INTRODUCTION

Country Grove Park is a 43.84 acre park located on the west side of Madison at 7353 East Pass. Classified as a community park, the park focuses on meeting community-based recreation needs, as well as preserving unique landscapes and open spaces. The nearest developed parks to this location are Sandstone Park to the east and Manchester Park to the northeast. Glacier Crossing Park and Ice Age Ridge Park are also nearby and to the west, but mainly serve as connections to the Ice Age Trail and have minimal amenities. Chavez Elementary School is located adjacent to the east side of the park and provides additional recreational space and amenities.

About 22 acres of the park are greenways used for stormwater management and conveyance and managed by the Engineering Division. Much of that 22 acres include mapped wetlands by the WDNR and mapped floodways by FEMA leaving the potential for park amenities very limited in those areas.

There are two driving factors to initiate the master planning process. In 2020, additional parkland was dedicated via the Fred-Maple Grove Drive Plat. The dedication expanded the park to the east, adding 5.11 acres of usable park amenity space and 7.23 acres of greenway within the park boundary. The Parks Division also has identified a need for a shelter building to be added to the southwest area of the parks system. Parks leadership evaluated parks in the area and determined Country Grove Park as a suitable location for such amenity. In addition to evaluating existing park uses, the goal of the master plan process was to identify a suitable location within the park for a shelter building and identify park amenities for the new expanded park area.



HISTORY

The land which Country Grove Park occupies has a long history as a crop production field on agricultural property. The city acquired the park property through parkland dedication included in a series or neighborhood plats from 1993-2000.

EXISTING PLANNING DOCUMENTS

There is no known adopted master plan for Country Grove Park on file.

CURRENT USES AND MAINTENANCE PRACTICES

Soccer/Open Play Field

There are three soccer fields located in the park. The largest field is located closest to East Pass while the two fields to the west are smaller in size. The fields are heavily used by the Madison Area Youth Soccer Association (MAYSA) for practices. All three fields are typically reserved multiple nights per week during the spring, summer, and fall. Due to the heavy use, the fields are shifted within the open turf area throughout the year in order to maintain good turf conditions. When the fields are not reserved they are available for open play of soccer or other activities.

Basketball Court

There is one full-court basketball court located in the northwest corner of the park near East Pass. The existing asphalt pavement is in good condition. The court does not get reserved, however parks staff has observed the court being used often while on-site and neighborhood feedback indicates it is well used.

Playground Area

The existing playground was installed in 2017. The expected lifespan of the playground is 20-30 years. During that time typical maintenance, such as replacing broken parts and safety surfacing will be performed. The playground area also includes a small seating area with a structure for a fabric shade. The year of installation of the structure is unknown. The fabric shade is installed every spring and removed every fall by city crews. If the structure would need to be replaced, it would be preferable to replace with a permanent shade that does not require yearly installation.

Drinking Fountain

The drinking fountain is located adjacent to the paved path just off of East Pass. The fountain is in good condition. The water supply requires yearly winterization by city crews.

Paved Path

The paved path begins at the intersection of East Path and Woodstone Drive and goes through the park to Rockstream Drive, adjacent to Chavez Elementary School. A bridge is used to span the floodway area. This path provides a critical connection for the surrounding neighborhoods as many children use it to go to and from school. Alternative routes using street right-of-ways add considerable length to travel routes for pedestrians and bikers from east to west.

The western section of path was re-aligned and re-paved in 2021 to provide improved drainage to the area.

Backstop

The backstop is located on the eastern end of the open play field. While not typically reserved, residents have indicated the backstop receives informal use for baseball, softball, and kickball. The backstop is in excellent condition.

Maintenance Practices

Current maintenance practices include turf mowing, tree trimming/removals as necessary, and regularly scheduled play equipment inspections and upkeep. This property will be maintained in accordance with the City of Madison Adopted Land Management Plan.

MASTER PLAN PROCESS AND PUBLIC INPUT

Master Plan Process

This process consisted of two public input meetings and a public survey. The timeline for this process was as follows:

- October 26, 2022 Public Input Meeting #1
- January 27-February 12, 2023 Online Community Survey
- February 16, 2023 Public Input Meeting #2
- April 19, 2023 Board of Park Commissioners informational review
- May 17, 2023 Board of Park Commissioners potential adoption of the master plan

Public Input

Public Input Meeting #1

Public Input Meeting #1 was held virtually via Zoom. Parks presented background information about the park, presented a draft master plan, and listened to community feedback. Presentation Materials can be found in Appendix 1. A summary of feedback can be found in Appendix 2.

Online Community Survey

After the first public input meeting, Parks created an online survey to receive additional input input. The link to the survey was included on postcard notifications for the second public input meeting. In total, the survey had 155 responses. Some strong themes were support for adding a shelter to the park, a general lack of amenities in the park, and admiration of the existing paved path and bridge. All responses can be viewed in Appendix 3.

Public Input Meeting #2

Public Input Meeting #2 was held virtually via Zoom. Parks reviewed background information about the park, presented the results of the community survey and a summary of comments from Public Input Meeting #1. A revised draft master plan was also presented for community feedback. Presentation Materials can be found in Appendix 1.

MASTER PLAN PROPOSED IMPROVEMENTS

The master plan was developed by incorporating feedback received during the public engagement process with the expertise of parks staff to balance resident wants and needs with the present and future resources of the Parks Division. Specific improvement items are identified as numbers shown on the master plan graphic. Existing amenities which are not identified for improvements are expected to remain in place on typical maintenance and replacement schedules.

#1 - Single-track Mountain Bike Trails

In 2020 parks completed the Madison Bike Adventure Trail plan. The plan identified Country Grove Park as an integral trail connection on the west side of the city. The trails will have width that varies from just a little wider than your shoulders, up to a track that is just wide enough for two bikes to pass. Many single-track trails are open to one-way travel and wind their way through the best terrain that the landscape offers. Some trails also offer challenge elements.

The trails proposed for Country Grove Park will be in or adjacent to the greenway areas and connect to the west, northeast, and southeast. A potential connection to the southwest was removed from the plan due to neighborhood concerns and feasibility issues related to the narrow width of the greenway section.

#2 - Prototype Shelter Building

Parks has identified a need for a shelter building, including restrooms, in this area of the city. Country Grove Park was selected for the shelter due to the location, space available, and status as a community park. Through the master plan process parks studied suitable location options for the shelter. Ultimately, the location proposed is north of the existing paved path and adjacent to East Pass.

The proposed location is in close proximity to the existing play area, while still allowing the soccer fields the maximum amount of space to rotate fields. It also presents the most ideal location for a vehicle access point to accommodate a small parking lot and drop-off for shelter users. The access point would align with Grove Circle in order to limit the amount of conflict points to East Pass. An access point at this location may include pedestrian crossing improvements to East Pass.

The proposed shelter location will require removal of the existing basketball court. A new basketball court location is identified in item #4.

#3 - Sand Volleyball Court

The sand volleyball court will be located between the existing playground and the proposed shelter building. This amenity was added to the plan after interest was shown at the PIM #1. The location close to the shelter provides allows for the court to be used in conjunction with a gathering.

#4 - New Court Area

This area is proposed as the location for a new basketball court to replace the existing court which will be removed as part of construction of the shelter building. In addition, the area has been sized to include a mini-pitch/futsal court. The exact size and number/types of courts will be evaluated based on neighborhood input and recreational trends at the time of construction.

#5 - Path Connection

Provide a formalized path connection from the paved path to the soccer fields/backstop area. This path may be paved or gravel. Currently there is a desire path in this location.

#6 - New Court Area

Parks has identified the need for additional racquet sport facilities in this area of the park system. The proposed court area is location near Rockstream Dr. and is sized to accommodate either two tennis courts or six pickleball courts. The exact type of court will be evaluated based on neighborhood input and recreational trends at the time of construction.

#7 – Community Patio


The proposed community patio will be located along Rockstream Dr. and provide a gathering space on the east side of the park. The space will include a sun shelter structure and a selection of permanent outdoor yard games. Selections may include corn -hole, ping pong table, ladder toss, etc. Selections will be made with neighborhood input at the time of construction.

#8 - Open Field Area


The proposed open field area would provide space for informal recreation in the area surrounding the community patio.

#9 - Non-mowed / Natural Area with Natural Surface Paths


Results of the community survey indicated a desire for more natural areas and walking paths in the park. The proposed area will include native grasses and forbs along with walking paths and benches for nature viewing. The walking paths will be either mowed turf or a natural aggregate surface. The location adjacent to the greenway

Summary of Public Comment Period at PIM #1 – Country Grove Master Plan

Questions or Clarifications

- What size are the parking lots envisioned to be?
 - o Parks currently envisions 8 to 10 stall parking lots for the shelter area and dog park.
- Will the shelter include water and electricity?
 - Yes, there will be a restrooms, a drinking fountain, and electricity included in the shelter.
- What are the hours of the park system?
 - All Madison Parks are open from 4am-10pm daily
- Do volunteers assist with Dog Park clean-up?
 - Yes, typically volunteer groups assist with occasional clean-up's in city dog parks.
- Is a traffic study needed with more park development?
 - Typically no. Park uses are not typically intense enough to warrant a traffic study.
 However, Parks will work with Traffic Engineering and will complete one if it is deemed necessary.
- Are any changes to the playground being proposed with the master plan?
 - No, the playground is planned to remain as is. This playground was last replaced in 2017. All playgrounds in the system are on a rotating replacement schedule, this one included. The typical lifespan of a playground is 20-25 years.
- Will there be lighting in park?
 - Yes. Since the park is open until 10pm, the shelter and parking areas will include some lighting for users to find their way to their cars after dark. Additionally, lighting the tennis, pickleball, and/or futsal courts would be a possibility. Improvements in lighting technology in recent years has made the impact of lighting on surrounding areas significantly less.
- What if I am interested in a community garden?
 - Parks does provide land for some community gardens. However, those gardens are managed by Rooted Wisconsin. If residents are interested in starting a community garden, they should contact Rooted for assistance in organizing a group. From there, Parks works with Rooted to determine an appropriate location.
- What type of building would be at the Community Patio?
 - The building would be a metal structure with a roof and open sides, Parks refers to these as sun shelters. These types of shelters are reservable, but do not provide electricity or water.

Comments on draft master plan proposed uses (Parks will evaluate and potentially incorporate into a revised plan)

- Many supported the dog park. Consider adding agility/play pieces. However, there was some concern about the dog park bringing traffic.
- Many seem happy that tennis courts are being included. Suggestion to explore dedicated pickleball courts was noted by numerous commenters.
- Numerous commenters have concerns about the single-track bike trail, especially in locations where the route goes behind residential back yards and next to Chavez School. Residents are

concerned about noise from the trail and safety. There are also concerns about intersections of the trail with other uses, such as walking on the existing paved path. One commenter was in full support of the trails and others had concerns, but said they could still be open to them.

- Would like a focus on pollinators in natural areas of the park.
- A member of the soccer club which uses the park commented that the park works very well for them and the club will be excited to hear about a potential futsal court.
- Full support for a shelter with restrooms. One commenter suggested to incorporate grills.

Comments on potential other uses (Parks will evaluate and potentially incorporate into a revised plan)

- Would like to see some disc golf baskets be placed. Not a full course, just a few baskets for practice. This sentiment was echoed in numerous comments.
- Interest in a community garden.
- Adding a sand volleyball court was suggested and seconded by numerous commenters.
- Ice rink in the winters.
- A parcourse or outdoor body-weight "gym".
- Interest in a skatepark.
- Outdoor rigging for yoga silks.
- "American Ninja Warrior" outdoor course.


Comments on traffic adjacent to parkland





Please share any additional comments or concerns regarding the Country Grove Park Master Plan.

- It doesn't add any further dedicated walking trails.
- I like the proposed plan but think the community patio should be near the shelter area and not near the dog park area. I would prefer a sand volleyball court instead of a futsal court. I have seen the current basketball court frequently used by those in the neighborhood and feel it should be included in the master plan.
- Year round trash cans should be available
- Let's get some lighting. Overall looks fine but details would be nice
- I'm personally most interested in having more shaded/gathering areas and places where kids can ride bikes.
- I feel that not building area #6 and #7 are not necessary. There is a dog park just across Country Grove with parking already.
- We are worried about the off-leash dog park because in our experience the dogs will run around the entire park.
- Fitting in a backstop for baseball and softball seems doable. A lot of families in the neighborhood have kids that play baseball and softball.
- I strongly object to an off-leash dog park at this park.
- This is not a park to add a shelter and restrooms. It will only draw traffic and more crime to the area. Simple improvements to what we have would suffice.
- The proposed dog park, seems seems like a very bad idea; it doesn't seem possible to mitigate dog manure running off into mill creek as the proposed area borders and slopes into the creek and will be partially underwater during heavy rains and spring thaws. There is a dog park in the Dane county park less than a mile away. A disc golf practice area or any other use would be ecologically better and provide an amenity not available in the area. There is no need for parking that would bring additional traffic to the area.

The single track (or paved) bike trail is a great idea and should be considered for the spillways continuing even further north from the park between east pass to hwy PD and hwy PD further north towards Raymond Rd.

- Community safety is #1. We don't want criminals ruining the park and surrounding community.
- I've never visited Country Grove Park, but absolutely would if there was an off-leash dog park!
- What is planned for the court areas? How many courts?

Will the courts be lit? Are there wind blocks proposed for the courts? Plans for bathrooms? Thanks!

- The plan looks alright to me, though I would prefer more space devoted to single track. The parking spaces as-is on the plan look good—it's not worth taking away from the remaining open spaces to add much more.
