in question.

To be exempt under sec. C.(1) or (2) above, Contractor must demonstrate to the City that there is a law or regulation that requires the hiring practice in question. If so, the contractor is exempt from this section for the position(s) in question.

30. WEAPONS PROHIBITION.

Contractor shall prohibit, and shall require its subcontractors to prohibit, its employees from carrying weapons, including concealed weapons, in the course of performance of work under this Contract, other than while at the Contractor's or subcontractor's own business premises. This requirement shall apply to vehicles used at any City work site and vehicles used to perform any work under this Contract, except vehicles that are an employee's "own motor vehicle" pursuant to Wis. Stat. sec. 175.60(15m).

31. **AUTHORITY.**

Contractor represents that it has the authority to enter into this Contract. If the Contractor is not an individual, the person signing on behalf of the Contractor represents and warrants that he or she has been duly authorized to bind the Contractor and sign this Contract on the Contractor's behalf.

32. COUNTERPARTS, ELECTRONIC DELIVERY.

This Contract may be signed in counterparts, each of which shall be taken together as a whole to comprise a single document. Signatures on this Contract may be exchanged between the parties by facsimile, electronic scanned copy (.pdf) or similar technology and shall be as valid as original. Executed copies or counterparts of this Contract may be delivered by facsimile or email and upon receipt will be deemed original and binding upon the parties hereto, whether or not a hard copy is also delivered. Copies of this Contract, fully executed, shall be as valid as an original.

Exhibit 1a - Dunn's Marsh

Dunn's Marsh Watershed is approximately 652 acres located in southern Madison (see included figure of watershed). It is fully developed and is composed of several land uses including residential and commercial. The watershed spans both the City of Madison and City of Fitchburg.

Areas of this watershed have experienced flash flooding issues over the past several years. In some instances this flash flooding has caused structural and infrastructure damage. This watershed study will focus on mitigation of the flooding within the City of Madison. It is not anticipated that modifications to Dunn's Marsh will be necessary.

Consultants should be aware that the City of Madison, City of Fitchburg, and Dane County will be conducting a separate, but related, flood study for the bike 'roundabout' area near the Southwest Bike Path, immediately adjacent to Dunn's Marsh. Information related to that study will be shared with consultants when it becomes available.

Consultants shall note that the City's flood mitigation goals include not moving flooding from one area to another. Because of flash flooding issues in Fitchburg, for the purpose of this study it should be assumed that the culverts under Verona Road that discharge to Dunn's Marsh should be controlling factors in the model.

An existing InfoSWMM model is not available for this watershed.

Data for City of Fitchburg infrastructure can be found on the City of Fitchburg's open data website. It is the expectation that alternatives will not be developed to alleviate flooding occurring in the City of Fitchburg. However, solutions provided to alleviate flooding in the City of Madison shall not adversely impact flood conditions in the City of Fitchburg. Consultants will be required to coordinate with the City of Fitchburg and Dane County as needed to obtain records and data to complete the study.

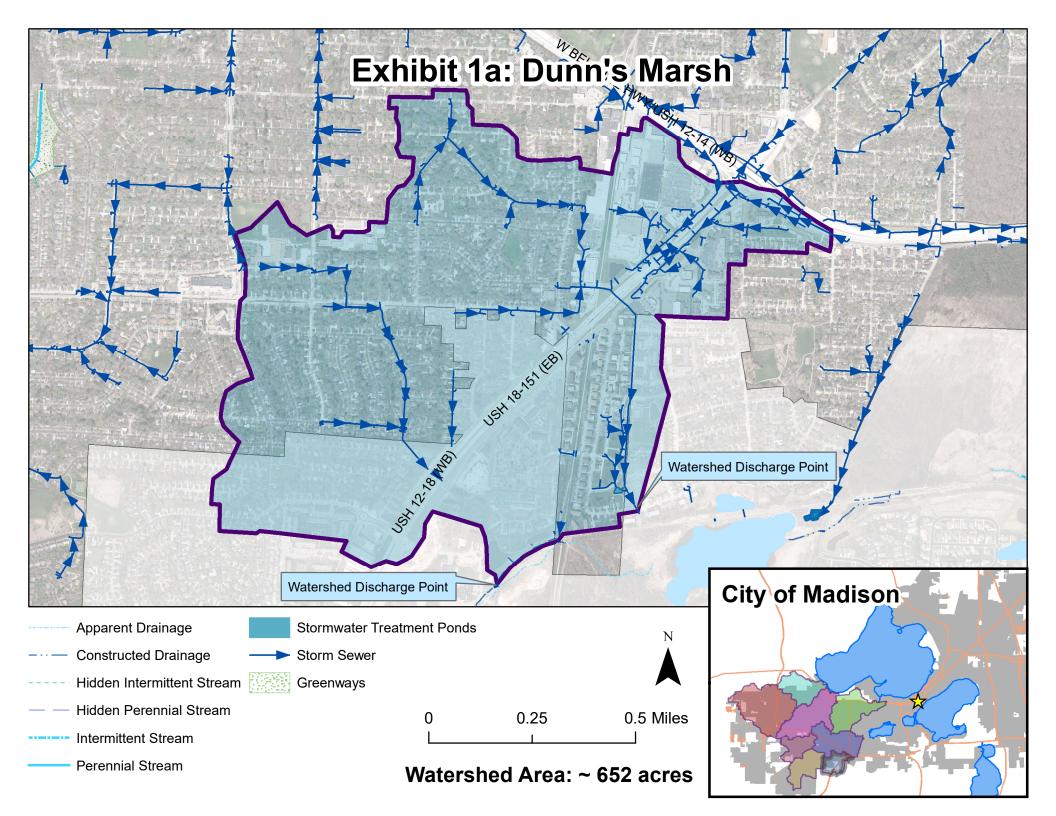


Exhibit 1b - McKenna/Green Tree Watershed

McKenna/Green Tree Watershed is approximately 1,148 acres located in southwestern Madison (see included figure of watershed). It is partially developed and is composed of several land uses including agricultural, residential, and commercial. For purposes of this study, the watershed discharge point is where it enters the Confluence Ponds located on Raymond Road.

Flash flooding has occurred in this watershed. In some instances this flash flooding has caused structural and infrastructure damage.

Specific areas of this watershed that have experiences severe flooding and property damage include the Park Edge/Park Ridge neighborhood. The City is in the process of letting a contract for the construction of a large flood mitigation project in May 2019 that will address flooding in this immediate area. The flood mitigation project entails construction of a 4-cell box culvert system and lined channel within the greenway that connects to Elver Park and continues north of the Struck Street and Schroeder Road intersection. The City will provide the construction drawings for this reconstruction.

They City has a long term plan of acquiring properties located along Mid Town Road and Raymond Road for use of future park and regional stormwater management, as seen in the High Point - Raymond Neighborhood Development Plan. Recommendations for the regional stormwater management will be required as part of this study.

Consultants shall note that the City's flood mitigation goals include not moving flooding from one area to another. Because of this, for the purpose of this study it should be assumed that the 60" RCP discharging to the confluence pond at Raymond Road at Marty Road should be a controlling factors in the model.

An existing InfoSWMM model is available for a portion of this watershed to inform the flood mitigation project mentioned above. This model will be provided to consultants for use.

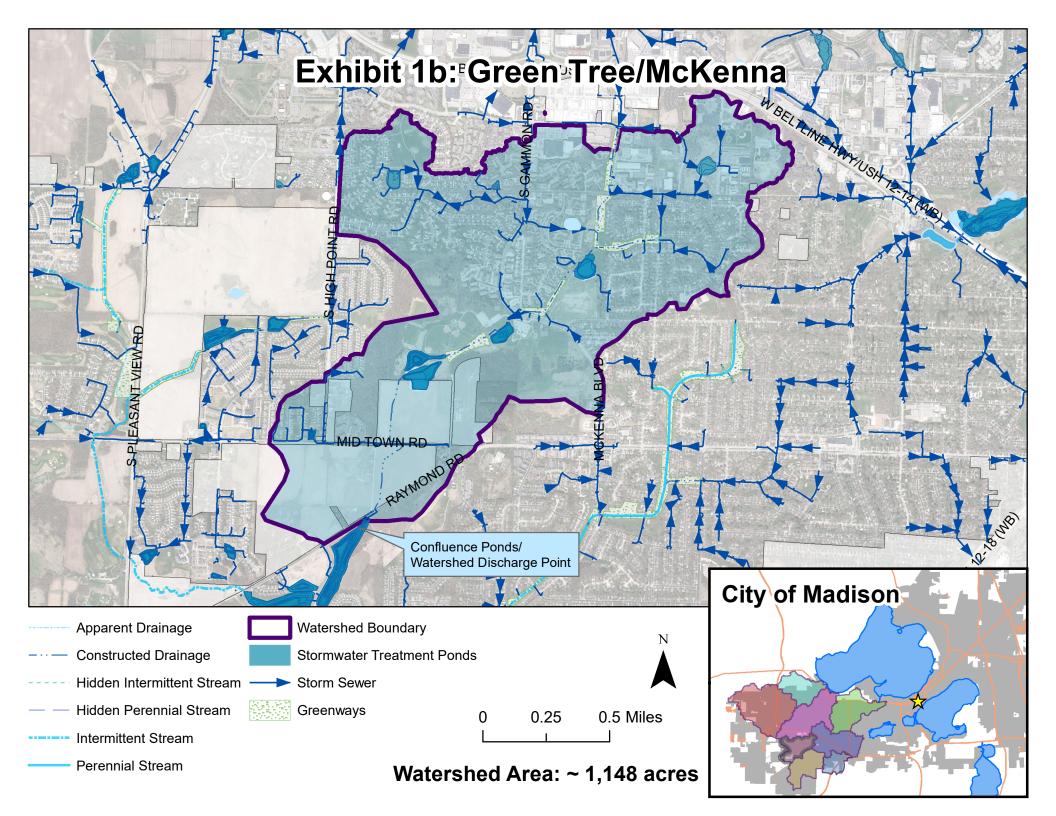

 - Data was mapped where private storm connects into the public storm sewer. This data is from parking lot construction plans from private development

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INFOSWMM MODELING GUIDANCE

The City recognizes that an important aspect of modeling is professional judgement; and it will be up to the Consultant to appropriately define parameters, variables, and methodology. However, it is in the City's best interest to aim for relative uniformity amongst all City models. Therefore, the Consultant may be expected to justify, document, and in some instances, modify various model inputs and assumptions.

City of Madison Flood Mitigation Goals

- 1. No home or business will be flooded during the 100-year design storm.
- 2. Eliminate flooding from the storm sewer system for up to the 10-year design storm; all water shall be contained within the pipes and structures (exception: low points).
- 3. Allow no more than 0.5 ft of water above storm sewer inlet rim at inlet-restricted low points for up to the 10-year design storm.
- 4. Centerline of street to remain passable during 25-year design storm with no more than 0.2ft of water at the centerline.
 - a. Note that the Watershed Study modeling approach will not explicitly account for cross flow conditions where more gutter flow on one side of the street can overtop the crown.
- 5. Enclosed depressions to be served to the 100-year design storm (which can include safe overland flow within street, easements, greenways or other public lands).
- 6. Greenway crossings at streets to be served to the 100-year design storm.
- 7. Provide flooding solutions that do not negatively impact downstream properties.
- 8. For the purpose of the RFP "deficiencies" in the system shall be defined as existing infrastructure, drainage capacity or system limitations that fail to meet the goals stated in 1-7 above.

Guidance for Solutions:

- 1. Assumption that all watershed deficiencies will be reviewed, and solutions will be provided up to the 100-yr design storm.
- 2. Assumption that flooding that occurs in events exceeding the 100-year storm will not be prioritized for engineering solutions but will be identified in existing conditions model for 500-year event storms.
- 3. Proposed solutions will be identified for only the publicly owned drainage system. Drainage issues that are private (water from the public infrastructure such as streets, greenways, ponds and/or easements is not the cause of the drainage issue) will not require modeling solutions but should be identified where possible in the existing conditions analysis so staff may work with property owners if necessary. (See Also Hydraulics section of Modeling Guidance for discussion on private system existing conditions modeling.)

DATA SOURCES:

In the report, document the file name and date for the following data sources:

- Land Use
- LiDAR
- Storm Sewer
- Culverts
- Greenways
- Planimetric Data
- Aerial Imagery

MODELING PARAMETERS:

Initial model parameters are the following items:

- 1. Model all storm sewer and culvert segments 18 inches in diameter (or equivalent) and larger, noting that the model will be required to identify all watershed deficiencies, including inlet capacity. Inclusion of smaller diameter pipes may be required to meet the goals of the model.
- 2. Street inlets are to be aggregated within the model to the 18-inch diameter (or equivalent) storm sewer level.
- Incorporate existing storm water management facilities (public and private) into the model.
- 4. Subdivide provided outfall basins into smaller watersheds as needed in order to properly execute the model.
- 5. Coordinate System and Vertical Datum
 - a. Horizontal Coordinate System: Wisconsin County Coordinate System Dane Zone NAD83 (HARN).
 - b. Vertical Datum: NAVD88 (pre 2007 adjustment) ft (City of Madison Datum + 845.6)

6. Naming convention

- a. Subcatchments MOIDs:
 - Begin with Subcatchments naming convention provided by the City in the Outfall Basin feature class.
 - 1. Add a three-digit designator to the end of the name, beginning with 000
 - 2. As subcatchments are subdivided, increase the added designator by 1.
 - 3. Example: ME04-A-0014-H-MAD-C (Provided by City) → ME04-A-0014-H-MAD-C-000 (For the original basin) → ME04-A-0014-H-MAD-C-001 (For first subdivision)
 - ii. Final outfall basin feature class file, including supporting files used to compute runoff timing and volume parameters shall be part of the deliverables provided to the City of Madison.
- b. Structures and Junctions:
 - i. Node (Junction/Storage/Outfall) MOIDs for existing structures shall retain the asset identification provided by the City.
 - ii. Proposed Structure MOIDs are to be determined by the Consultant but shall be given a "logical" name that reflects general location, function, or other.
 - iii. For junctions that need to be added that are storm sewer tees as constructed, use the downstream manhole / structure with "_01" added in increasing order moving from downstream to upstream. For example, the first junction added for a tee upstream of MI3350-001 would be MI3350-001_01
- c. Pipes:
 - i. Conduit MOIDs for existing pipes shall retain the asset identification provided by the City, except that leads with an asset ID that takes up all 32 characters can be shortened to the corresponding assigned ID. For example, IN3350-032_MI3350-007_MI3350-001 can be changed to IN3350-032_MI3350-001_01
 - ii. Proposed Pipe MOIDs are to be determined by the Consultant but shall be named in a manner similar to the City pipe naming convention, which includes the upstream and downstream structure names.
- d. Channel/Street Flow Segments:
 - i. Conduit MOIDs for drainage-ways shall be named in a manner that identifies the greenway segment it represents and the distance from the upstream end. Example: NorthDoorCreek_Sprecher_125 would represent a channel segment that begins 125 feet into the North Door Creek Greenway Sprecher Road Section.
 - ii. Conduit MOIDs for streets shall be named in a manner that identifies the street it represents and its major watershed; Example: ME02_MineralPointRd_001 or a street name and manhole ID; Example: [Major Basin ID]_[U/S MH ID]_[Street

Name] as some streets can be quite long and include a lot of street flow segments

- e. Transects:
 - i. Natural channel transects shall be named with the same ID as the conduit MOID.
 - ii. Street transects shall be named in a manner that is easily identifiable for the street or street type it represents.
 - iii. A shapefile shall be created documenting where transects are cut.
- f. Other SWMM Features (Weirs, orifices, etc)
 - i. Other SWMM features shall have readily identifiable names corresponding to the type of feature they are trying to model. For example, an orifice for a detention pond should have an ID that is "<Detention Pond ID> ORIF 01".

- b. Long-Duration Storm One (1) longer (duration >24 hr) 100-yr event will be run per model. The distribution and duration of that event will be developed on a case-by-case basis based on the characteristics of that watershed. Rainfall depth for the selected storm (or combination of storms) will be taken from the appropriate entry in NOAA's Atlas 14.
- 8. Hydrology (SWMM Method with Horton Infiltration) (References: A, B, C)
 - Parameters listed are default parameters and may need to be adjusted based on calibration data.
 - a. Subwatershed Detail for Street Drainage
 - i. Contributing area to the existing storm sewer system that is to be modeled (Determined on a watershed by watershed basis)
 - ii. Provides information that there is or is not an issue with upstream street flooding / storm sewer capacity that would be detailed out as part of a future street improvement design project.
 - b. SWMM Routing Parameters (if calibration is not available to adjust parameters)
 - Percent Impervious Follow Step 1 (pages 1-3) of the "HowTo_CalculateCN" document.
 - ii. DCIA Reference WinSLAMM Standard Land Use DCIA Spreadsheet
 - iii. Width Estimated based on subcatchment shape. Estimation methodology shall be documented.
 - iv. Slope Computed manually or estimated based on LiDAR. Computation or estimation methodology shall be documented.
 - v. Impervious Manning's n 0.016
 - vi. Pervious Manning's n 0.20
 - vii. Depression Storage for Impervious 0.05 inches
 - viii. Depression Storage for Pervious 0.15 inches
 - c. Horton Infiltration
 - i. For typical urban pervious area (Based on range of values for different soil types, moisture conditions, and vegetation conditions found in Reference A):

- ii. Factors for adjusting
 - 1. Forest Multiply max and min infiltration rates by 2.
 - 2. Farmland Divide max and min infiltration rates by 2.
 - 3. Other land uses see reference
- iii. It is understood the NRCS/SCS updates the soil mapping at various times. The project teams will identify a date the soils data will be downloaded and that will be the data used for the duration of the project.
- 9. Hydraulics (References: A, B, D, E, F)
 - Dynamic mode with constant / variable timestep sufficient to model system accurately.
 - Conduit lengthening shall not be used unless prior approval from City on reason.
 - Parameters are default parameters and may need to be adjusted based on calibration data.
 - This list is not intended to be exhaustive.
 - a. System to be Modeled
 - i. Public
 - 1. Standard: 18" Pipes and Larger
 - 2. Process for Exceptions: Provide justification for reason that a pipe 18" and larger does not need to be modeled.
 - 3. Process for requiring inclusion of pipes less than 18": Necessary when they are the only pipes draining parts of the street or drainage system. For example, a 15" pipe stubbing out to a greenway from the street or a long trunk-line that is less than 18".
 - ii. Private
 - 1. Standard: Not included
 - 2. Process for requiring inclusion of private pipes:
 - a. Stormwater management detention facilities
 - b. When necessary to understand the functioning of the public system. For example, the West Towne Mall parking lot drainage system.
 - iii. All greenways and major surface drainages
 - iv. All stormwater detention facilities (public and private). Private systems may be simplified if serving a single site.
 - v. Street surface drainage, but not necessary to the block level unless needed to understand major overflow routes
 - b. InfoSWMM Settings
 - i. Conduits shall have "Store Absolute Conduit Invert" turned on
 - ii. Junctions shall have "Store Absolute Junction Rim" turned on
 - c. Loss Coefficients
 - i. Entry
 - Culverts Select Culvert Code and enter Entry Loss based on InfoSWMM Help File or HEC-RAS Hydraulic Reference Manual
 - 2. Storm Sewer (internal at MHs) = 0.1
 - 3. Storm Drainage Structures (MH) at 45 degree bend = 0.25

- 4. Storm Drainage Structures (MH) at 90 degree bend = 0.5
- 5. For culverts and entrances to storm sewer from an open channel or pond, both the energy loss coefficient and the inlet control (culvert code) shall be used.
- ii. Exit
 - 1. Culverts
 - a. Exit closed conduit to open channel = 0.5
 - b. Exit closed conduit to lake or pond = 1.0
 - 2. Storm Sewer (internal at MHs) = 0.4
 - 3. Storm Drainage Structures (MH) at 45 degree bend = 0.25
 - 4. Storm Drainage Structures (MH) at 90 degree bend = 0.5
- d. Coefficient of Discharge
 - i. Weirs
 - 1. Sharp Crested 3.0
 - 2. Roadway embankment 2.6
 - 3. Flatter overflow Use engineering judgment
 - ii. Orifices
 - 1. 0.6
- e. Manning's n
 - i. Pipes
 - 1. Concrete Pipe: 0.013
 - 2. All other n values shall be chosen within generally acceptable ranges.
 - ii. Channels
 - 1. Use Chow's Open Channel Hydraulics, Reference E (widely re-cited)
 - iii. Bank Flow, including developed urban areas
 - 1. Use Chow's Open Channel Hydraulics, Reference E (widely re-cited)
- f. Transect Placement and Modifiers
 - i. Splitting long open channels
 - 1. Changes in cross section
 - 2. Significant changes in slope and roughness
 - 3. Overflow points
 - ii. Segment Lengths
 - iii. Channel Geometry
 - iv. Meander
 - Calculated based on InfoSWMM equations for overbank and channel flow lengths
 - v. Provide shapefile where transects are selected along with XS Identifier
- g. Tailwater Conditions:
 - i. Lake Mendota: one foot over Summer Maximum 851.10
- h. Inlet Clogging Factors
 - i. Continuous Slopes
 - 1. Street slope < 1% 25% Clogging
 - 2. Street slope >= 1% No Clogging
 - ii. Sags 50% Clogging
- 10. Non-Modeling Data
 - a. The following fields shall be added to each SWMM feature:
 - i. "MOD_NOTES" Character String, 100 characters. Purpose of this field is for the modeler to note any changes made to the feature that is different from the GIS database. Entries shall be:
 - 1. ID: <reason> Example: Pipe Tee
 - 2. U-S Invert/Offset: <reason> Example: Field Verified
 - 3. D-S Invert/Offset: <reason>
 - 4. U-S & D-S Invert/Offset: <reason>
 - 5. Length: <reason> Example: Combined with U-S pipe
 - 6. Network: <reason> Example: Combined with D-S pipe

- 7. Other: <description / reason>
- ii. "ASSET ID" Asset ID in City's GIS data if available
- iii. "SOURCE_CND" For Conduits Character String, 100 characters. Entries shall be:
 - 1. GIS Database
 - 2. Field Verified / Survey
 - 3. LiDAR
 - 4. Design / As-Built DWG <dwg reference>
 - 5. Assumed <method> Example: match D-S pipe
- iv. "SOURCE INV" intended to list the source for the invert elevation
- v. "SOURCE RIM" intended to list the source for the rim elevation
- vi. "MOD GEOM" intended for changing geometry notes
- vii. "MOD_NET" intended for changing the network
- viii. "SOURCE_NET" intended to list the source for the network data (where the feature comes from)
- ix. "MODEL EX" "Yes" if included in the Existing Conditions Model, "No" if not
- x. "MODEL ALT 1" "Yes" if included in the Alternative 1 Scenario, "No" if not
- xi. "MODEL_ALT 2" "Yes" if included in the Alternative 32Scenario, "No" if not
- xii. "MODEL ALT3" "Yes" if included in the Alternative 3 Scenario, "No" if not.
