## AMERICA'S STATUE OF LIBERTY

Inspired by the United States of America's promise of freedom for all who sought to throw off the yoke of oppression and hunger, French historian, Edouard de Laboulaye (1811-1883), dreamed of a monument that would serve as a symbol of liberty for the world's downtrodden masses. Moreover, he felt, the monument should be offered to the United States as a gesture of friendship from the French people.

Noted French sculptor Frederic Bartholdi, drawn into a discussion of the monument by Laboulaye, enthusiastically took on the project of designing the now famous Statue of Liberty.

Laboulaye persuaded Gustave Eiffel, creator of the Eiffel Tower, to design the Statue's steel framework and enlisted the aid of Ferdinand de Lesseps, promoter of the Panama Canal, in raising funds.

In Paris, on July 4, 1884, the people of France officially presented the Statue of Liberty to the U. S. ambassador. Shipped to the United States, it was erected on Bedloe Island (since renamed Liberty Island) in New York harbor. More than \$200,000 in pennies contributed by American school children provided the funds for the Statue's pedestal.

From base of pedestal to tip of torch, the Statue of Liberty towers 305 feet above the harbor. The copper exterior and steel framework weigh about 450,000 pounds.

## MADISON'S STATUE OF LIBERTY

Madison's Statue of Liberty, a replica of the original, was initially presented to the Boy Scouts of America by the Rotarians in 1951 at the celebration commemorating Scouting's 40th anniversary in America. It was dedicated at Giddings Park on the shores of Lake Mendota.

In 1961 the Giddings Park site was acquired by a church as a building site. Another suitable site for the Statue could not be found, despite the efforts of both public officials and the State Historical Society. For ten long years the Statue was moved from one storage place to another, and finally was placed in a fenced corner in the maintenance area of Franklin Park.

By chance, the mother of two Boy Scouts, came upon the Statue in 1970. She noted that neglect and vandalism had taken its toll. With hope that Miss Liberty could be saved, she told several Scout leaders, who volunteered to restore the statue and move it to a more fitting location.

Many Four Lakes Council Scouters also remembered the Lady of Liberty, and felt that the time was right for a rededication, not only of the Statue, but also of the values for which she stands.

Assisted by interested Madisonians and the Madison Parks Department, Scout leaders selected Warner Park as the appropriate location and hoped to erect a plaza-like setting for the Statue. The Statue Plaza, now known as the Court of Honor, was designed not only for use at Scout functions, but for civic activities as well.

On this 85th anniversary of the original Miss Liberty's dedication in New York and with the restoration and today's rededication 85 years later of Madison's replica, Madison's Statue of Liberty reassumes its role as a reminder of our American heritage. It serves as a lasting memorial, too, to a community firmly committed to preserving the freedoms and values which have made this nation great.

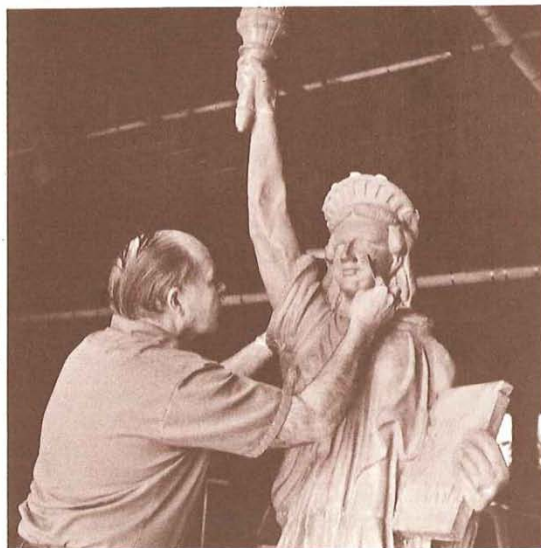

### DR. WALTER SULLIVAN DIES

Dr. Walter E. Sullivan, 86, emeritus professor of anatomy at the University of Wisconsin Medical School, died at his home in Costa Mesa, Calif., on Tuesday (Aug. 24, 1971) after an illness.

Walter was an Active Member of our Club for 18 years from the time he joined in 1938 until 1956 when he retired from teaching and moved to California.

Dr. Sullivan was not only an outstanding educator in the field of anatomy (the department he headed as chairman for nearly 25 years) but he was also active in civic affairs. He served as a member of the Madison Zoological Society, the Madison Park and Pleasure Drive Association, the Madison General Hospital Board, and other community projects.

### STATUE OF LIBERTY REDEDICATED

A brief but impressive rededication service was held last Wednesday morning at Warner Park when the Replica of the Statue of Liberty was rededicated at its new (and we hope final) resting place.

A formal rededication service will be held sometime in October at the area that will be known as Madison Liberty Court of Honor. At that time we will have a more complete review of the ceremony.

This replica statue was purchased by the Rotary Club of Madison in cooperation with the Four Lakes Council of the Boy Scouts and was dedicated on Flag Day June 14, 1951, when it was originally placed in Giddings Park.

Mark Markwardt, then Immediate Past President of our Club made the presentation speech. Mark, Jim Otto (the Rotary Club representative on the then Statue of Liberty Committee), Ray Matoy and President Bill O'Rourke were present last Wednesday at the rededication ceremonies.

Mayor Bill Dyke made impressive acceptance remarks for the City.

Don Schraufnagel, of the State Bureau of Facilities and Tad Froncek, of Oscar Mayer & Co., Graphic Arts Div., have been the leaders and hard workers behind this relocation project and deserve a big vote of thanks along with Parks Supt.
