Human Resources Sends March Quarterly Employee Pulse Survey



We still have a few more promotional processes to cycle through. Promotions combined with recent departures will result in a number of additional entry-level positions for us to fill. So, for now, we will continue to be somewhat short-staffed.

Crews had a historic snowfall to end this winter season. But now that spring has arrived we're starting to get back to work on construction projects. In addition to typical sanitary and storm repairs, crews are working on a building demo to make way for a new bike path, a number of last minutes bus stop additions for the BRT project, and 2023 water ways projects. Crews are also starting to work on spring cleaning of catchbasins to remove sand that accumulated over the winter. And we're getting ready to set up our sand bags sites another sure sign that spring is here.

The lining contractor has resumed work and we have more contracts being awarded so it will be very busy season for Zak inspecting these projects. In addition to his as-built surveys, TJ has some requests from designers that he will be working on. Plus pond depth surveys.

Stormwater

Janet Schmidt, Principal Engineer, Section Manager

Hawks Landing North Flood Mitigation is well underway and East Towne Pond is getting ready to start. Some of the nicer weather earlier this winter has provided a few windows for construction to ramp up faster than expected. Hope those projects get a good lead before we get into street construction. Now just have to get rid of the snow once and for all. The City's MS4 permit is approved and ready to submit by the March 31 deadline. Thank you Phil and all those that assisted for getting that done! Prequalification approvals are in full swing with the renewal deadline of March 1 and Megan has been very busy processing applications. Budget is in full swing now with a lot of work to be done before the submittal deadline of April 21. We will have a new

hire to replace Caroline Burger's role as the watershed study lead. Ryan Stenjem will join the team as an Engineer 3 on April 3. Please welcome Ryan when you get a chance.

Sanitary Sewer

Mark Moder, Principal Engineer, Section Manager

The sewer design work load is now in peak design season with many street projects going out to bid. Staff are working extra hours to get projects out to bid on time and as always, it is greatly appreciated. The Lift Stations: The Truax Lift Station Replacement Project will be bid early April (waiting for final design documents). The 2 lift stations construction project carryover projects: Harper Lift Station (replacement) and Thurber lift Station (rehabilitation) are underway. We will have 1 more UV lining projects scheduled for bid in May. Resin prices have increased 40% in 2023 but this method is still far more economical to upgrade sewers than open cut replacement. Private development work (lot redevelopment and plat work) is steady with sewer design staff continuing to stay on schedule for sewer extension permitting. Finally, the budget planning for 2024 construction year is due mid-April so we will be busy putting together estimates for the next few weeks.
