


# Hawthorne-Truax Neighborhood Plan

- **2001 Carpenter Ridgeway Hawthorne-Sycamore-Truax Plan** - Hawthorne Elementary School gazebo, bikepath and tot playground, East Washington Avenue beautification, Tax Incremental Finance District creation, and affordable housing funding.

- **2017 Darbo Worthington Starkweather Plan** - Mural Alley behind Madison East Shopping Center, new street named Richard Davis Way, Thurber Park Artist Residency, Pop-Up Market, and public-private partnerships for a new neighborhood mixed-use activity center.

- **2016 Emerson-East Eken Park-Yahara Plan** -- public art, bikepaths, neighborhood gateway entrance, historic district designation, gathering place and historic marker, and funding for locally-owned businesses at the Public Market.
